

CHARITIES OF CITY PLANNING FOR COOPERATION

Taking a step toward securing the cooperation of all organizations in Honolulu which are engaged in charitable and philanthropic work, and with a view to doing away with the overlapping of work which proved so disastrous to many of the bills which were introduced in the last legislature at the instance of these organizations, the legislative committee of the Associated Charities, at a meeting at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, decided to call a conference at 3 o'clock next Wednesday afternoon in the Library of Hawaii of all social workers in the city, to take up matters of legislation in preparation for the introduction of measures in the 1915 legislature.

It will be the aim of the conference to get unity of action on the part of the several societies, and to secure the mutual support of all organizations which now are planning to put measures before or to get appropriations from the next legislature. Invitations to attend the conference will be extended to all local social workers, as well as others interested in projects of this nature.

As stated by a local social worker this morning, more extensive cooperation is necessary if the charitable organizations of Honolulu expect to win out in the legislature. The conference will not be for the purpose of taking away the legislative rights of any organizations, but for the formation of some plan whereby each society may know what the others are doing.

If this plan is carried out, overlapping of work will be done away with. It is a fact that several of the measures introduced in the last legislature by these organizations failed to get through on account of the work of one organization overlapping that of another.

There is but one measure which the Associated Charities now is considering for presentation in the 1915 legislature, that being for the establishment of either a municipal or a territorial employment bureau. Foundations of other measures have also come to the attention of the legislative committee, such as child labor legislation, industrial insurance, and a shelter and detention home.

BAND OF THUGS ARE UNMOLESTED BY THE POLICE

Punchbowl District Infested; Young Girls Assaulted With No Protection in Sight

That a veritable "reign of terror" is in existence in several sections of Honolulu, principally in the Punchbowl district, due to the operations of gangs of men and boys, and in many cases individual highwaymen, which infest the districts under cover of darkness, and whose actions time and again have been reported to the police with absolutely no response from the department, is the report which has come to the Star-Bulletin today.

The Star-Bulletin has secured this information from one purporting to know the facts.

That the police of Honolulu have paid absolutely no attention to the repeated and persistent reports of petty thefts and attempted hold-ups, is the statement which has been made to this paper. It is further intimated that the peaceful residents of Punchbowl and other districts have gotten so used to making these reports and having them receive no attention at the hands of the police, that they lately have taken to letting the crimes go virtually unnoticed.

A statement comes from good authority that on many occasions young girls have been stopped while on their way home after dark by individuals evidently bent upon robbery or worse. It is also said that bands composed of three or four persons have taken to stopping men at night.

An instance in the former allegation is brought out in the case of a young Russian-French girl who lives near the federal experiment station. While nearing her home Wednesday evening, after coming from Waikiki where she is employed in a private family, she was met by a man whom she believes was a Filipino. The girl says that the man stopped her and asked if she knew where a certain Japanese family lived. The girl directed the man to another road, and told him to go up that way and inquire.

The girl says that she walked away from the man and that he followed her, repeating his question. When he had addressed her for the fourth time, she says, he grabbed hold of her. She tore away from him and started to run, the man following her. While running, the girl stumbled and fell, painfully bruising and cutting herself. The man followed after her, she says, and she commenced to scream. Evidently fearing that the girl's screams would attract attention, and bring her assistance, the man ran off down the road.

This incident, declares the girl, occurred within a short distance of her home.

From the nature of this girl's story, it would appear that the police would be aroused to some action. Attempted crimes such as this one, when ignored by the police, may, in time, serve to incite other offenses. The road leading to the experiment station is without lights, and the attention of the board of supervisors has been called to this fact.

CHAUFFEUR IS HELD PENDING VERDICT OF THE CORONER'S JURY

L. M. Libert Makai, a chauffeur said to be identified with a Bishop street auto stand, is held at central police station pending a verdict from a coroner's jury summoned today to ascertain the cause of death of Daniel Kamana, who yesterday afternoon, while a passenger in automobile number 810, met with fatal injuries in a collision with a wagon belonging to the United States army near the intersection of King street and Gulick avenue.

Kamana, with skull crushed and neck broken when taken to Fort Shafter hospital some minutes after the accident, died before he could receive medical attention.

Those making up the party in the auto tell stories much at variance. Motorcycle Officer Perry says he has learned that several of the persons in the car were under the influence of liquor. Makai states that his machine was moving at a slow rate of speed and, in order to avoid hitting a street car, he turned out but struck the wagon.

Police officers have been told that the car was going at 40 to 45 miles an hour out King street and skidded on the slippery pavement.

It will be part of the duties of Sheriff Rose, acting as coroner today, to closely question Joseph Ratta, a local bartender, Private Yates and Corporal Mangan of the U. S. engineers corps who are stated to have been passengers on what is declared a joyride.

Frank Menser, driver of the army vehicle, is not held responsible by the police who have learned that he did all that was possible to avoid the collision.

According to a declaration from Makai he was not aware that Kamana had been struck and fatally injured until some time after when he was asked to stop the machine. The condition of the injured man caused the party to turn about and proceed to the military hospital.
