BRYAN THINKS U. S. GOT BEST OF BARGAIN

Would Salvage National Conscience by Paying a Big Indemnity

WASHINGTON, July 13.—Secretary of State Bryan, in a statement published today defending the proposed Colombian treaty, says that whether Colombia's grievance was just or not, nobody can deny that she sustained a greater financial loss through the separation from Panama than the twenty-five million dollars which it is proposed to give her by the United States as an expression of regret for the part America played in the proceedings. He added further that this opinion is almost identical with the expression on the same subject made by the Taft administration.

UNITED RAILWAYS WOULD SELL OUT TO BAY CITY

SAN FRANCISCO, July 13.—Mission Starring, who is president of the United Railroads holding company, together with the attorney for the company, issued statements yesterday offering to sell to San Francisco the properties of the company if the city makes a reasonable offer for the holdings. In their statements they deny that any officer of the company, except Patrick Calhoun, the former president of the company, had any knowledge of the diversion of \$1,096,000 of the company's funds to the development of the so-called Solano farms. It is intimated that the United Railroads holding company would undertake the development of the Solano irrigating project in an effort to retrieve the losses already incurred.

JUSTICE LURTON, SUPREME COURT, DIES SUDDENLY

ATLANTIC CITY, New Jersey, July 13.—Horace Harmon Lurton, justice of the supreme court of the United States, personal friend of William Howard Taft, died suddenly this morning. He was complaining of feeling ill when he went to bed in his hotel here last night. Justice Lurton was a native of Tennessee, aged 70 years. The funeral will be held from the old family home at Clarksville, Tennessee. Justice Lurton was appointed by President Taft. He was a Democrat, a veteran of the Civil war, having served in the Confederate army. He served for a number of years as judge of the supreme court of Tennessee, of which body he was chief justice.

HOME RULE FOR FILIPINOS NOW UP TO CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, July 12.—The Jones bill, which largely extends the autonomy of the government of the Philippine Islands, was introduced into the House today by Representative Jones of Virginia, the father of the bill. The measure has the approval of the administration, as it now appears, the date of the ultimate independence of the islands having been eliminated. As originally drafted, the bill provided a specific date for the hauling down of the American flag and the surrender of American control, but to this the President objected, according to reports, stating that he would not give his sanction to legislation that would bind future congresses and his successors in the White House. As the bill now appears, it has the force of an administration measure.

HUERTA WILL HAND REINS TO CARBAJAL

VERA CRUZ, Mexico, July 13.—Senator Esteva Ruiz, who arrived here yesterday from the City of Mexico, en route to Europe, confirmed the report of President Huerta's intention to resign the presidency and that he will step out recommending the appointment of Senator Francisco Carbajal, at present the minister of foreign affairs in Huerta's cabinet. Ruiz states that the grave question has been carefully considered by Huerta, and that in selecting Carbajal as his successor it is to be only a temporary move, the latter agreeing to step out as soon thereafter as some provisional president of Mexico favorable to the Constitutionalists can be selected. Senator Ruiz added that he believes that the announcement of Huerta's abdication will be made this week.
