#### MANOA PROPERTY OWNERS' ATTENTION!

On January 19th, 1915, at 8:30 o'clock P. M., there will be a public hearing before the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of Honolulu, for the purpose of considering a proposal to improve the streets in Manoa Valley, under the provisions of Act 131 of the Session Laws of 1912, according to official notice published by the City and County Clerk in the "Honolulu Star-Bulletin," issues of December 23rd, 1914, to January 5th, 1915, inclusive.

The proposed improvements consist of grading, surfacing and paving all of the streets, curbing, moving of old curbing to new lines, paving gutters, and installing storm sewers.

The estimated cost of the whole improvements is \$275,000 to be borne by the property owners in the District, pro rata on an area basis, the cost not to exceed \$0.0197 per square foot.

The plan so proposed is still preliminary only. It is the desire of the Manoa Improvement Club to give its earnest cooperation in carrying into effect a final plan which will have the approval of the largest number of persons interested. Every owner interested should help to formulate the plan.

You are therefore invited to attend an open, preliminary general meeting of all property owners in Manoa District No. 1, to be held under the auspices of the Manoa Improvement Club at the club house of the Manoa Tennis Club in Manoa Valley on the evening of Thursday, January 14, 1915, at 7:45 o'clock P. M.

You are further urged to come forward at this Valley meeting on January 14, and make known any suggestions, criticisms, or objections you may think well to make, and have them fully discussed. There may be errors affecting your own particular property. Look at your deeds and maps and note the areas called for, and compare them with the areas shown in the list of owners as officially filed. The executive committee of the Club will have a complete and exact duplicate of the official records and plans for your reference. The Committee will see that errors are corrected.

## BERLIN CROWDS THROUGH 'MOVIES' FOR WAR NEWS

[By Latent Mail] COPENHAGEN, Denmark.—A man who recently saw a moving picture show in Germany describes the performance as follows:

A picture of the Kaiser standing with field glasses in the trenches. Delirious enthusiasm. The picture had to be shown over and over again. On the screen a hand writes the latest war news: "An English battleship, believed to be the Warrior, was this morning off Dover torpedoed by a German submarine and sunk. The catastrophe lasted only some few minutes and all efforts to save lives were hopeless."

The next picture: Prince Henry of Prussia, the Kaiser's brother, standing in the uniform of an admiral on the bridge. The audience sings the "Weicht am Rhein." The hand appears again on the screen and writes the following telegram: "At the battle at Soissons our soldiers have taken 27,000 English prisoners. They threw down their guns and cried for bread."

Next picture: The Crown Prince on horseback. A rather subdued applause followed. On the screen the hand thereupon writes: "A German squadron has this morning reached Ireland; sailors have made a landing in the town (name not permitted by censor)." The audience gets up and sings "Deutschland, Deutschland, Ueber Alles!"

Next telegram: "King George of England has been out shooting partridges and contracted a cold. The King has been laid up, but it is understood that the King in the course of some few days will be able again to take part in the deer hunting about Windsor." Wild laughter, and the portrait of the King is shown in hunting costume.

Next picture: The Czar in evening dress. On the screen the hand writes: "The Czar of Russia made a false step at the dance last night at the Winter Palace in St. Petersburg. Following the advice of specialists the Czar will spend the winter at a mild climate to recuperate."

The next picture: King Albert in military uniform. Deep silence; one could almost hear a pin drop on the floor.

Then my playgoer had enough and left the show.

### AMERICA'S APPLE CROP FIFTY MILLION BARRELS

America's apple crop, at a reasonable estimate this year will approximate 50,000,000 barrels. This sized crop would furnish one-half barrel, or 150 apples, for each member of our population. An apple a day eaten cut of hand by Uncle Samuel's family from October to March would consume our entire crop. This makes no allowance for pie, apple sauce and baked apples.

Our normal export of apples is about 2,000,000 barrels, so should no apples go abroad this year we can each be allowed a half-dozen more, 156 apples per capita. Really our apple market should not suffer if those six apples are kept at home.—Farm and Fireside.
