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# GREAT ARMIES MASSING WAR NOW DECLARED KAISER ORDERS GERMAN TROOPS TO MOBILIZE

**SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., August 1.**—Russia failing to answer Germany's ultimatum calling for demobilization within 12 hours, Germany has declared war.

## GERMANY ISSUES ULTIMATUM THAT DEMANDS RUSSIAN DEMOBILIZATION

**BERLIN, Germany, August 1.**—Germany today gave Russia 12 hours to demobilize her tremendous forces now massing along the southern border.

If Russia does not demobilize at the end of 12 hours, declares the German communication to the Czar's foreign office, Germany will herself immediately mobilize.

The German chancellor, addressing a huge patriotic procession today, declared that Emperor Wilhelm has been constantly endeavoring to secure peace. If he fails in his endeavor, says the Chancellor, the German army will take the field with a clear conscience.

### Many Steamship Companies Suspend Service

**NEW YORK, N. Y., August 1.**—Suspension and cancellation of steamship service and the recall of vessels already out to sea marked the marine developments and complications arising today as a result of the European war cloud.

The International Mercantile Marine's Lines, organized by J. Pierpont Morgan and controlling a large number of ocean transportation companies and a great fleet of vessels, has suspended operations and several minor companies have announced their intention to keep their vessels in port until a settlement of the threatened international war.

The North German Lloyd today recalled the steamers Friedrich Der Grosse and Neckar. The Russian-American line has suspended operations until such time as peace is restored in Europe. The Hamburg-American Line cancels all West Indies-Panama service.

### Standard Oil Ends European Shipments

**NEW YORK, N. Y., August 1.**—Announcement was made today that the Standard Oil Company had suspended all shipments to Europe until it is in a position to receive the assurance of the underwriters that its cargoes will be safely landed at destination.

### German Ambassador Leaves Russia

**WASHINGTON, D. C., August 1.**—Official advices received in this city report the German ambassador as having left St. Petersburg for Berlin.

### Bank of England Discount Rate Ten Percent

**LONDON, England, August 1.**—The Bank of England's discount rate jumped to 10 per cent today, in the frantic effort being made in this country to stem the flow of gold to the Continent.

The government printing office is working day and night in an effort to issue notes as rapidly as they are requisitioned.

### National Penny Bank Suspends Business

**LONDON, England, August 1.**—The National Penny Bank, one of the largest savings institutions in the British Isles, suspended business today, pending further developments in the international situation.

This institution ranks second only to the Postal Savings Bank of Great Britain.

### French Foreign Office Thinks War Inevitable

**PARIS, France, August 1.**—The French foreign office considers war inevitable. The German ambassador was packing his trunks today, preparatory to leaving, when he received telegraphic instructions, the substance of which are unknown, which he immediately carried to the foreign office.

Dispatches received here say that Italy has formally notified Germany that she will remain neutral.

### Germany Demands France Remain Neutral

**BERLIN, Germany, August 1.**—Germany has given France 18 hours to declare neutrality.

## LOCAL CONSULS NOW AWAITING OFFICIAL WORD

At 11:55 o'clock this morning an Associated Press message by Federal Wireless brought the news to Honolulu that the European situation had flamed into war. The dispatch said: "Germany declares war against Russia."

Immediately the news flashed over Honolulu. The Star-Bulletin at once conveyed the information to Georg Rodiek, consul for Germany, and Dr. A. Marques, vice-consul for Russia. Neither had heard the news previously.

Consul Rodiek said: "I have had no news and until I receive official notification from the German government I shall take no steps. I might receive word regarding calling the reservists to the colors but I have nothing yet."

Dr. Marques said: "I have had no notification that war has been declared and shall do nothing until I receive instructions from the Russian government."

## RICE, TOURING ISLAND, GIVEN WARM RECEPTION

Candidate for Delegate Is Supported Strongly in Kaneohe and Kailua

**KANEOHE, Aug. 1.**—A big Rice meeting was held at Kaneohe this morning, scores of voters from Kaneohe and Kailua attending. The weather was fine and the enthusiasm for Rice was very marked. Senator Rice and his father were loudly cheered by the voters. From all indications Rice will poll a big vote on windward Oahu.

With Rice banners flying from a small fleet of automobiles Charles A. Rice, Republican candidate for delegate to Congress, his father W. H. Rice, and many others started from the Young Hotel about 9:30 o'clock this morning for a campaign trip to the windward side of Oahu. Before the start there was a brief reception in the headquarters of the Charles A. Rice campaign committee, room 35, Young building, at which many Hawaiians were present to greet Mr. Rice, senior, and the candidate for delegate.

Among those who are making the trip beside Charles A. Rice and W. H. Rice, Sr., are Alexander Lindsay, Jr., Ed. Towse, C. H. Olson, A. D. Castro, A. H. Rice, William Thompson, H. Rice, George G. Guiffo, A. St. C. Pihanaia, M. J. Serpa, Albert Horner, J. A. Akina, William Moseman, F. T. P. Waterhouse, J. A. Noble and Arthur Kahaawala.

Meetings will be addressed by Charles A. Rice and W. H. Rice today and this evening at Kailua, Kaneohe, Heaia, Waihalo, Hadula, Lala and Waihalu. Information received at the Rice headquarters this morning was to the effect that large audiences will greet the speakers at every meeting place, from Kaneohe to Waihalu. Mr. Rice and his father will spend Sunday at Haleiwa.

Speaking just before he started on his trip, Mr. Rice said that he was very much pleased with the result of his tour of the island of Hawaii, where he had been given a very cordial reception and many had pledged themselves in his behalf.

Mrs. James Gibbs was one of the several arrested this morning for violating the new tariff ordinance. She was arrested for allowing her machine to remain standing more than 30 minutes in the downtown district.

**COPENHAGEN, Denmark, August 1.**—Denmark, Sweden and Norway, acting in conjunction, will today declare their neutrality in the war of Europe. The nations will issue identical notes, declaring their harbors closed to the fleets of the warring powers. British, German, French and Russian warships in any of the harbors of Scandinavia or the Danish peninsula will be ordered to sea.

The first order of this kind was issued yesterday by Denmark, two German destroyers being ordered by the commandant of the fortress at Middelfrond to retire from Danish waters under threat of being fired upon if they refused.

The Danish army will be mobilized at once, plans for this protective step having been perfected yesterday. It is expected that the Norwegian and Swedish armies will also be placed upon a footing of preparedness, with a view to carrying out the neutrality proclamation.

**BRUSSELS, August 1.**—The International bureau for peace yesterday issued an appeal to President Wilson, of the United States, to offer his mediation in the European conflict.

**SAN FRANCISCO, August 1.**—Japanese Consul Numano, in a statement issued here yesterday, said that Japan will be the last nation to enter the war vortex which is now threatening to involve all Europe.

**ST. PETERSBURG, August 1.**—Steamship communication between St. Petersburg and England has been stopped. This is a result of the proximity of the German fleet and the danger of capture of the Russian and British liners plying between British and Russian ports in the event of a state of war being declared.

**LONDON, August 1.**—It is announced here that Russia and Austria are again negotiating with England and France, who are doing their utmost to avert a general war. Russia and Austria, however, have ordered a general mobilization of their troops and Germany yesterday declared a state of siege.

France is unofficially mobilized at the present moment and the cabinet councils have established a moratorium. This provides during the existence of present conditions for the postponement of the payment of all debts and obligations, the indefinite extension of all notes, and the suspension of all civil proceedings for the recovery of money or property.

According to further advices received here, it is understood that the Italian government has learned that Germany will ask Russia and France to cease their military operations.

**ROUMANIA, August 1.**—Orders have been issued requiring all officers of the Roumanian army serving under the colors, to report at once to the Roumanian legation.

**PARIS, August 1.**—Representatives of France and Great Britain are now engaged in a final effort to maintain the peace of Europe and avert the danger of having any of the European powers become involved in the dispute between Austria and Serbia.

**COPENHAGEN, Denmark, Aug. 1.**—Advices received here state that a big German fleet has been sighted off the south coast of Holland.

**PARIS, Aug. 1.**—The French cabinet in council here deliberated until early this morning on the crisis now confronting the nations of Europe. President Poincaré signed three decrees extending until August 31 the terms of payment of all obligations becoming due within that time, prohibiting the export of grains and abolishing duties on the importation of farm-accused products.

**LONDON, Aug. 1.**—The extraordinary council of ministers, according to a St. Petersburg dispatch to the Times, were confronted last night with a modified situation in the European crisis, resulting from assurances received from the German ambassador. Following the session messages were exchanged between the Russian, French and German rulers. It is reported here that the German ambassador has intimated to France his early departure from Paris.

**WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.**—With the liners and freighters of six powers being ordered into friendly or neutral ports in order to avoid capture in the war that is now inevitable, with the prospect that the greater part of the world's shipping will be indefinitely tied up, President Wilson has in mind a plan whereby much of the shipping of the world will be brought under the American flag during the period of war, with the possibility that it will remain American.

His plan is to suggest that Congress pass a radical amendment to the shipping laws, allowing any vessel to apply for and be granted American registry, unrestricted by limitations regarding foreign building or foreign officers. The President will let down all bars to foreign ships of any nation and allow all to fly the American flag.
