## LONG TIME NECESSARY TO COUNT INHERITANCE TAX OF IRWIN ESTATE

If you don't believe it, count 'em—four hundred twenty-two thousand one hundred thirty-nine dollars, a two-bit piece, a silver dime, two Buffalo nickles and four copper pennies, one of the latter green from old age.

That's the amount of inheritance tax yesterday paid by the Mercantile National Bank of San Francisco for the estate of the late William G. Irwin to John E. McDougald, the city treasurer. Incidentally those \$422,139 and a few odd cents represent the largest individual inheritance tax ever paid in the history of this city or California.

Irwin was one of the several Hawaiian so-called "sugar kings." When he landed at Honolulu, at a time when it was not such a fashionable resort as it is today, he was worth just 100 cents. When he died, which was recently, he left a fortune variously estimated at between twelve and fifteen million dollars.

But to return to the inheritance tax counting the dollars.

If you insist upon counting those dollars first take a few things into consideration.

In the first place, if you are so familiar with money that you can count rapidly, it would take 7035 minutes to count the \$422,139, to say nothing of the dime, two Buffalo nickles and four copper pennies, if you can handle silver dollars at the rate of one a second.

Those 7035 minutes mean 117 and a fraction hours, or about four days and twenty hours.

That does not include time in which to sleep or eat.

Then take another angle of the financial situation.

Place those dollars, one on top of another. To place the last one on the top you will need an aeroplane to accomplish the feat. But when the last one has been placed in position you will find that you have a silver column 3547 feet high.

That is some feet above the highest elevation in San Francisco.

If you have an idea that you can lift the William G. Irwin inheritance tax—that is, in silver dollars—you have another guess coming. Those 422,139 dollars, not counting the two-bit piece, the dime, two Buffalo nick-

els and four copper one-cent pieces—will weigh a little more than 26,383 pounds. That is something in excess of thirteen tons.

You could more than carpet your house with those pieces of white metal. Sixty-four of them, laid edge to edge in the form of a square, would cover about a square foot. The 422,139 would more than cover an average city lot. There would be enough left to cover the kitchen of your apartment, extend out into the living room, from the parlor spread into the private hall, and from there extend down the stairway—no matter how high up your apartment might be—far out into the street and down past the corner grocery.

All this money was transferred from the Mercantile National Bank to the coffers under the immediate jurisdiction of City Treasurer McDougald. The dollars were accompanied by an armed guard of half a dozen resolute-looking men.

## UNREST PLAINLY SHOWS IN CHINA, SAYS COAST NEWS

SAN FRANCISCO.—With telegrams from all parts of the United States pouring into the headquarters of General Hwong Hsing, exiled revolutionary Chinese leader, at 381 Clay street, urging him to come and address meetings of the Chinese Nationalist League of America, an affiliation of the six companies came yesterday a telegram from official sources in Shanghai stating that the military forces of the province of Hupeh were preparing to rebel against the government. The advice stated that President Yuan had declared martial law and that unless he could suppress the uprising at once the situation would be critical.

Hupeh, situated in Central China, with a situation of 70,000,000 people, as explained at Nationalist headquarters, is where the first revolution started fifteen years ago. It is described as the most important province in China from a military standpoint. Its geographical position, between the provinces to the north and the south gives it a strategic position capable of controlling the movement of troops of the entire republic.

**Situation Critical.**

The advice accredited as coming direct from President Yuan through an authorized correspondent at Shanghai, states that the president looks upon the threatened rebellion in Hupeh as a critical situation and one which must be controlled immediately if he is to hold the balance of power and suppress the revolution already started in the two southern provinces.

"With rebels in control of Hupeh the railroads and other means of transportation will fall into their hands," said Wong Hock Yue of the Six Companies and Nationalist League yesterday. "If Yuan's forces would advance it would mean probably the most serious and destructive war that China has seen in modern times."

"Hupeh borders on the province of Human, with 20,000,000 people, where soldiers in the past four or five days have rebelled in four different military districts. The situation is indeed becoming critical, from a government standpoint, but it does not surprise us. We expected it."

General Hwong Hsing refuted the charges made by S. C. Shu, Chinese Consul-General at San Francisco, in effect that he was a grafter. He said: "No money was passed through my hands in the past fifteen years, since the first revolution. During my present visit to America all money raised through my efforts in the United States, goes directly to the treasurer of the Nationalist League in China. I am here solely on a patriotic mission to visit the Chinese and address them and when the time comes for me to return to China and fight, I will fight."

**Sells Estate to Help Cause.**

"I sold my estate in China fifteen years ago, and that sum was devoted to the cause of free China. I stand on my own record. I laugh at the charges of graft."

Hwong said that he expected to start on a tour of Central and Southern Cal-

ifornia August 9th. His first stop will be Stockton, then Fresno, then Bakersfield and Los Angeles. Until that time he has engagements here and in nearby communities. He has engagements all over the United States he says.

Consul-General Shu stated that he was expecting to hear from his minister at Washington, D. C., on the diplomatic question as to whether Hwong and his party had a right to come here as exiles and incite a revolution against a friendly power.

"I am keeping our minister informed as to what takes place here," he said. "It is not for me to advise him but I am informed that the minister has, or soon will, lay the question before Secretary Bryan and President Wilson. I believe the situation is not as serious as reported here or in China. Speaking for San Francisco, I can say that the young Chinese are very much excited."

Advices from Washington last night are that Assistant Commissioner of Immigration Larned, says no request to deport Hwong Hsing has yet been received from the Chinese minister. He reports that Hwong Hsing and others of his party were lawfully admitted by the San Francisco immigration authorities and that he cannot be deported for revolutionary activities merely on the request of the Chinese minister.

The Chinese minister and staff were absent from Washington yesterday and the diplomatic corps had not yet been advised by the minister concerning Hwong and party.
