Steamer averages more than 6900 gross tons.

During the year 1291 vessels were constructed. Of that number 917 are steamers, 319 unrigged and 55 sailing ships. They total \$11,578 gross tons. In the year previous 2648 ships were built.

The largest vessel constructed—the Matsonia, for the Hawaiian trade—was of 9728 gross tons. It is the biggest ship built in the United States since 1904. The oil tanker, John D. Archibald of 8874 gross tons, constructed during the year, is the largest ship of its class ever launched from the American yard. More than half the new ships, 677, were built for the Atlantic and gulf trade, 34 for the Pacific, 144 for the Great lakes and 139 for western rivers.

FOUR-YEAR TOUR FOR ARMY MEN MAY BE ELASTIC

[Special Star-Bulletin Correspondence] FORT SHAFER, Aug. 19.—The announcement of the caretaker at the rest house of the 1st Infantry Lieut. Colonel Robert L. Hirst and the assignment to that regiment of Lieut. Colonel Walde E. Ayer is taken by many officers to mean that the war department has decided not to adhere to the rule lately promulgated that officers assigned to duty in Hawaii will be required to serve here without prospect of relief until four years shall have passed. Lieut. Colonel Hirst arrived in Oahu for duty only a little over two years ago and while he has considerable foreign service to his credit would not, under the rule above referred to, be available for mainland duty for two years. Lieut. Colonel Ayer who has been assigned to the 1st Infantry has lately been on duty at Topeka, Kan., as inspector-instructor with the organized militia of that state. Colonel Hirst will be stationed at St. Paul, Minn., and as inspector-instructor of the militia.

HALEAKALA FUND IS PROPOSED AT MAUI SMOKER

Volunteering to be one of ten to subscribe \$5 per month towards maintaining a caretaker at the rest house on Haleakala, C. D. Lufkin, at the Elks' smoker in honor of Judge Kingsbury, on Tuesday night, outlined a plan which would undoubtedly do much towards increasing the popularity of Maui's mountain as a resort. Mr. Lufkin would have a man and wife stationed on the mountain, whose duty should be to keep the rest house clean, provide wood for fuel, and be prepared to at least assist travelers in preparing palatable food. In his spare time, Mr. Lufkin would have such an employee spend his time in increasing the size of the rest house, improving the trails and in other ways work for the greater comfort of visitors. It was the expressed opinion of the speaker that, within a comparatively short space of time, by permitting a nominal fee to be charged for use of the accommodations provided, that the income from this source would make the institution self supporting. Mr. Lufkin believes that \$50 per month will be sufficient to carry out the scheme he outlines.—Maui News.

Big Breakwater Planned.
The Standard Oil Company has had plans prepared for the construction of a breakwater a mile in length reaching out into the sea at El Segundo to make an artificial harbor where now there is nothing but the open and unprotected sea. The proposed breakwater will cost at least \$500,000, but it is an absolutely vital necessity if the El Segundo refinery is to ship its products freely abroad, or if the port is ever to be made a calling point for ships seeking oil fuel or a commercial port for any purpose. Business cannot be done without it, and the company cannot afford to wait upon the government to do anything.

Cut Rates to Hold Business.
The rate war in the Far Eastern trade seems to get keener and keener, owing to the tactics of the Rickmers Line, of Hamburg. The policy of the Rickmers management appears to be to quote rates just below those of the Conference Lines, and the latter as soon as they hear of the "cuts" reduce their rates accordingly. The position at Liverpool, where the Rickmers vessels mainly load salt, is believed to be well in hand, but the intricate conditions at Antwerp and Hamburg have been causing a good deal of uneasiness. It is difficult to see exactly what results the fight will have, for the Rickmers Line is understood to have declined an offer to join the Conference and at present all the companies, British and foreign, are carrying cargo at a loss.
