11,000 TONS OF SUGAR SENT TO EAST COAST

Eleven thousand tons of sugar, the largest shipment of the year, was taken by the Arizonan, which sailed yesterday from Hilo for the Atlantic coast by way of the Panama Canal. This shipment is for New York and Philadelphia delivery.

The United Fruit Company's wireless plant at New Orleans, having a range of 8000 miles and valued at \$75,000, was destroyed by fire.
