

LITTLE NURNBERG GIVEN CREDIT FOR DELAY

Despite the positive assurance from British and Japanese consular representatives that the Pacific between San Francisco, Hawaii and the coast of Asia was open for the safe and regular transit of vessels flying the colors of the Allies...

The arrival of several German commercial liners generally reported as having from the Marshall Islands, has proved a matter of absorbing interest to the Japanese.

The passenger and freight steamer Kiyo Maru, belonging to the Toyo Kisen Kaisha, has been anchored at Hilo bay for the past five days awaiting orders for its despatch to Mexico...

Local shipping men are at a loss to understand a reason for long delays in the despatch of Japanese commercial liners if the oft published statements of patrolling fleets of war vessels are correct.

One rumor that has today gained currency in this city following the hesitation displayed upon the part of masters of Japanese vessels in proceeding to destination is that one and perhaps more German war vessels have left the Marshall Islands for a point nearer the regular track pursued by the trans-Pacific liners.

The story that a fleet of 14 Japanese vessels, including one battleship, several cruisers and colliers and torpedo boats were nearing the California coast in fan-like formation, which consisted on the morning of the time the Chiyo Maru steamed from San Francisco for Honolulu, is generally accepted at this port.


