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

**LOCAL PEOPLE IN MOVIES NOT TO BE SHOWN**

**Films Not Clear and Popular Theater Changes Bill Tonight**

Announcement was made this afternoon by Sam Blair of the Popular theater that the moving-pictures "Honolulu in Midwinter," taken last Monday, will not be shown at the Popular as advertised.

"We gave the pictures their first trial today and they are not up to the Popular standard," he said in explanation. "The Popular doesn't wish to take any money from the public without giving full value received. The pictures are not clear enough and we do not feel justified in showing them."

"It's a great disappointment, because we wanted to give Honolulu a view of the pictures and hoped, as everybody else does, that they would be good enough to show on the mainland. However, they aren't clear enough and the Popular will not show them; adhering to our settled policy of giving the public absolutely nothing but the best."

"Our announcement published on page 10 is therefore incorrect. Tonight the bill will be Jack London's 'Valley of the Moon' in six parts, and Bruce McRae, in four parts, in 'The Ring Man.'"

**POLICE STINGS**

Herman Kubej, charged with gambling, will tomorrow receive sentence from District Magistrate Monsarrat. Kubej's case will be reviewed by the territorial grand jury.

Harbor Officer Carter was called to the Norwegian steamer Henrik Ibsen today to quell a disturbance among sailors and firemen. One arrest was made following a fight in which several men were badly beaten and bruised.

Three vacancies now exist in the detective staff. Men to fill the requirements demanded by the civil service commission will be obliged to serve as interpreters. Captain McDuffie's plain-clothes staff has been short-handed for several months. A number of names taken from the eligible list have been submitted to the commission.

Struck by an automobile alleged to have been driven by Z. K. Myers on King, near Liliha street, last evening, Donde Gasa, a Filipino, was taken to the hospital with a broken leg. Gasa is said to have attempted to cross the street when the car was 50 feet away. He is said to have jumped in front of the approaching car in his excitement.

Rapid Transit car No. 18 and a Von Hamm-Young automobile driven by Dr. Mitamura, Jr., with Mrs. Hawkins and Ernest Gomes as passengers, collided on Liliha street last evening. The driver and occupants of the automobile escaped injuries. Mitamura sold the supply of gasoline gave out and the engine became stalled. Later in backing down a steep grade, it ran into the Rapid Transit car.

**Minnesota Back On Oriental Run.**  
 The big steamship Minnesota, which has been lying disengaged at Smith cove, Seattle, for some weeks, was shifted to Fort Orchard. She will be returned to the Oriental service February 5, according to an announcement made by the management of the Great Northern Steamship Company. An unusually heavy cotton movement just now setting in is said to have been responsible for the decision to again place the big craft in the Far Eastern trade from which she was withdrawn September 3.

**Big Reduction in Favor of Panama.**  
 With the arrival at Vancouver of the Blue Funnel liner Antiochos, Captain Flynn, from the United Kingdom via the Orient, comes the termination of the service which for many years has kept Vancouver in touch with the Orient and Great Britain. The opening of the Panama canal has led to a quicker service from the Blue Funnel steamers, and the old route from Liverpool via Suez and the Orient is to be abandoned in favor of a faster route and the inauguration of a direct Vancouver-Oriental service. In future freight from and to the Orient will be carried in three liners set apart for that purpose. They will be the Ixion, the Talthybius and the Proteus. United Kingdom freight will come via the Panama canal, thus arriving in half the time taken over the former route. The first vessel to come in this service will be the Moyune, which will leave England in February.

**MAUI NEWS**

[Special Star-Bulletin Correspondence]  
 WAILUKU, Maui, Jan. 20.—Unusual interest has of late centered in the matter of the homestead of W. R. Patterson of Kulaha. Some two and a half months ago Mr. Patterson, who was practically the first homesteader in the Kulaha region, left his holdings, upon which he was entitled to receive a government patent. The very low price of pines last year, together with the terrible condition of the roads in the district, made his failure practically inevitable. Had Mr. Patterson put less land to pines and more to diversified farming as was his first intention, many Maui people think that he would still be on his homestead. As it is, he was forced to leave what was one of the best pieces of land in the region.

Prof. F. G. Krauss of the staff of the College of Hawaii, who will soon come to Maui to make his permanent home here, has purchased the Patterson holdings for \$5000. This land is his own and not for government purposes, although Professor Krauss will in the near future establish a government experiment station in Kulaha to assist the farmers to diversify their crops. To this project he will under the government devote practically his entire time. He and his family now have a homestead in Kulaha and the purchase of the Patterson holdings will give him a very fine piece of land for cultivation.

All Maui people interested in the local 4th of July races believe that the coming season will be the best in the history of the island. The year just closed by the Maui Racing Association was highly successful, and at the annual meeting held a week ago in the Wailuku town hall the most encouraging reports were presented.

The new officers who were elected at the same meeting are C. D. Lufkin, president; B. H. Case, vice-president; W. F. Cockett, secretary-treasurer. The executive committee consists of L. von Tempky, Angus McPhee and R. A. Wadsworth.

The following new members were voted into the organization: S. T. Short, Dr. C. P. Darney, F. W. Peacock, P. H. Ross, Dr. A. C. Rothrock, M. C. Ayres, Judge W. S. Edings, Charles Cowan, J. S. MacKenzie and Frank A. Lufkin. This was the largest list of new members ever added to the association at one time.

Considerable discussion took place concerning the entry of horses outside of Maui and it was unanimously decided that there would be this coming year no race in which no Maui horse should be entered. Heretofore some races have depended entirely upon horses from other islands, which in the minds of the members of the association was a great mistake.

Kula farmers seem to be much united in their attempt to make their Kula Farmers' Association something really worth while. Meetings are being held nearly every week in order to help push on the work of selling Kula produce to Honolulu and other island markets. That there has been success in the effort there can be absolutely no doubt, for good prices have been maintained, and the purchasing power of the new association for the farmers is such an item that they will be able to save considerably in the future.

A movement is now on foot in the association to incorporate, forming a stock company. It is proposed that shares be fixed at \$5 apiece, a price thought to be low enough so that all farmers in the region who desire to have a share can easily obtain one.

A vote was taken to have a delegation meet with the Maui legislators in order that Maui should fully support all legislation in behalf of the Territorial Marketing Division of the government.
