Clifton, former postmaster at Blades, Del., near here, was threatened with prosecution by the postoffice department in Washington because of a shortage of one cent in his accounts. He paid the amount and escaped trouble. Clifton has been postmaster seventeen years. Last November he was succeeded by Caleb E. Cannon. When the office was transferred the accounts were examined. It was impossible to learn the amount of the cancellations. It is on this that the postmaster's salary is based. Finally the report of the expert accountant showed the Government owed the retiring official one cent. Notice was received that he owed one cent instead. Clifton paid the money to his successor and took his receipt.

HAPSBURG CURSE BOWS HEAD OF AGED MONARCH

was stepping from his carriage to attend a theater at Prague, he was attacked by a man with a pistol. The weapon was knocked to the ground by an Englishman. The third attempt was made in 1882 at Trieste when a band of conspirators concealed bombs in the house in which he was a guest. The bombs were discovered and the chief conspirator, Overdank, died on the gallows.

"May your family be exterminated" was the anathema of the maddest courtiers, and three times has Francis Joseph been called on to mourn the heir to his throne. After Rudolph's death the succession fell to the emperor's brother Charles Louis, who was under the domination of the less advanced branch of the Roman Catholic church in Austria. Charles Louis, dying shortly after Rudolph, the succession passed to his oldest son, Francis Ferdinand, who was, in his early years at any rate, probably the least popular of all the 66 archdukes that Austria boasts.

Francis Ferdinand was a man of quiet, inoffensive temperament, yet through him two of the heaviest sorrows of his later life were laid on the old emperor. By his unconventional marriage, the climax of one of the most romantic of royal love stories, the succession to the none too stable crown was further complicated, and anxiety for the future was added to humiliation in the present for the aged monarch. Now, by the tragic circumstances of his death another storm has descended and intrigue, revolutionary spirit and anarchy have been loosed about the head of the stricken old man living "in lonely, unbroken and horrible grief."

M'ADOO'S SON ARRESTED FOR FIGHTING POLICEMAN

[By Latest Mail] PORTSMOUTH, N. H.—William G. McAdoo, nineteen years of age of New York, son of Secretary M'Adoo of the United States treasury is under arrest here, charged with interfering with an officer.

Under arrest with him is Jesse Hoyt of New York. The latter is charged with violating local automobile regulations. The two young men were eating in a cafe on High street. Patrolman O. W. Philbrick entered and ordered Hoyt to move his automobile. According to the officer Hoyt started to comply, when young McAdoo rose from his seat and began a controversy, and then struck Philbrick. Hoyt then took part in the scuffle. Both were arrested. At the police station, according to the police, McAdoo again struck the officer, knocking off his helmet. After the pair had gotten into telephone communication with friends at York Beach, a man in an automobile brought to the station house a check for \$200 signed by Mrs. Doolittle, on which they were released, pending their appearance in court here later.

HEATHENS PLENTIFUL IN STATE OF WASHINGTON, SAYS PREACHER

And They Are Harder to Convert, Is the Declaration of Rev. Mark A. Matthews

[By Latest Mail] TACOMA, Wash.—Declaring that the prophets of the Old Testament were the greatest statesmen that ever lived, Rev. Calvin K. Staudt, pastor of Calvary Presbyterian church of Tacoma, delivered an introductory lecture on the "Hebrew Prophets" at the Christian Workers' conference at Whitworth College. Mr. Staudt described the lives of some of the prophets in the Old Testament. Isaiah was a greater statesman than Demosthenes, Cicero or Daniel Webster, said Mr. Staudt. The Old Testament Bible study classes will be in charge of Mr. Staudt for the rest of the conference. He outlined the course of study that he will follow, including the lives and work of Amos, Hosea, Isaiah, Habakkuk and Jeremiah. Rev. Robert Lamont Hay of the First United Presbyterian church spoke on the book of Acts. Rev. Frederick Beebe spoke on "Teachers in Training," where he discussed with the delegates the best methods of Sunday school teaching. More Heathens Here. "When it comes to heathens," said Rev. Mr. Matthews, "there are more in the state of Washington than there are in the republic of China, in proportion. And those in Washington are harder to convert."
