## FANTOM SHIP SIGHTED OFF OAHU COAST?

That a large three funneled war vessel steaming at slow pace was sighted about 25 miles to the south and westward of Honolulu early this morning was the report that gained general circulation along the waterfront and about the city today. Despite every effort made to run down the source of the story, the report could not be confirmed.

The strange vessel was said to be a battleship, believed to be one of several belonging to the British squadron. An early report had it that the warcraft had been sighted by the Inter-Island steamer Helene in return-master of this vessel, flatly denied today that he or his officers had noted any such vessel in steaming from Ahukini.

Sufficient time is believed to have not elapsed for the appearance of a German cruiser from either the China or the Mexican coast. Departing vessel masters have been instructed by port officials to keep a sharp lookout for any and all vessels and report the same by wireless.

## PINEAPPLE PACK FOR GERMANY IS NOT TOTAL LOSS

There is not likely to be any loss, excepting from delay in market realizations, on the local pineapple pack for Germany on account of the war. Although canned without sugar and repacked on arrival, as this paper explained in an article on last year's pineapple pack, the pines for the German market are not in the class of perishable products, according to a statement made to a Star-Bulletin reporter this morning by W. B. Thomas, president of the Thomas Pineapple Co., Ltd.

"We cannot make any change in factory plans now," said Mr. Thomas, "as the pines for Germany were already packed when the cablegram was received advising us not to ship any more to that country. It was an order for 2000 cases, which is not a very serious matter. The pines will keep in the original packing for at least a year."

## WEST VIRGINIA YET IN TOUCH WITH ISLANDS

### Establishes Record for Long-Distance in Wireless World, Using the Federal System

Breaking all existing records for wireless communication between a vessel and a land station during the hours of daylight, the United States cruiser West Virginia, now more than 1000 miles from Honolulu and steaming for San Francisco, was today reported by Federal Wireless telegraph in latitude 27.23 north, longitude 145.10 west, the vessel traveling through calm seas with sky overcast and occasional showers. The West Virginia reports an average speed of 13 knots per hour.

The wireless report received at the local office of the Federal Wireless Company at noon today is considered in the light of a distinct triumph for that system. It is claimed to be impossible for ships with wireless equipment other than the Poulsen to report their position in the day time at a distance greater than 250 miles.

## BANK OF ENGLAND RATE IS REDUCED TO SIX PER CENT

The following official notice was issued from the British consulate last night:

"Chancellor of exchequer announced last night that in addition to usual denominations of notes, notes of one pound and ten shillings, convertible into gold at Bank of England, will be issued Friday morning, and bank rate reduced from ten to six per cent the same day. He also said it is not necessary for Bank of England to suspend payments in gold and there is no failure of credit. Bankers consider themselves able to resume ordinary course of business August 7th.




