

PLANS NOW ARE BEING MADE FOR S.S. CONFERENCE

Rev. Henry P. Judd, Now on Mainland, Planning Second Annual Meeting

Writing from Asheville, N. C., under date of September 1, Rev. Henry P. Judd, superintendent of the Sunday schools of the Hawaiian Evangelical Association, has forwarded the following article to the Star-Bulletin:

Last November the first annual conference for Sunday school teachers of Honolulu was held, and the attendance and interest taken in the proceedings justified the decision made at that time to make this conference an annual affair and to broaden its scope. With this object in view, the Rev. Henry P. Judd of this city who is now enjoying a vacation at Asheville, North Carolina, has been preparing the program for the second annual conference which will be held from November 9th to the 13th. The theme for the conference will be "The Efficient Sunday School," the purpose of the four days' gatherings being to bring together the pastors, officers and teachers of the Sunday schools of the city to consider the things which tend to make for efficiency in the Sunday schools. There will be a separate subject for each day. For the first day, Monday, November 9, the subject will be "The School;" for the second day, Tuesday, November 10, the subject will be "The Pupil;" and for the fourth day, Friday, November 13, the subject will be "The Lesson."

The afternoon sessions will be from 4 o'clock to 5 o'clock of each day, and the evening sessions will be from 7:30 o'clock to 8:30 o'clock. The place of meeting for the conference has not as yet been determined but will be announced in due season. It is earnestly requested by those in charge of the conference that the co-operation of the pastors and superintendents of the Sunday schools of Honolulu may be represented. It will be in line with the spirit of federation if Christian workers will take note of the dates for the conference, November 9 to 13, and not plan anything which will interfere with the success of the conference. By keeping the week beginning November 8 free from engagements and reserving it for attendance upon the Sunday school conference, the aim of the conference will be largely fulfilled.

BIBLE STUDY TO BE FEATURE OF WORK OF CENTRAL UNION CHURCH

Tomorrow Will Be "Rally Sunday" And Classes Will Commence The Fall Term

The general stir agitating school circles these days is felt strongly in the activities of Central Union Bible school. With the opening of the new year's work, new courses, new officers, new teachers, new pupils, new activities in various lines, a new and strong enthusiasm is springing up, and a fine school spirit is sure to follow. On Sunday, September 13, a full enrollment is expected and part of the school session will be devoted to registration and adjustment of classes and courses. Sunday, September 20, will be "Rally Sunday," and a great occasion in the life of the Bible school. On this date the classes will assemble at 9:50 o'clock in the main auditorium of the church and an especially interesting program will be presented, which will take up practically the entire hour devoted to the school session. All former pupils and those who wish to enroll are urged to be present and join in this inspiring service.

On September 27 the regular graded work of the school will begin. A splendid corps of teachers and officers

has been secured and no effort will be spared to make the work of the school thoroughgoing and efficient both in its organization and its spiritual purpose.

The annual picnic of the Bible school, postponed from the usual June date, will be held on Saturday, October 3; and it will be a rousing good picnic, too. Fuller announcements will regard to this interesting event will be made later. On Sunday, September 6, the Bible school welcomed back Superintendent Vaughan MacCaughy and Associate Superintendent Arthur E. Larimer, both of whom have been absent on the mainland during the summer. Mr. Larimer told the school something about the work of the great Bethesda mission in Chicago, which he had just visited. Mr. MacCaughy reported the sessions of the National Sunday School Convention which met in Chicago this summer and spoke of the general revival of interest in Bible study which he noticed all over the mainland. He also brought back the encouraging word that the latest reports of Central Union Bible school, exhibited at the chautauqua assembly and elsewhere, were most favorably commented upon and awakened interest wherever shown.

END OF WORLD WITHIN 25 YEARS CERTAIN, SAYS DENVER MINISTER

[By Latest Mail.] DENVER, Colo.—"The beginning of the end is at hand; the war of all nations is on, and the battle of Armageddon, the last battle, the last conflict before the return of Christ to the earth and the final judgment, will occur within the present generation." The Rev. G. W. Angleberger prophesied the coming of the millennium in a recent sermon, "The Battle of Armageddon," at the Seventh Day Adventist church, Eleventh and Kalama streets, before a large congregation. The argument of his text was presented in a clear-cut, unimpassioned manner. His statements were amply accounted for by references to the prophecies of scripture. In a pleasant, interesting discussion, the pastor of the Seventh Day Adventist church foretold that "the end of the world would occur within the next twenty-five years."

"This is the war of all the nations of the world have been looking forward to for centuries," he said, referring to the European situation by way of introducing his argument. "It is the war referred to in the Holy Scriptures, which is to rend the nations of the world asunder. It is the forerunning event of the millennium. Turkey's Mobilization Recalls David's Prophecy. The latest reports from Europe show that Turkey is mobilizing her army. Do you understand the significance of this move? Do you remember the prophecy of David regarding the nation which shall inhabit Jerusalem after it has been crushed by the other nations, in the last day?"

The Rev. Mr. Angleberger explained that Turkey is this nation. By his interpretation of the scriptural prophecies Turkey will shortly become involved in the European war, allied with Germany. "All the nations of Europe have coveted Turkey for centuries," he explained. "Russia would seize that nation in twenty-four hours, if she could. The battle of Armageddon will be fought by all the nations for the possession of a long-coveted territory. That territory is Turkey, and it is Turkey that will henceforward be the bone of contention in the European struggle."

According to Dr. Angleberger's argument, the inhabitants of all Turkey will be driven from her confines and will flee to Jerusalem. There they will die. Russia is to seize the present Turkish empire. The German empire will be crushed. Dr. Angleberger justifies this prophecy by a reference to the prophecies of Daniel, stating that Jerusalem shall be occupied in the latter day by a nation crushed and defeated and scourged of all the other nations on earth. "And the remainder of the war, this war, which is now beginning, shall be a squabble over the territory in Asia Minor now occupied by the Turks. And that shall be the battle of Armageddon. 'Six Great Plagues Will Visit Earth.' 'Immediately preceding this great battle, the earth will be visited by six plagues. There shall be earthquakes and pestilence and mighty disturbances. Many will die through war and accident. If you doubt this prophecy, I refer you to Revelation, chapters 7 and 8. Look about you at the misfortunes that are heaped upon us in this present generation. Famine, sickness and war. Those three shall visit the earth just before this last great battle. 'And when the battle comes, while all the nations are quarreling over the territory of Turkey, the seventh plague will fall. The period of probation will be ended. Those who are not saved shall be destroyed. They will have lost their chance for salvation.' 'This seventh plague will be a hail storm. Great hail stones will fall in every quarter of the globe. The Scripture says that the weight of these stones will be the weight of a talent each. The most conservative estimate is fifty-seven pounds. We are to believe, therefore, that these hail stones will weigh fifty-seven pounds each. Who can survive such a calamity? 'God Will Release Wrath on World.' 'This will be the wrath of God descending on the earth. The judgment will be in preparation. God Almighty will release his pent-up wrath on all the world—the wrath pent up through all the ages. God is a patient God; but his wrath shall not be curbed forever. It will break in the last day; and woe to the inhabitants of the world! 'And then—there will be a mighty earthquake. The cities of the whole world will be shattered to the ground. The mountains will be wrenched from their places, the rivers will be dried up, there will be chaos, confusion; the wail of the damned, the thunder of the Holy Wrath. And out of this chaos, this darkness, this confusion, peace will suddenly come, and the noise of the universe will be hushed. That is the end. Christ will come during this earthquake and quell the mighty disturbance. The millennium will be at hand. 'And this millennium is not far distant. Can you not see the prophetic signs about you? Can you not see that this European war in which all the nations, even our nation, must eventually become involved, is the war in which the battle of Armageddon will be fought? 'Within twenty-five years this battle will come,' he said. 'This is not my prophecy; it is the prophecy of Jeremiah, Daniel, Revelations. Read your bibles and see for yourselves. The trend of modern events is significant in every part. If you study your bible carefully and read the newspaper accounts faithfully, you will see that these prophecies are true, and that the kingdom of heaven is literally at hand.'

SAMUEL W. ROBLEY TO BE SPEAKER AT MEN'S MASSMEETING IN EMPIRE

"Not Theory—Living Facts" Topic Chosen—Music to be Feature of Program

Samuel W. Robley will be the speaker at the Empire theater men's meeting tomorrow evening. He will speak on the subject, "Not Theory—Living Facts." Mr. Robley is well qualified to speak on such a subject, as he has had a life which has been very full of the facts of life. Leaving home when a boy of sixteen to join a traveling show as an acrobat he has seen much of the bad side of American life. After several years as a show man he became interested in the labor movement and became a street speaker and organizer for labor organizations in different parts of the country. Mr. Robley came to Honolulu last

January and soon after coming here was attracted to Christianity by a street meeting held by the Salvation Army. He was converted and at once began giving his time to study and speaking in the interest of Christianity. He is now studying at Mills school part of his time and is in charge of the Boys' Extension Clubs of the Y. M. C. A. He is an athlete of ability, especially along acrobatic lines. A special musical program under the direction of Chas. E. King will be given Sunday night. The Glee Club of Hawaiian young men from Rev. Akana's church will sing. This club has been under the direction of Mr. King for the past two years and has gained a wide reputation for its singing. The meeting will be presided over by Jas. A. Woman Tourist Complimentary in Letter to Association Regarding Homestead

In a letter to the local Young Women's Christian Association, a woman tourist who visited here recently is loud in her praises of the Homestead, the boarding home on King street which is conducted by the association for the accommodation of such of its members as wish to take advantage of what it has to offer. The letter follows:

"A globe trotter after suffering the cold of the Himalayas, the scorching heats of the southern peninsula, and the penetrating hot damps of Central India goes into raptures on arriving at Honolulu over both its atmospheric comfort and its natural beauty. The first impression as one drives through the streets is pleasing, especially in the grounds around the residences and several of the private hotels. 'One of these catches the attention of the passerby. Its gables and long balconies peep out from behind a grove of wide-spreading algarobas, from whose branches droop clustered yellow tassels of bloom, which when ripened in pendant pods toss and play all day among the fine feathered foliage. 'Out of a wealth of trees we catch glimpses of the plumeria, the Hawaiian national flower in fragrant white bloom, and three noble palms as if conscious princes of the grounds wave over all. Attached to the trunks are scalloped-leaved orchids, while long pendant creepers sway and swing in the breeze. 'Stopping a moment we note beneath the trees smooth green lawns broken by parterres of foliage, plants and flowers. So those that claim a dwelling in that hospitable must have a delightful outlook when seated on these broad verandas. 'On inquiry I learned that the name of the place is 'The Homestead' under the auspices of the Y. W. C. A. 'The environment of the Homestead being so attractive the globe-trotter was led to test the interior. She found the housekeeping systematic as clock work, the table cuisine palatable, wholesome and abundant; the flowers, the furniture throughout with comfortable spring beds, ample and commodious wardrobes and closets, screened mosquito-proof winelows, and cool, wide verandas for reading, visiting, or an afternoon siesta. The Homestead is also furnished with library, daily papers and telephone, to say nothing of electric lights, convenient bath rooms, hot water always available and the free use of sewing machines. 'The rates too are so reasonable that of all the hotels the tourist has sampled on the Pacific up-to-date, here one gets the most for one's money. It will be a welcome stopping place for tourists passing this way, not the least of its attractions being its central location in a region healthful, breezy and beautiful."
