**SUGAR IS BELOW FOUR CENTS, SAYS CABLE TO A. & B.**

Sugar has dropped below four cents in New York, according to a cablegram received this afternoon by Alexander & Baldwin from its branch office there. Local sugar men do not attribute the present slump in the market to the English control reported in the press cables today, as that factor has been known for some time past.

"General conditions may account for the decline," John Waterhouse said this afternoon, commenting on the cablegram to A. & B. "One explanation is that money conditions, especially with regard to starting the reserve banks, have a good deal to do with it. As soon as that measure goes into effect, there will probably be a change."

The cablegram in question is the following: "There was a sale of 96 degrees test centrifugals last Friday, which affects the basis of Hawaiian sugars at 4.01, Cubas for delivery in New York in store. Warner was the buyer."

"There was a sale of 96 degree test centrifugals today which affects the basis for Hawaiian sugars at 3.89, Cubas for delivery in New York, prompt shipment. American Sugar Refining Company was the buyer. Market weak and lower prices are expected."

**SOUTH OF JAPAN MAIL SERVICE IS NOT INTERRUPTED**

A communication containing information of value and interest to residents of Hawaii who have occasion to send mail to ports south of Japan, particularly referring to India, has been received by H. P. Wood, secretary of the Promotion Committee, from G. H. Corve, Jr., general passenger agent of the San Francisco Overland Routes. The communication contains the first definite information regarding the movements of steamers to ports south of Japan to be received here since the outbreak of the European war.

In part the letter is as follows: "Replying to your request for information of steamer service south of Japan have pleasure in advising that between Japan ports, Manila and Hongkong, the Pacific mail ships are sailing regularly according to schedule, and from Nagasaki to Shanghai the regular line of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha and the Russian Volunteer Fleet are being maintained and provided three or four times a week without interruption."

"South of Hongkong to Singapore, Java, India, Ceylon and to Europe, the Nippon Yusen Kaisha, and P. and O. and the French Mail Line are maintaining their regular services according to advertisements carried in the South China Morning Post, published at Hongkong."

**S. S. COMPANIES PLAN TRIP THAT WILL HELP HAWAII**

Owing to a slump in business, due to the fact that the British government has requisitioned for transports all transpacific ships belonging to the firm with which he is affiliated, G. E. Benjamin, general passenger agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company's steamship lines, arrived in Honolulu this morning in search of data and information concerning the Hawaiian islands which his company will use in a new edition of printed matter which shortly will be issued.

Mr. Benjamin is on a tour of the world, and will spend several days in Hawaii before departing for the Orient. When seen this morning he said that the taking of a majority of its ships by the British government has put a temporary stop to the Canadian Pacific's transpacific steamship service. The company, however, still maintains its Seattle-Alaska service, he added. Altogether five of the company's ships have been taken over by Great Britain.

Mr. Benjamin says that the Canadian Pacific, the Pacific Mail Steamship Company and Toyo Kisen Kaisha have entered into an interchange agreement, which is bound to bring a large number of tourists to Hawaii. This agreement is to the effect that persons purchasing round-trip tickets to the Orient over the Canadian Pacific line may either go to the Orient on a Canadian Pacific steamer and return via Hawaii by one of the other lines, or go to the Orient via Hawaii over either the Pacific Mail or the Toyo Kisen Kaisha line and return direct via the Canadian Pacific. Special printed matter is to be issued by the Canadian Pacific covering this trip, says Mr. Benjamin, in which Hawaii will be given a prominent place. Commenting on the European war, Mr. Benjamin says that enthusiasm in Canada regarding the conflict is running wild. Canada already has sent 30,000 men to England, he says, and now is planning to send 20,000 more.

**LOCAL AND GENERAL**

The trial jurors for the October term of the federal court have been summoned to appear in court at 8:30 o'clock tomorrow morning.

The trial of R. E. Craig et al, charged with gambling, is scheduled to commence in the federal court tomorrow morning.

The case of Chun Chee, who is under indictment by the federal grand jury on a charge of having smuggled and smoked opium, has been continued in the federal court until Monday morning, at which time the defendant will enter plea.

At the instance of Special Assistant M. A. Thomas the case of Juan Coujacion and Annie Vierra Aguilar, under indictment by the federal grand jury on a charge of having committed a statutory offense, was nolle prossed this morning and the defendants dismissed.

Judge Sanford B. Do's this morning overruled a demurrer to the indictment returned by the federal grand jury against Antonio Silva, better known as the "Punchbowl" demon, charging him with an assault upon Police Officer Sanders. Silva pleaded not guilty to the charge, the case being set for November 3 for trial.

Aliens to the number of 12, members of the crew of the German auxiliary schooner Aeolus, which was sunk by the Japanese battleship Hizen, have successfully passed the examination required and have been admitted to the United States, according to Richard S. Halsey, inspector in charge of the local federal immigration station. One of the members of the crew, a Chinese, has returned to the Orient, says the inspector. The steamer Korea this morning brought 22 aliens, principally Japanese, who are now being detained at the station awaiting examination.

The funeral services of Edward P. Imhof, who died at his home on Kall street yesterday morning as the result of heart disease, are being held this afternoon from Williams' undertaking establishment, interment to be in the family plot in the Nuuanu cemetery. Mr. Imhof, who was a native of Germany and 58 years old at the time of his death, is survived by a widow and several children.
