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CAPT. COWELL'S ILLNESS WAS PROTRACTED

The death of Captain J. L. Cowell, master of the Oceanic liner Ventura, at his apartment in the Palace Hotel, San Francisco, did not prove a surprise to the more intimate friends of the popular mariner. He is reported to have been suffering from a complication of ailments for some years. Death is stated to have been caused by dilation of the heart superinduced by Bright's disease in a very advanced stage.

At the advice of his physician the skipper was induced to remain ashore for one round trip of his command to Australia. It was but a few days after the departure of the Ventura that Captain Cowell was taken with sudden illness.

Captain Cowell was held in high esteem by the Oceanic Steamship officials. He had been in the service of the company about 12 years. He had been captain of the Ventura since July, 1912, and for several years prior to that date had served as chief officer. Previously to being transferred to the Ventura Captain Cowell had been second officer on the steamer Manoa, running to Tahiti, and he was popularly known to the South Seas and Australia passenger travel.

MATSON LINERS CROWD WHARVES WITH FREIGHT

Several territorial wharves are fast filling with a varied assortment of mainland freight and belated holiday cheer following the arrival this morning of two Matson Navigation steamers.

The Wilhelmina, from San Francisco, steamed to a berth at Pier 16 before 7:30 this morning. Capt. Peter Johnson reporting fine weather that insured a pleasant trip for 95 cabin and 25 steerage passengers. Filled to the hatches with freight, the Wilhelmina also brought a record shipment of mail from the mainland, when 749 sacks of correspondence, second class and parcel post matter was turned over to the postal authorities. Motortrucks and drays were employed for hours in transporting the consignment from the wharf to the postoffice.

The Wilhelmina will be discharged of 3249 tons of cargo and proceed to Hilo the latter part of the week where 1660 tons of freight will be left.

The Hilonian, in command of Capt. A. L. Soule, from Seattle followed the Wilhelmina, the smaller Matson steamer reaching quarantine last evening. The Hilonian has brought several thousand tons of freight including a quantity of supplies for the United States quartermaster department.

HARBOR NOTES

In steaming for Kauai this evening the W. G. Hall will carry passengers, mail and freight for Abukini and Nawiliwili.

C. P. Morse was advised today that the American-Hawaiian freighter Isthmian, disabled at sea, had reached San Diego in safety. The forward hold of the vessel was filled with water.

Activity along the waterfront this morning centered at the navy wharves when the United States submarine tender Alert was shifted from Pier 5A to Pier 5, with the assistance of tugs and launches.

A cable received at the agency of Castle & Cooke announced the departure of the Toyo Kisen Kaisha liner Tenyo Maru from San Francisco for Honolulu at 1:45 o'clock on Saturday afternoon.

The Matson steamer Hyades has been supplied with 1500 tons of molasses during its stay at Honolulu. The vessel is today reported at Kahului, where a quantity of sugar for the coast refineries is going on board.

With a large general cargo from the east coast of the United States by the way of Panama, San Pedro and San Francisco the American-Hawaiian freighter Arizona is due at Honolulu January 4, according to advices received today.

The freighter Washingtonian has been despatched for Port Allen and from there will proceed to Hilo. The vessel will leave the islands with about 900 tons of sugar, steaming from Hilo for Panama canal and Delaware Breakwater on December 23.

JUDGE CLEMONS ORDERS SALE OF JESSIE FREMONT

Pearling Vessel to Be Disposed of to Pay Claims Which Are Due to Seamen

The last chapter in a sea romance which had its beginning in San Diego some two months ago, came to a close in the federal court this morning when Judge Charles F. Clemons issued an order providing for the sale of the schooner Jessie Fremont, which played a prominent part in a pearling expedition of short duration, to settle the claims of wages of Charles Howard, S. R. Palmer and Arthur Heide, which they set forth in a suit weeks ago.

In the court's order it is set forth that the libellee—the alleged owner of the vessel, now residing in San Diego—shall pay to the libellants \$10,000 and also costs of the suit. The alleged owner today failed to answer the petition filed by the libellants, and for this reason the vessel was ordered sold. From the proceeds of the sale of the vessel, which will be disposed of at auction by the marshal within three days, Howard will receive \$164.33, Palmer, \$123.50 and Heide, \$123.50. George Davis, proctor for the libellants, will receive \$100. As an intervenor in the suit, Ada B. Frair, wife of the captain of the Jessie Fremont, will receive \$99. Testimony given by Mrs. Frair was to the effect that she shipped on the vessel as cook.

C. H. Jones, another intervenor who, it is alleged, was under contract to provision the vessel at Honolulu, was allowed nothing. The court stated that, in its opinion, Jones' liability to live up to his contract at Honolulu was the cause of the abandonment of the pearling expedition to the Admiralty islands.

American-Hawaiian Lands Big Charter

For making three round trips between New York and Europe, the American-Hawaiian liner Missouri will carry for her owners something like \$7,000. She has been chartered to carry horses across the Atlantic. The charter rate is reported to be \$1400 a day, and she will make three voyages. It will take a steamer of her type about 5 1/2 days to complete the passage one way, or 17 days for the round trip. Her run from New York to Europe and back again will net a sum of about \$23,800 each trip. The time given does not include that consumed at each end of the line in taking on the animals and disembarking them. The reason believed to be among the highest paid for tonnage this year.

The Missouri has made several trips to the Coast, calling at San Francisco and Puget Sound. She is one of the largest of the fleet belonging to the American-Hawaiian line.

KUHIO WHARF REPAIRS TO COMMENCE EARLY IN NEW YEAR, SAYS FORBES

Repairing of Kuhio wharf at Hilo will begin immediately. Superintendent C. R. Forbes stated today that he expects to leave for the big island next Saturday, and that part of the material for the work already has gone forward. The governor has set aside \$5000 from his contingent fund to be used on this pier, and this amount together with the \$5000 available from the harbor commission's fund for wharf repair on that island may be found sufficient to pay the cost of the work. If more is needed later, and additional coin is not available from the new loan fund, the governor has promised to set aside another \$5000 from the contingent fund to complete the repair.
