## OREGON AND WASHINGTON MILITIA IN HONOLULU

### Battle-Cruiser Milwaukee Brings 400 on Annual Cruise

#### BUSINESSMEN NOW WORKING COAL SHOVELS

Two Days' Leave for Entire Crew Is Ordered by Wireless From Washington—Vessel May Be Stationed in Hawaiian Waters—Seasickness Bothered "Land" Sailors Crossing Pacific—Sails for Coast Sunday or Monday

Sighted off port shortly after dawn and along side the naval wharf by nine o'clock, the U. S. battle-cruiser Milwaukee arrived this morning about 48 hours before expected, with more than 400 naval militiamen from Oregon and Washington aboard on their annual cruise.

Coal dust is flying in the air now at the naval dock and a couple of hundred young men, many of them late from professional and commercial work, are heaving the fuel into the ship's sidobunkers. The coaling will be kept up without rest until the task is completed, which Captain J. M. Reeves says will be some time this evening, and then two days' shore leave will be given the men and officers.

No arrangements have been made as yet for the entertainment of the officers and men of the Milwaukee, but in all probability something will be done for the visiting commissioned and enlisted personnel of both the navy and the naval militia. It is almost certain that the citizen-sailors of the northwestern states will be given an opportunity to see Pearl Harbor, and the new naval establishment there.

It is hardly likely that any review or formation will be arranged by the army during the stay of the cruiser in port, as the entire 25th Infantry and one battalion of the 3d Infantry are now in the field.

Unconditional orders have been received from the navy department at Washington to give the crew two days' shore leave, and the early arrival of the ship makes this possible without hardship or interference with the itinerary of the Milwaukee. Her cruise from Tacoma and Seattle to Honolulu makes the first time the "protected cruiser" has been in service in the last three years. With her arrival this morning came a report that she may be stationed in these waters, or put in the "bamboo fleet" of the Philippines. But this report could not be confirmed by Captain Reeves, though he stated a wireless of possible significance in connection with this report was received on board this morning. #### MORE VICTIMS IN WRECK OF SHIP KARLUK



#### EDWARD SEWALL, IN DISTRESS, IS ARRIVAL IN PORT

Voyage of Nine Months, From the Atlantic Coast Proves One of Storm and Disaster

On the last leg of a voyage that in more than one instance has proved to be a hoodoo, and consuming "nine months' time, the big American ship Edward Sewall, was brought to an anchorage off the harbor this afternoon following a series of mishaps which resulted in the staunch vessel losing much of her gear and sails.

The Sewall has met with a most remarkable run of misfortune since sailing from the east coast of the United States. In approaching the shores of Brazil the vessel fell in with a storm that caused the loss of a bowsprit and a topgallant mast and sails.

The Matson Navigation tug Intrepid and Young Brothers launch visited the vessel and the master was brought ashore where he left orders for a stock of stores and a quantity of fresh water.

#### BRITISH ISLES WILL BE RIMMED WITH TOWERS TO FIGHT AERIAL INVADERS

Rapid Advance in Art of Navigating the Air Has Called for Special Action by the British Government to Counter Any Possible Attacks by Actual "Flying Squadrons"—Two Powerful Guns Will Be Mounted Upon Each Link in the Chain of Fortifications

LONDON, Eng., July 8.—So rapidly is the art of aerial navigation in its relation to warfare being developed around the world that the British government has decided upon a counter for a possible attack by aerial men-of-war. The entire British Isles, according to the plan adopted, will be rimmed with "military towers" to care for the invader through the air.

#### Huerta's Troops Defeated, Others Desert in Battalions

#### Roosevelt Yet May Run for Governor of New York State

NEW YORK, July 8.—The state Progressive leaders again are pressing Colonel Roosevelt to run for governor of New York state on the Bull Moose ticket. Roosevelt refuses to retract his previous declinations to run, but it is understood that the question is still open and proper pressure may result in the announcement of the name of the party's chief as candidate.

#### Friends Say Carranza Will Not Treat With Huerta's Men

LAREDO, July 8.—Persons closely allied with General Carranza are positive in their assurances that the Constitutional leader will refuse to confer with envoys of Huerta, appointed following the attempt to settle the United States-Mexican situation by the A. B. C. mediation in Niagara Falls, Canada.

#### Militants Would Dynamite Birthplace of Robert Burns

GLASGOW, Scotland, July 8.—Two suffragettes were discovered today placing powerful bombs against the doors and windows of the birthplace of Robert Burns.

#### Belgium Eliminated From Davis Trophy Tournament

FOLKSTONE, Eng., July 8.—Belgium was eliminated as a contender for the Davis international tennis trophy here today, when the English team defeated the Belgians in both singles and doubles. England meets France next, in the elimination round, for the right to challenge America for the trophy. Germany has decided not to compete.

#### Preparing Shamrock IV for Her Trans-Atlantic Voyage

GOSPORT, Eng., July 8.—The work of dismantling Shamrock IV, preparatory to towing the cup challenger across the Atlantic, was commenced today. The Lipton entry will start for the scene of the international yacht races in two weeks.

#### Kauai Girl Married on Coast

SAN FRANCISCO, July 8.—Miss Maude de Bretteville of Kauai and Dr. James Malcolm Thompson of Los Molinos were married here this morning.

#### Prince William Ready to Quit

ROME, Italy, July 8.—The Powers consider the rule of Albania by Prince William as almost at an end and are ready to form an international committee to resume control of the country when the time for his retirement comes.

#### DOWNFALL OF THE JAPANESE CABINET IS ANTICIPATED

(Special to the Hawaii Shimpoo.) TOKIO, July 8.—Count Okuma, premier of Japan, is daily expecting the downfall of the cabinet brought about because of a strong opposition by the forces led by the strong political party, Seiyu-kai. Count Okuma today left Tokio for Kioto, the seat of the former government and will also spend some time at Osaka, there to prepare for the holding of a general election that is expected to follow the elimination of the cabinet.
