COUNTY ENGINEER MANY NEW BOOKS ON MAUI BARRED FROM OUTER WORK NOW ON SHELVES AT THE LIBRARY

[Special Star-Bulletin Correspondence] WAILUKU, Maui, Dec. 19.—Maui's board of supervisors had a busy week in the matter of the new ordinance creating the department of county engineer. Last Saturday night on Market street a public meeting, which was slimly attended, was held to discuss the ordinance. J. W. Kalua, J. K. Kahookole and Thomas Clark were the principal speakers, declaring that the department of public engineer was not needed, nor that the departure in county government was a wise one in view of the fact that the county was very short of funds.

At the meeting of the board on Thursday, J. K. Kahookole appeared and expressed his views on the matter. The same day J. C. Foss, Jr., called upon the board and pointed out both by letter and in person that the county engineer, if the department was created, should not be allowed to engage in taking outside contracts, but that there should be a clear understanding on the part of the board of supervisors and all concerned that the engineer should confine himself strictly to county business. Mr. Foss highly approved of the plan of the board to create the department, but thought that the one great drawback to it was the objection he had made. There was considerable debate on this subject and it was finally agreed that the engineer should be debarred from undertaking any private work "that will impair the efficiency of his department." After this debate, which considerably cleared the atmosphere concerning the ordinance, it passed, second reading. Supervisor Lake voted against the ordinance and Theo. Meyers from Molokai was absent.

Public opinion on Maui seems to be generally in favor of the creation of the department of county engineer, provided the office can be safeguarded in certain vital matters, one of which Mr. Foss made clear to the board this past week. The board is evidently attempting to wrest the new office from politics as much as possible.

At the last meeting of the board considerable county business was despatched. For the first time in the history of the board the meeting was held in the town hall. Hereafter the monthly sessions will be held there regularly, at least as long as the present board is in power.

Among important matters the purchase of an X-ray instrument for Mahalani hospital was consummated, and a sewing machine was purchased for Kula sanitarium. The ever present salary question was discussed when the matter of the budget for 1915 was brought up. It was found that \$330,000 would be needed during the coming year. It was decided that all salaries that had been cut during the early part of 1914 could be restored to the full amount, and that in some cases salaries could be somewhat increased. James N. K. Keola was appointed clerk to the newly created office of county engineer at a salary of \$80 a month.

J. C. Foss, Jr., landed two contracts for school buildings—one at Spreckelsville to cost \$1370, and a teacher's cottage at Ulalo to cost \$982. An addition of \$25 a month was made to the Kula county physician's allowance for incidentals.

Kahului store, which has occupied the present site and the present building for about 30 years, is to have a new up-to-date equipment in a new main store and new warehouse. Plans and definite specifications are now being prepared by architects, and it is expected that operations upon the new buildings will begin in the early part of 1915.

Another site in Kahului has been chosen which will be much more central and desirable than the present location. The Kahului store will be erected on the Pala side of the Claudine wharf drive, opposite corners of the Masonic building and the Kahului Railroad Company's present warehouses.

This past week Manager J. J. Walsh of Kahului spoke of the possible plans for the new store, and if the ideas at present in the minds of the company are carried out the store will be one of the best equipped on the islands.

At the December meeting of Lodge Maui No. 984, F. & A. M., B. Williams of Puuene was elected the incoming master. C. C. Campbell, also of Puuene, was elected senior warden; H. K. Duncan of Kahului, junior warden and James Cumming of Pala, secretary. These officers will be installed on Monday, December 28. On Sunday, December 27, the lodge will attend service at the Makawao Union church at the invitation of the minister, Rev. A. Craig Bowditch.

VON MULLER GAVE CAPTURED SHIP TO SKIPPER'S WIFE

LONDON.—A tribute to the gallantry of Capt. von Muller of the German cruiser Emden is contained in a letter received by a Glasgow woman from her son, a member of the crew of the steamer Kabinga. The letter says: "The Emden captured the Kabinga in the Bay of Bengal, but when Capt. von Muller learned that our skipper's wife and children were aboard he presented the ship to the lady, remarking to the skipper, 'You can inform your owners that as far as they are concerned the Kabinga has been seized and sunk.'"

PORTUGAL READY TO INTERVENE AT PROPER MOMENT

[By Latest Mail] LISBON, PORTUGAL.—The Portuguese premier, in course of a statement to the members of the chamber of deputies and senate, said that the government from the beginning of the war had acted in loyal accord with the country's alliance with Great Britain. In conclusion he submitted a bill authorizing the government to intervene in the present international conflict as and when it is considered that the suitable moment has arrived in agreement with the British alliance.
