# BIJOU THEATER WILL SIMULATE COLD STORAGE PLANT SHORTLY

Ice men are going to be given extra work, and electric fans are going to be everywhere in evidence at the Bijou, as a result of a decision reached by the management this week which was that, no matter how hot it may be outside, it must be cool in the theater. Hence, enter the ice and the fans. The fans will sit on the ice, and the ice will sit on the boxes, and everything in the show house is to be as cool as a professional poker player's smile. The Juvenile Bostonians, whose engagement at the Bijou is attracting large crowds there, are late from the region of the Yukon where warm weather is never experienced except as a figure of speech or an illusion: "The change from the Arctic to the tropics has been sudden for them. Therefore they prefer a cool theater—and so a cool theater is to be provided, both for their sake and for the patrons'. The idea of stacking up ice in the boxes, with fans on it to blow the cool air over the show house, has been tried with success in other places and once or twice here, and always with gratifying success. Orders for the fans have already been placed. They will be put in at once. So from now on no matter the warmth of the outside air, or the number of patrons in the theater, the Bijou is to be cool. This evening the last performance of the great success, "The Loves of Leonore," will be presented. Monday evening the Juveniles will stage "The Daughter of the Regiment," a light opera so well known as not to need description here.

# WELL ACTED IS STORY OF LOST MILLIONAIRE

Mystery fairly permeates the cleverly depicted story that, while serving to interpret a plot in which there is a decided vein of humor, a drama of a high order is shown in two reels, offered at the Empire theater this afternoon and evening in the late mainland release, called "The Lost Millionaire."

There is a very well worked tale of detective strategy incorporated in this picture. The few thousand feet of film are filled with plenty of action. There is sufficient in the drama to have greatly enlarged the scope of the production. The subject is a strong one and the story holds one captivated from the start.

Turing to comedy, the Empire program for the week end abounds in new features in which stars in the moving picture world are introduced to a local audience. In the "Contents of a Suitcase" a laughable tale is related by the assistance of the camera. "The Dreams of Dan Maguire," is a rollicking Irish comedy which has been guaranteed to chase away the glooms.

A short dramatic production which has received high praise is "The Athlete."

# 400,000 SHOES ORDERED BY WAR DEPT.

Contracts for 200,000 pairs of army shoes have been awarded to J. A. Busch of the Brown Shoe Company of St. Louis and J. Herman of Boston. That action brings to successful culmination a unique scheme for the submission of bids used for the first time by the Quartermaster Corps.

At the request of the contract officers the various competing shoe firms, comprising all of the leading manufacturers of the United States, submitted, with their bid, a sample shoe for use as a standard in placing the orders. Ten of the country's leading factories submitted 240 pairs of sample footwear.

J. A. Busch, who received half of the order, offered 50,000 pairs at \$2.77 1/2, and 50,000 at \$2.81 1/2. J. Herman offered 100,000 at \$2.84.

The shoes are all made on regular specifications, but each firm was able to give an example of its own workmanship and thus establish a standard to which it will be held by government inspection in delivering the order.
