War on European Horizon

LONDON, England, July 27.—Warlike plans are prevalent throughout the length and breadth of Europe, and while a majority of the nations are hoping for peace all are preparing for war.

The stock market is in a more panicky condition than ever, with a majority of the continental exchanges closed.

The banks are endeavoring to take concerted action to forestall the panic that appears inevitable.

News comes from Greece to the effect that that country will stand behind Serbia in case war is declared.

Press dispatches tell of the cancellation of furloughs and call for the return of reserves, with special concessions granted to deserters.

Russia Says War Inevitable

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 27.—The Russian minister of war has cabled to George Bakmeteff, master of the imperial court and ambassador of the United States, advising him that war between Russia and Austria is inevitable and confirming the report that a complete mobilization has been ordered.

Britain Plans for War

LONDON, England, July 27.—While striving for peace from every angle Great Britain continues to make the most warlike preparations with her navy. Fleets are receiving orders almost hourly, and all furloughs have been cancelled.

The army and navy reserve is in a state of preparedness and ready to be called out at a moment's notice.

Britain Plans for Mediation

LONDON, Eng., July 27.—Sir Edward Grey has issued an invitation to the German, Italian and French ambassadors to a joint conference to attempt to arrange for the settlement of the present European crisis by mediation.

Italy has accepted the invitation but France and Germany have delayed sending in answers.

100,000 Greeks for Serbia

CONSTANTINOPLE, Turkey, July 27.—The Greek minister to Turkey announces that if war is declared Greece will feel compelled to dispatch 100,000 troops to the aid of Serbia.

It is understood here that mobilization has commenced with this end in view and that the Greek army will be at the disposal of Serbia the moment war is declared.

Servia Knew Answer Unacceptable

VIENNA, Austria, July 27.—According to an official pronouncement issued here today Servia knew in advance that her reply to Austria's ultimatum would be unacceptable and had ordered the mobilization of her troops three hours before the reply was delivered.

Russian Strikers Uphold Government

ST. PETERSBURG, Russia, July 27.—The Russian strikers, numbering almost 1,000,000, have returned to work as an expression of their support of the government's war policy.

Following the announcement that they would return the strikers paraded the streets of St. Petersburg in one of the greatest demonstrations ever witnessed in this city. Patriotic hymns were sung and cheer upon cheer for the government was given by the striking band.

Mobilization in Belgium

BRUSSELS, Belgium, July 27.—A partial mobilization of troops throughout Belgium has been ordered.

It is expected that within 48 hours the entire army will be in a position to move in any direction suggested.

Markets Panicky, Exchanges Closed

LONDON, Eng., July 27.—All European markets are panicky with the principal exchanges on the continent closed.

Local banks are endeavoring to take concerted action toward the forestalling of a panic which is believed to be inevitable.

Catholic Ireland Seething; Mob Attacks Borderers and Government Plans Withdrawal

DUBLIN, Ireland, July 27.—Catholic Ireland is seething. Mobs of Nationalists continue to march on the barracks and jeer at the Scottish Borderers who fired on the mob yesterday.

The mob hourly grows bolder and this afternoon attempted to force the gate to the barracks until the garrison was compelled to resort to the use of bayonets.

After a number of heroic efforts the police succeeded in partially dispersing the mob.


The government is planning the withdrawal of the Borderers in the hope that thereby the situation may be eased and peace restored.

Cable to Honolulu Says Austria Calls Home Her Soldiers

This consulate is in receipt of a cable message from the government of Austria-Hungary, stating that partial mobilization is ordered and that amnesty for deserters returning voluntarily is granted and that indigents will be furnished tickets for passage home via Hamburg or Bremen." JOSHUA TUCKER REFUSES TO QUIT JOB AT PRESENT

Governor Says Matter Closed, While Palmer Woods Is Expected to Take Action

Land Commissioner Joshua D. Tucker, whose resignation was requested Friday by Governor Pinkham, has refused to quit his office until the expiration of his commission, and has so notified the chief executive. This statement was made by both Governor Pinkham and Commissioner Tucker this morning. According to the former, the matter is now a closed issue and there will be no effort made to resist the position taken by Mr. Tucker. The chief executive's statement on the developments today are brief but to the point. He simply said: "The governor states that the position the land commissioner takes is legal, and therefore it is a closed issue, and there is nothing for the governor to say." Serious political consequences may arise as a result of Mr. Tucker's refusal to resign. A political move of some kind is expected to be made by (Continued on page two)

M'CARN IS GOING TO CAPITAL M'BRIDE IS OUT ON BONDS

DEVELOPMENTS IN M'CARN M'BRIDE AFFAIRS. United States District Attorney Jeff McCarn, under indictment by the territorial and federal grand juries on charge of assault with a weapon upon Attorney Claudius H. McBride, this morning announced his intention of leaving for Washington, D. C., on Wednesday to confer with Attorney-general McReynolds and other persons on matters of official business. The trial of the district attorney upon the charge set forth in the federal indictment has been set for August 10 in the federal court before Judge Charles F. Clemons. Attorney Claudius H. McBride who, after the affair between himself and the district attorney in the hall of the federal building recently, swore out a warrant for the arrest of McCarn, was arrested yesterday morning at the instance of the district attorney, charged with a violation of the white slave act. District Attorney McCarn, appearing for the prosecution, and Mr. McBride, attorney for the defense, were both present during the notorious Doyle trial in the federal court this morning. The case probably will go to the jury this afternoon. The hearing of the case of McBride and Henry Afong, the latter also charged with a violation of the white slave act and arrested on Saturday, has been set for Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock before United States Commissioner Charles F. Davis. It was shortly after a consultation in the commissioner's office this morning that the district attorney announced his intention of leaving for Washington.

WHO IS THIRD PARTY IN THE M'BRIDE AFFAIR?

Hearing Before Commissioner May Be Postponed Until After Arrival of Offley

Whether the hearing before United States Commissioner Charles F. Davis of the case of Claudius H. McBride and Henry Afong, charged with a violation of the white slave act, is to be held immediately or postponed until the arrival in Honolulu of W. M. Offley of the department of justice, now in Washington, D. C., and alleged to be a material witness in the matter, will be decided by the commissioner at a conference with the district attorney and Attorney Robert W. Breckons, counsel for the defendants, which has been set for Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock. At the instance of District Attorney Jeff McCarn, warrants for the arrest of McBride and Afong, charging them with a violation of the white slave act, were placed in the hands of Marshal Harry Holt shortly after 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon for service. Afong was arrested at 8 o'clock Saturday evening and released shortly afterward on his own recognizance. McBride, on account of his having been absent from the city, was not apprehended until yesterday morning, his bail being fixed at \$1000. His bondsmen are E. J. Lord and A. W. Seabury. The district attorney, Attorney Breckons and the defendants were present at a consultation held in Commissioner Davis' office at 10 o'clock this morning. Counsel for the defense stated that he was ready to proceed with the case at once. On the other hand the district attorney stated that the government was not ready, saying that a material witness in the person of William M. Offley, who recently visited Honolulu for the purpose of making an investigation of the local judicial situation, must first be called here before the government could proceed along the lines mapped out by the district attorney. In response to the district attorney's argument Attorney Breckons stated that, out of fairness to the defendants, the hearing should be conducted as early a date as possible. The matter was put over until Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock, at which time the commissioner will make a decision. The district attorney requested that the commissioner fix bond for Afong. The amount of this bond probably will be the same as that under which Mr. McBride was released. Asked this morning for a statement regarding the case, Mr. McCarn said: "There is no statement to make. The only motive there is is set forth in the warrants." At the time the warrants were issued Saturday afternoon, a subpoena was issued for the appearance in Honolulu of W. M. Offley as a witness in the case. According to the complaint sworn to by the district attorney, McBride and Afong "transported for immoral purposes, on the night of June 26, one Nellie Ernberger, alias Nellie Goodlow, and one Lillian de Orsay, alias Lillian Goodlow." In a statement to the Star-Bulletin this morning, made by Mr. McBride, it is intimated that there was a third man in the party, one who was not apprehended from the fact that he is a friend of Mr. McCarn. TO CONFER WITH ATTY.-GENERAL, SO HE DECLARES

U. S. District Attorney Says He Is Making Trip on "Official Business"

United States District Attorney Jeff McCarn, under indictment by the federal grand jury charged with an assault with a dangerous weapon upon Attorney Claudius H. McBride, and whose trial is scheduled to commence in the federal court August 10, will leave for Washington, D. C., where he will confer with the attorney-general and other officials, according to a statement given the Star-Bulletin by him this morning. In answer to a question regarding the authenticity of a rumor that his resignation had been asked by the U. S. attorney-general Mr. McCarn refused to give any enlightenment, satisfying himself by merely stating that it "is a matter that concerns only myself and the attorney-general." When asked regarding the motive of his proposed trip to the national capital, the district attorney declined to divulge any information other than to remark that he is going on official business; to "confer regarding matters which have happened since his arrival in Honolulu and regarding matters that are about to happen; especially the latter." The district attorney will go to the mainland unattended, and during his absence the work of the local office will be conducted by his assistant, J. W. Thompson. According to a rumor which went the rounds of the federal building this morning, Mr. McCarn has had the trip to Washington in mind for some time, but had been delaying his departure until the completion of evidence which resulted in the arrest Saturday and Sunday of Attorney Claudius McBride and Henry Afong, charged with a violation of the white slave act. During a brief hearing of this case before United States Commissioner Charles Davis this morning, McCarn intimated that, following a request that a hearing before the commissioner be postponed until the arrival in Honolulu of a certain witness on the mainland, it would be some little time before he would be prepared to go into the matter on behalf of the government.

DOYLE CASE TO JURY; VERDICT MAY COME TODAY

Jeff McCarn and Claudius McBride Deliver Their Closing Addresses

The case of Joseph A.
