**MORE CAPACITY FOR SAN CARLOS CENTRAL MILL**  
 Owing to the favor gained through the prosperity it brought to the arigi- nal contract planters, the San Carlos central sugar mill in the Philippines is going to have its capacity increas- ed. Cane planters who stood aloof at the inception of the central are now tumbling over each other to share in the benefits of the factory.  
 While the directors have not yet had a meeting on the subject, it is under- stood that individually they are all in favor of increasing the capacity of the factory by 400 tons of cane a day. This is so that they will be able to contract for more cane delivery from the independent planters. The mill- ing part of the plant can take care of a great deal more cane than at present, so that the additional capacity planned will be in the boiling house. It is also intended to lay more railway trackage to reach the fields of the canegrowers.  
 Orders for the improvements have not yet been placed, as the directors are awaiting advice from Manager Bell. Planters growing cane for this central have made so much more money than was ever done with the antiquated grinding machinery previously in vogue that their neighbors are re- ported to be extremely anxious to get into the bargain with them. As the heating apparatus was installed only with sufficiency for taking care of the crop of the original contractors, it must be increased in capacity before other planters are admitted to the benefits of the central.  
 Had the facilities been equal to those now planned, the central would have been able to turn out 2000 tons more sugar than it has done this year. With half of the San Carlos crop mar- keted at 5 1/2 cents and the other half at 6 1/2 cents, there is felt to be every justification for enlarging the capacity of the central. Besides, the season was very dry, and with irrigation ditches now in operation the prospects of San Carlos are all the brighter.

**FOLLOWING THE NEWS IN TIME OF HOSTILITIES**

The following editorial, reproduced from the San Francisco Chronicle of August 11, is particularly pertinent at the present time:  
 With man came wars and with wars came the war correspondent, reporter or courier, who has never yet come with a statement perfectly satisfactory to all parties. In the nature of things his versions of victory or defeat must always be unpleasant to some people. But his inherent inability to bring good news to both sides is the result of the weaknesses of the war correspondent. So much must always be endured, and for the simple reason that it can never be cured. The real evil, and one for which he may not be responsible, is the contradictory character of his mes- sages.  
 Nothing can ever satisfy all the par- tisans in an international engagement. The best that correspondents can hope to accomplish is an impartial and accu- rate description of what will appear as such to the great mass of those who, though neutral, are still deeply inter- ested.  
 But even this hope has been denied by the censor. To give a truthful ver- sion of the writer of a message must be at the front, yet the fact of being there is a guarantee that his message has been carefully revised before being sent abroad.  
 Under ordinary circumstances the discrepancies in reports from rival sides are readily understood, and an effort is made to strike a balance be- tween the conflicting claims, but it sometimes happens, and the present European war is a case in point, that there are practically no messages from one of the parties to the struggle.  
 In such cases one is able to write of the battles just as it pleases, and the most the onlooker can do is to make reservations in his acceptance of the stories submitted.  
 It would greatly simplify matters and avoid a lot of misapprehension if readers were always kept in mind the place of origin of each of the dis- patches printed. This does not mean that they should refuse to believe everything they read, but that they should make allowances for the prob- ability of bias. Nor does it mean that the truth lies exactly midway between two conflicting statements. That would reduce the art of the censor to going the limit of exaggeration on all occasions.  
 Common sense is called for, and when exercised, many of the contradic- tories will appear more as perfectly natural mistakes than wilful misstate- ments.

**SUGAR MILL REPAIRS**  
**KEEP HONOLULU IRON WORKS FAIRLY BUSY**  
 An innovation in sugar mill rollers is that of making them of steel in- stead of castiron as heretofore, and the Honolulu Iron Works is making two rollers of the kind with the Hind- Renton groove for Ewa mill.  
 A new three-roller mill is being built by the same works for Honokaa, to replace the present one and enable it to grind the Kukuihaele crop in ad- dition to that of Honokaa. It is to be a steel mill of improved design.  
 A triple effect evaporator for Ono- mea is another contract the H. I. W. has in hand. Theodore H. Davies & Co. are putting in improvements in a number of their mills.  
 The works have the usual amount of repairs in sugar factories for this time of year, there being no apparent de- crease in this line of work and in the smaller improvements. Only in the matter of large mill construction does the depression that has prevailed un- til recently this year show its effect.
