The scene at the volcano is immense and as realistic as it is possible to introduce into the silent or any other kind of drama. When Nina, her babe clasped to her breast, casts herself into the pit of fire in order that her husband of the wilds may return to his "other" wife, the tears just can't be kept back.

Throughout the film there is food for thought. No lesson is given, the audience being left to draw its own conclusions. It's a problem play of a slightly different order than the hackneyed drama.

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
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
