PROPOSED CHANGES IN BY-LAWS OF ASSOCIATED CHARITIES ACCEPTED

The board of directors of the Associated Charities and the membership of that organization, meeting in joint session at the Library of Hawaii yesterday afternoon, accepted, after making but few changes, several amendments to the by-laws of the society proposed largely by Miss Margaret Bergen. An amendment providing for a board of directors to consist of 22 persons, and not more than six women, was discussed at length and objected to on the ground that women should have equal right in the board's membership. The objectionable feature was overcome by eliminating the reference as to how many women should be chosen in constitution of the board, and also the restriction regarding membership on the board of representatives of other charitable societies. Other amendments, regarding the appointment of committees, election of officers, meetings and naming of manager, were adopted.

"didn't care," and would just as soon go to reform school as not. Some of the places which Anderson believes the boys robbed are the Schuman garage, the naval dock, George Ward, Harrison's scrap yard, the Lord Young Engineering Company, Honolulu-Iron Works, Catton, Neill & Co. and Young brothers.

Brown Says Moto Innocent.
C. H. Brown, proprietor of the Honolulu Scrap-Iron Company, not only declares that every effort is made by him and his employees to guard against the buying of stolen goods, but that he thoroughly believes in the honesty of the Japanese. Moto, who is a caretaker of the scrap-iron yard and also right-hand man of Brown in handling large wrecking contracts.

"Moto has been with me for eight years and I trust him anywhere. I know he has had no idea that any of the stuff he buys as old junk is stolen. As a matter of fact, Captain of Detectives McDuffie will bear me out in saying that several times I have helped catch thieves who tried to sell stolen junk to us.

"We have all sorts of people selling us old iron, steel and copper. Many youngsters make quite a little pocket-money by picking up discarded metal and selling it. We do our best to guard against taking any junk under suspicious circumstances, but it is impossible to tell in some cases where these boys get their stuff. They never sell to me, as I generally chase them away. I don't want to be bothered with this stuff.

"The evidence this morning showed that the boys never sold their stuff to me."

MARSHAL SMIDDY MAY BE PROSECUTED FOR ARREST OF CHINESE

five Chinese, Mr. Smiddy gave out the following statement:

"Mr. McCarp says that the cases of the five Chinese will be brought to the attention of the federal grand jury at its next session. He says that those who were released were as guilty as the owner of the place, from the fact that they were behind closed doors and were present where opium was being smoked. The instructions which I carried out in making the arrest will be the instructions I will follow out in making similar arrests."

SMIDDY HAS NERVE AND KEEPS AFTER ALLEGED USERS OF POPPY DRUG

Making his second raid on alleged opium joints within 48 hours, United States Marshal J. J. Smiddy last night took into custody a Chinese who gave his name as Yong Tai Kee, who conducts a store on King street, Waikiki of the Kamehameha IV road. The Chinese, in the complaint sworn to by Assistant District Attorney J. Wesley Thompson, is charged with importing, having possession of, concealing and smoking the poppy drug. Marshal Smiddy stated this morning that he believed the Chinese was conducting the store merely as a blind. The warrant called for the arrest of six persons, and Smiddy says that he believes five of them left the place just before he and his deputy arrived. Two small rooms in the rear of the store were fitted up with bunks and other appliances, and considerable paraphernalia was strewn around.

As evidence, Smiddy took into custody one lamp, a pipe, three bowls, four containers of opium, some of the opium being mixed with yea shee, some needles and tools for cleaning the pipe bowls. The marshal says that there was about a pound of opium taken with the layout. In the opinion of the district attorney's office, the store for some weeks past has been the hang-out of a hul of opium smokers, and that the poppy drug was sold at the place.



REORGANIZED CHURCH WILL REVERE MEMORY OF ITS LATE LEADER

Services in memory of Joseph Smith, founder of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, who died in Independence, Mo., Thursday, will be held at 11 o'clock tomorrow in the Honolulu church South King street. A special musical program has been planned for the occasion, and addresses will be delivered by Elder Gilbert J. Waller, Elder Isaac H. Harbottle and John M. Mahuka. Joseph Smith, who was first president of the Reorganized church, was quite well known in Honolulu, having visited here when the local church was dedicated. Frederick Madison Smith, who has been president of the church since 1906, has become the foremost figure in the Reorganized church through the death of his father. He is a personal friend of President Wilson and an expert on social laws and criminology.
