JAPAN'S POLICY IN SOUTH SEAS TO BE WATCHED

Osaka Mainichi Favors Retention of Caroline Islands as Strong Base

enemy's warships by breaking her neutrality. Would Retain Islands. The Osaka Mainichi, reviewing the record of the doings of the Japanese navy, in so far as the navy has been acting in the South Seas, says in part: "The three groups of islands, the Mariana, the Marshall and the Caroline, form a triangle, and inside its north to south line lies the American possession of Guam. The American possession of the Wake (?) island on the northeast of the Marshall group seems to be isolated. The Caroline group and the Bismarck group which the British navy has already occupied, hold a very important relation north to south. If we could hold the Carolines in the future it would not only give us a very profitable base for our South Sea expansion but also greatly help to strengthen the Anglo-Japanese control of the sea in that direction in co-operation with Australia. America might object to our permanent occupation of the islands; but when she realizes the propriety of our occupation of the German possessions and also the fact that we are at peace with her and have no wish but to be friendly to her, then she may not stick to her objections. That is where our diplomats should exercise their faculties. Even if there were some Americans who are anti-Japanese in sentiment, yet they may not go to such an extreme of unreasonableness as to try to rob Japan of the result of victory over the Germans."

CABLEGRAM AND PETITION URGE 'RETAIN M'CARN'

ing gained some victories, will be encouraged. It is on behalf of a righteous cause that I support Mr. McCarn and when it is an issue between righteousness and vice, I shall line up with righteousness. I am supporting Mr. McCarn as an individual, not as superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League. Petition Circulated Immediately After Jury Action. The petition was drawn up several days ago, but was not circulated until yesterday, after the circuit court jury had acquitted the district attorney. William F. Gaynor of the Hawaiian Trust Company and Jack Milton of the Trent Trust Company each stated today that he is interested in the circulation of the petitions, but each emphasizes, as does Dr. Wadman, that this is a movement purely of individuals, and not of organizations or firms. The Star-Bulletin asked both if the names of the signers to the petitions could be secured and each stated that perhaps some of the signers might object and until their permission was given their names could not be made public.

Among those who are known to be interested in the movement are W. A. Bowen, Dr. John W. Wadman, C. H. Dickey, Theodore Richards Rev. W. D. Westervelt, George Castle, Rev. D. C. Peters, William F. Gaynor and Jack Milton. It was stated this morning that there are no real "fathers" of the petition, as the movement has become spontaneous since its inception. Dr. John W. Wadman, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, said today that, while the Anti-Saloon League has decided not to enter into the movement as an organization, this does not mean that the members of the league cannot become signers of the petition. George W. Paty, secretary of the League, informed the Star-Bulletin yesterday that Mr. Wadman was interested in the movement, but did not say that the Anti-Saloon League, as an organization, was so interested.

Those who are interested in the movement have stated that there is no one person, nor any individual organization, back of the movement. It is spontaneous, they aver. "As far as I know, a cablegram is going forward to Washington announcing the fact that Mr. McCarn has been acquitted," said W. A. Bowen today, "and suggesting that the deferring of any action might be contemplated until the judiciary department has heard further from Honolulu, it being my thought that further from Honolulu might mean a petition. I am responsible for my willingness to have my signature attached to such a cablegram."

In connection with the movement it has been intimated that a plan to interest the women of Honolulu in the signing of the petition has been disposed of by those interested in the matter. "If 50 men sign the petition it represents 50 families" was the statement, "and the fact is being realized that as much time as possible must be saved in completing the petition."

Jeff McCarn said this morning that he has received no direct information regarding the existence of a petition. "I am in the hands of my friends on that point," he said, "and I will abide by the wishes of my friends." It is understood that a number of petitions are being circulated and signed, and that later those names will be combined into one principal petition.

M. A. THOMAS WILL STAY ON JOB UNTIL ORDERED TO QUIT BY THE CHIEF

M. A. Thomas, special assistant to the attorney-general of the United States, who has been in charge of the local district attorney's office pending the disposition of the case against Jeff McCarn, stated this morning that he will continue with those duties until the receipt of orders from the attorney-general's office. Mr. Thomas' instructions were to remain in Honolulu "until further orders," he says, adding that he shortly may be in receipt of a communication from the attorney-general's office from the fact that Mr. McCarn yesterday was acquitted of the charge of assault.

"PUNCHBOWL DEMON" IS TURNED LOOSE ON CHARGE OF ASSAULTING OFFICER

The jury in the case of Antonio Silva, otherwise known as the "Punchbowl Demon," this morning declared the defendant to be not guilty of a charge of having assaulted Police Officer Marcus H. Sanders on Naval Slip No. 3 August 3. Silva was discharged. The witnesses called were Sanders, Silva, A. Ludloff, Jose Gomes, G. E. Thompson, Manuel Antone, James McFadden and Oliver Hanul. On the stand Sanders alleged that while he was "bumboating" the cruiser South Dakota, Silva came up to him and struck him without provocation. "Sanders called me a fighting name," said Silva on the stand, "and made a swipe at me. I put out my left and touched him on the face." The jury was composed of John Waterhouse, foreman; F. H.
