## 'CLIQUE' AFTER M'CARN, HE SAYS TO COAST PAPERS

[By Latest Mail] SAN FRANCISCO.—Jeff McCarn, United States district attorney of the Hawaiian Islands, arrived in San Francisco yesterday morning on the steamer Matsushima and left in the afternoon for Washington, D. C. He has been summoned to Washington for a conference with Attorney-general McReynolds upon various acts in Honolulu in which McCarn has been concerned since his appointment to office by President Wilson about a year ago.

McCarn said yesterday that he did not know all the subjects that would be brought up between himself and his chief, but he presumed the principal one would be his altercation with Attorney Claudius McBride in the federal court building in Honolulu, in which it is alleged McCarn attempted a deadly assault. The district attorney is now under two indictments in Honolulu, one in the federal court and one in the territorial court in this connection.

The indictment in the federal court was scheduled to come up for trial next Monday, but McReynolds' orders for McCarn to proceed forthwith to Washington has brought about a postponement of the case.

In a statement at the Hotel Stewart yesterday, McCarn branded as false the version generally current of his encounter with McBride to the effect that he shoved a revolver against his fellow attorney's abdomen and a bystander had his thumb crushed when he grabbed it to save McBride's life.

During the afternoon of the trouble," said McCarn, "I had denounced McBride in court, and he had made vile accusations against me and questioned my veracity. I thought he contemplated making a physical attack upon me and went to my office after court adjourned and armed myself. As I walked along the corridor I met McBride and told him I would hold him personally responsible for everything he said about me. He said he was ready to answer personally, and struck me on the side of the head. As I fell I drew my revolver, but bystanders seized my arm and took it away from me.

Will Face the Music. "I am going back to Honolulu and insist on the trial of the charges of the indictments. A certain clique in Honolulu has let me know that if I would leave the islands they would not press the charges, but they are not going to be settled that way."

McCarn said that his opposition to prize-fights and other unlawful practices in Honolulu had drawn the existing widespread and bitter hostility toward him and greatly handicapped the work of his office.

"And while I have only bought my ticket one way, I am not going to resign my office. I am going back to Honolulu in September, and going back as district attorney," he said.

"The Golden Slipper," by Harris Robertson made the Juvenile Bostonians new friends last night when they presented that clever comic opera at the Bijou theater.

They took all honors in this piece and new stars came out, and favorites became more favored than ever. It was a big night at the Bijou, a night of much applause and laughter. Song after song scored a big hit, and one clever bit of comedy and then another kept the audience smiling or laughing.

The biggest hit of the show, however, was the staircase waltz which was danced by Alice O'Neil and Lottie Clark. It was danced later in burlesque by Patsy Henry and Halcyon Clark, and in each case the applause was terrific.

The staircase waltz is some dance! It differs in a score of ways from the tango and is infinitely more graceful, and perhaps more difficult. Reports from New York state that this dance has supplanted all others in that city in the point of popularity.

It was very pretty as danced last night and was well worth seeing, whether one takes the pro or the con side of the dance debate.

Alice O'Neil appeared in an evening suit, Lottie Clark in short skirts. As the orchestra played a waltz, the two dancers spun gracefully around, and slowly, in perfect time and without awkward movement, ascended the stairs, waiting the while. And then down again as the audience broke into applause. They were encored many times, and hence many times they ascended and descended the stairs.

Just before the dance, while singing "Every Little Movement," "Billie" O'Neill, Thom Hellen, Halcyon Clark, Patsy Henry, Dodie Canfield, and Ina Mitchell, executed a very pretty dance together.

"Stubby" Myling was clever as an affectionate maid, and Dodie Canfield made a big hit in a comedy part as the clerk of the hotel. Ina Mitchell was charming as the companion of the opera singer.

Every one of the favorites sang one or more songs. Without exceptions, they did so successfully and won a large amount of applause. All things combined beautifully last night to make the comic opera a big hit, and a hit it was beyond question.

## CHAMBER MEMBERS INVITED TO THE MARCONI OPENING

The members of the Chamber of Commerce of Honolulu have been invited to attend in a body the reception which is being planned to mark the opening early in September of the Marconi Wireless Company's stations on Oahu. The invitation was read at an adjourned meeting of the board of directors of the chamber yesterday afternoon, at which time a vote of thanks was accorded the company. Plans for a celebration to mark the opening of the stations have been under way for some time, the event to take place at Kahuku.

A motion was made and passed authorizing the secretary to publish each month an official gazette containing items of interest to the local business community and announcements of meetings, etc., for free distribution among the members and to send to the chamber's foreign exchange list. Another motion was passed to the effect that the payment of dues by members shall begin with the month next succeeding their election. The resignation of Albert Waterhouse as a member of the agricultural committee was accepted, and a vote of thanks tendered him for services rendered. The committee on territorial affairs and the president were delegated to investigate the matter of the selection of the chamber's representatives at the third annual civic convention, to be held at Wailuku, Maui, October 3 to 5, and also to take up the matter of the chamber's share in the program.

## MARCONI EXPERTS REACH HONOLULU FOR BIG OPENING

Albert H. Ginman, Pacific Coast manager of the Marconi Wireless Company, and C. H. Taylor, chief engineer of the company, were arrivals in the S. S. Mongolia this morning.

Messrs. Ginman and Taylor are in Honolulu for the opening of the local Marconi plants, the former shortly before leaving the coast stating that he expected the company to be handling business out of Oahu within the next month. It is possible, he stated this morning, that after an investigation of the local field he may come to the conclusion that the plants at Kahuku and Koko Head can be opened at an earlier date.

While in Honolulu Messrs. Ginman and Taylor will make a thorough inspection of the new plants, the opening of which will complete the initial link in the chain of Marconi wireless communication around the world.

Mr. Taylor has made a prior visit to Honolulu, where he made a number of friends who are glad to welcome him on his return to this city.

## COLONIAL POSSESSIONS OF COUNTRIES ENGAGED IN EUROPEAN TROUBLE

[Associated Press] Four out of the six powers of Europe which today threaten to engage in warfare have colonial possessions, protectorates and dependencies scattered all over the world.

Austria-Hungary and Russia have no colonial possessions, though the Russian empire stretches through the continents of Europe and Asia and presents a long coast line on the northern Pacific. Of the others, Great Britain has colonies and protectorates the world over; France has colonies and protectorates in Africa, India, China, in South America, in the West Indies, in the north Atlantic, and in the Pacific and Indian oceans; Germany has colonial possessions in Africa, in China, and in the Pacific ocean, and Italy has dependencies in Africa and a concession in China.

England's vast empires, India, Canada and Australia's her holdings on the Malay Peninsula; her colonies in Africa, and her fortified positions in the Mediterranean, Gibraltar and Malta, put her at the head of the colony-holding nations of the world; they also increase the field of her protective operations in case she becomes involved in war with Austria-Hungary and Germany, and possibly with Italy.

Many of the minor holdings of the four powers with colonial possessions to defend are themselves without military strength. In many cases the protecting power has only very small garrisons on shore, amounting to nothing more than local police forces. This is particularly true in Africa, outside of the French and British colonies, in the Pacific ocean and in American waters.

The continent of Africa presents a notable picture of the juxtaposition of protectorates and colonies belonging to Great Britain, France and Germany.

France has a protectorate over Morocco, and her Algerian possessions, facing the Mediterranean, are bounded on the east by Tripoli, a dependency of Italy. Then comes Egypt, where British interests are paramount. On the Red Sea and contiguous to Egypt, is the Italian dependency of Eritrea. Coming down the east coast are British Somaliland, Italian Somaliland, British East Africa, German East Africa, Portuguese East Africa, and then British South Africa, embracing Rhodesia, the Transvaal, the Orange River Colony, Natal, and the Cape of Good Hope. On the west, contiguous in the order named, are German Southwest Africa, Portuguese West Africa, the Congo State, belonging to Belgium; the French Congo; Kamerun, belonging to Germany; the Niger Territories, a protectorate of Great Britain; French West Africa; Togoland, belonging to Germany; the Gold Coast, a British colony, and the Ivory Coast, annexed by France twenty years ago.
