COHEN DECLARES HIS OFFER DOES NOT DISQUALIFY

"I have three legal opinions now from three of the leading attorneys in the city holding that my offer to give part of my salary, if elected mayor, to a secretary and the balance to charity, does not in any way disqualify me," states J. C. Cohen, Republican candidate for mayor.

The question whether Cohen was disqualified because of his offer was raised Friday and given publication in the Star-Bulletin. The question arose when an opinion by an attorney was given out in which it was held that one who is elected to office by reason of his waiving of the salary attached to it, is not legally elected and can be ousted.

Not wishing to be in doubt as to where his offer left him, Cohen took the question up with three attorneys. He has now received assurances from them that his offer does not disqualify him or in any way interfere with his candidacy for mayor.

CAMERAMEN WORK IN FIERCE HAIL OF SHELL

Amid a deadly hail of lead and steel messengers, dispatched from weapons aimed by a warlike populace of Mexico, Edwin F. Weigle, a cameraman identified with one of the largest moving picture producing companies on the mainland, is credited with having exposed himself probably more than any other man in the business to what seemed sure death to make a series of pictures that are destined to go down into history as a graphic representation of a real battle.
