## WORK OF YEAR AT LEAHI HOME TOLD IN REPORT

The work of the Leahi Home in 1914 was told trustees at their annual meeting yesterday. According to the report of Dr. A. N. Sinclair, superintendent, the home is in many ways superior to that of the best mainland institutions.

The table now accepted as showing what is being done in sanatoria is the so-called "nutrition table," says Dr. Sinclair in the report, which gives three tables based upon the gain in weight of the patients. These show that the average at Leahi Home is almost double that of the best class of mainland sanatoria, being 65 per cent

here to the 28 per cent on the mainland. The average gain in pounds per patient abroad is 8.75; at Leahi Home it is 12.75.

The needs for the future are the purchase of an X-ray machine, a new laundry, a dairy and minor apparatus. The income for 1914 was \$47,554.53, while the expenses were \$48,457.

## COURT WILL RULE ON GUARDIANSHIP IN NEAR FUTURE

Though argument was concluded yesterday afternoon on Attorney C. H. Olson's motion for the removal of Judge Antonio Perry and his own appointment as guardian of Richard Smart, the child, Circuit Judge W. L. Whitney did not announce his decision and may not do so for several days. He has taken the question under advisement, and since his ruling will be of vast importance, in future litigation over the big Annie T. K. Parker Smart estate it probably will be carefully prepared in writing.

Attorney J. W. Cathcart, of counsel for Henry Gaillard Smart, father of the minor, talked for nearly an hour yesterday afternoon and Attorney Olson closed the discussion with an address equally as lengthy. Each waxed bitterly sarcastic concerning the alleged undue interest the opposition seemed to be showing in the guardianship matter, though for the most part the argument was a dry exposition of legal questions, with continual reading of authorities on various points at issue.

Cathcart again averred that if Olson were appointed guardian effort would be made to break the Parker Smart's will at the expense of the child's estate. "Not to serve the interests of the minor," he declared, "but to serve a woman's hate. One of two results will be attained; either her (Mrs. Elizabeth J. Knight's) revenge will be consummated by striking down Smart, who is a comparative stranger in this community, or the savings of past generations of the Parkers will be dissipated in litigation."

Judge Whitney halted the court proceedings long enough to give his version of the conversation between himself and Attorney Frank E. Thompson at the time Judge Perry was selected as guardian ad litem. Thompson had come to Judge Whitney at the latter's home with the petition asking appointment of a guardian. The judge had remarked that apparently "almost everybody in the country is mixed up in this proposition," and then asked Thompson if he had anyone to suggest for the office. In reply the attorney said:

"Well, I've talked to Judge Perry and he's available, and there's Uncle Dave (meaning D. L. Withington). Matthewman has appointed him from Kailua and he's a good man. The fact of the matter is, we don't care whom you appoint, so long as it is a good man."

Whereupon Judge Whitney chose Perry, signed the order of appointment and asked Thompson to obtain Perry's acceptance and signature to the document.

## SPEED BIGGEST FACTOR IN NAVY, SAYS J. A. FURER

That it will be the speed of the vessel and not necessarily the extent of armament which may decide the naval battles of the future, was what J. A. Furer, naval constructor, told his audience in Cooke hall, Y. M. C. A., last night in his lecture on "The Modern Battleship." He illustrated his point by relating incidents in naval engagements in the present war, saying that in many cases the fast ships on one side have steamed to the rescue of the slower vessels and assisted in driving off the enemy.

Mr. Furer said that the speed and power of penetrating projectiles has progressed to a marked extent over the manufacture of armor, with the result that many countries are giving up the idea of iron and steel clothed navies. Greater weight is being added to guns and machinery, he said. He pointed out that the Lion, the British battleship which took part in the recent battle in the North Sea, is a type of this new vessel.

In the handling of ammunition, he said, it has been found that this may be accomplished to a greater advantage by the use of men rather than machinery. Men will not break as readily as machinery, he added. Mr. Furer pointed out that the United States navy has made wonderful progress in target practice, giving an explanation of the process of range-finding and other phases of the work.

## GREEN IS FOUND GUILTY OF RUNNING BLIND PIG

On the charge of conducting a "blind pig," or selling liquor without a license Cyrus T. Green was found guilty by a jury in Circuit Judge Ashford's court yesterday, after nearly three hours' deliberation. He will receive sentence tomorrow morning.

Green, at the time he was reported a receptive candidate for the office of United States marshal, was arrested on the charge of selling liquor to the soldiers at his place on the Diamond Head road near Fort Ruger. The case came to trial only yesterday. Half a dozen soldiers testified for the prosecution, saying beer was sold them by Green's 12-year-old son. Part of Green's defense was that he had been giving a free "beer banquet," or luau, and that the beer was sold without his knowledge.


