HOW TO ACQUIRE PASSPORTS IS POINTED OUT BY FEDERAL CLERK

Many Persons Who Desire Permits Do Not Know How to Get Them, Says Murphy

“We have occasional applications for passports in this office,” said A. E. Murphy, clerk of the federal court, “but there is a little trouble experienced from the fact that many persons desiring passports do not know what course to take to secure them.”

Mr. Murphy pointed out that the clerk's office has just received from Washington a set of the rules governing the granting and issuing of passports in the United States. Under the heading “Applications,” the rules read as follows:

A person who is entitled to receive a passport, if within the United States, must make a written application, in the form of an affidavit, to the secretary of state. The application must be made by the person to whom the passport is to be issued and signed by him, as it is not competent for one person to apply for another.

The affidavit must be made before a clerk of a federal or state court within the jurisdiction of which the applicant or his witness resides, and the seal of the court must be affixed.

If the applicant signs by mark two attesting witnesses to his signature are required. The applicant is required to state the date and place of his birth, his occupation, the place of his permanent residence, and within what length of time he will return to the United States with the purpose of residing and performing the duties of citizenship. He is also required to state the names of the foreign countries which he expects to visit, and, if any such country is at war, he must state the object of his visit thereto. The latter statement should be brief and general in form, thus: “commercial business;” to attend to the settlement of an estate; to bring wife and children to this country.”

The application must be accompanied by an affidavit from at least one credible witness that the applicant is the person he represents himself to be, and that the facts stated in the application are true to the best of the witness's knowledge and belief. This affidavit must be made before the clerk of the court before whom the application is executed and the witness must be an American citizen, who resides within the jurisdiction of the court. The applicant or his witness must be known to the clerk of the court before whom the application is executed, or must be able to satisfy such officer as to his identity and the bona fides of the application.

The foregoing regulation pertains to those naturalized citizens going back to their native countries for pleasure or business.

Other interesting sections of the regulations follow:

Native citizens.—An application containing the information indicated by rule 3 will be sufficient evidence in the case of a native citizen.

A person of the Chinese race, alleging birth in the United States, must obtain from the commissioner of immigration or Chinese inspector in charge at the port through which he proposes to leave the country a certificate upon his application, under the seal of such officer, showing that there has been granted to him by the latter a return certificate in accordance with rule 16 of the Chinese regulations of the department of labor.

GAS EXPLOSION WRECKS BUILDING; MANY PERISH

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Dec. 15.—A terrible disaster occurred to the inhabitants of an apartment house here yesterday when the building was wrecked by an explosion of natural gas.

Five persons in one family, and two unidentified girls, were killed outright.

Nine persons are seriously injured and burned.

Two women and five children are missing and may be buried in the ruins of the burning buildings.

A dozen other persons were hurt by the explosion and the flying debris.

An investigation is now under way to determine the cause of the explosion.

CHINA DEPLORES DEATH OF DIPLOMAT ROCKHILL

Fort Shafter Notes

FORT SHAFTER, Dec. 15.—Lieut. Clement H. Wright has been relieved as adjutant of the first battalion of the 2nd Infantry and has been assigned to Company B of the regiment for duty. Lieut. Wright has been relieved from the specified duty by reason of the fact that he has served two full years as a battalion staff officer, which is the limit of such service according to army regulations. Lieut. Nicholas W. Campanole has been recommended for appointment to fill the vacancy in the 1st battalion and the recommendation has been approved by the regimental commander.

Lieut. J. B. Richardson of the 2nd Infantry, who joined the post by the transport Logan, is accompanied by Mrs. Richardson and young Master Richardson. The officer has been assigned the quarters in the cantonment lately vacated by Capt. Jackson upon his promotion to the 1st Infantry. Lieut. Frank A. Sloan, who also arrived at Shafter by the last transport, is an acquisition by transfer from the 11th Infantry. Lieut. Sloan is at present alone as Mrs. Sloan and the children will not be out from the states until some time next year. Lieut. Sloan will occupy the quarters lately held by Lieut. Camp of the 2nd Infantry, who as a junior officer has been obliged to vacate for his senior, Lieut. Sloan being the senior of the grade of 2nd lieutenant at the post.

The extra ammunition that was issued at Schofield Barracks during the fall maneuvers and that was not expended in the big combat problem that took place at that time has been allotted to the various organizations for use in combat firing problems by battalions. Maj. E. V. Smith was an additional arrival by the Logan and has relinquished the remaining portion of his leave of absence and rejoined for duty and resumed command of the 1st battalion of the 2nd Infantry.

MORE THAN 100 VESSELS COME UNDER U. S. FLAG

MIDDLE WEST SUFFERS FROM COLD SNAP

CHICAGO, Ill., Dec. 15.—The entire middle West is suffering from a severe cold wave, which extends from the Rocky Mountains to the Great Lakes.

The thermometer here last night registered 34 degrees of frost and the 2-to weather has vastly increased the work of the various charities and relief associations. Yesterday a score of poorly clad persons were picked up in the streets overcome by the cold and in danger of freezing to death.

The cold is extreme throughout Montana, Minnesota, North and South Dakota, where the average last night for the district showed as low as 18 degrees below zero.

POSTAL APPROPRIATIONS AGGREGATE HUGE SUMS

SEC. DANIELS MAKES DRASTIC PROPOSALS TO NAVAL BOARD

Would Put Officers on Probation Before Receiving Commissions

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 15.—Several matters of great importance were discussed yesterday by Secretary of the Navy, Josephus Daniels at a hearing before the house committee on naval affairs.

The secretary recommended some radical changes in the system of appointing officers to the Marine Corps and of retiring officers of the corps. He recommended that all original appointments be as “acting” second lieutenants, so that after a period of probation those officers who fail to measure up to the service requirements may be dropped, while those who prove satisfactory will be permanently commissioned.

Secretary Daniels also favors a graduated retirement scheme for officers, basing the amount of the retired pay drawn by an officer upon the length of his service and the extent of the disabilities which caused the retirement.

CARRANZA REPORTED IN CONTROL OF LOWER CALIFORNIA CAPITAL

Salazar's Troops Said to Have Blown Up R. R. Bridge Near Juarez

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 15.—Advices received here last night say that the Mexican town of La Paz, the capital of Lower California, has been taken by Carranza forces under Col. Turbe.

Despatches from El Paso say that a railway bridge on the line between Juarez and Chihuahua is believed to be the work of Salazar's troops, who are reported to be active in that neighborhood.

No news of other developments in the Mexican situation were received during the day.

BRITISH STEAMER A WRECK AT HATTERAS
