## CARRANZISTAS BADLY BEATEN IN SINALOA

[A. P. by Fed. Wireless] ON BOARD U. S. S. SAN DIEGO, SAN BARTOLOME, Mexico, Feb. 7.—(Wireless to San Diego).—Sanguinary fighting has been under way between the Villa forces and the troops of the Constitutionalists in Southern Sinaloa. The battle has ended with the rout of the Constitutionalists, who lost 200 killed and left 50 wounded behind them.

## OBREGON DECLINES TO DISCUSS PEACE PLANS

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Feb. 8.—Gen. Obregon, who is holding the City of Mexico for Provisional President Carranza, has declined to entertain the peace overtures offered by the Mexican convention proposing a plan for the cessation of hostilities. Obregon's reply was the first to be received by the convention and it is believed here that the efforts of that body to bring about peace will be fruitless.

## RELIEF FOR HUNGRY MEXICANS IS PROMISED

CITY OF MEXICO, Feb. 8.—Gen. Obregon made an official announcement today that relief stations will be established throughout the capital to alleviate the suffering of the hungry and jobless. From these relief stations money and supplies will be distributed among the poor and starving.

## STORM-BROKEN COLON REPORTED SINKING FAST

Wireless] SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 7.—Rear Admiral Howard, in command of the Pacific fleet, has wireless in a report that the Pacific Mail steamer Colon is sinking badly, her seams having opened as a result of the strain the vessel has been under during the recent gales, and that there is little hope of the liner being kept afloat during the night.

The steamer is now practically a derelict, the passengers and all members of the crew except some volunteers who have stayed aboard to keep the pumps going as long as possible having been rescued by the cruisers Maryland and Annapolis.

### GARDEN OF EDEN NO PLACE FOR A SOLDIER

[Associated Press] LONDON, Eng.—"We are here very near Adam and Eve's abode, the Garden of Eden," writes a lance corporal with the British forces fighting the Turks in the country back of the Persian gulf. "It is very hot, and the country is no place for a white man. We live on bread, tea and dates. The greatest hardship is the scarcity of water. I have not had a shave or a wash for 17 days. "We captured two forts and a telegraph office yesterday without the loss of a man. The Turks lost 40. Some of the methods of the Turks in action are curious. A favorite trick of theirs is to fall down in close action as if dead, and then, after the line of British has passed them, they get up again and fire at us from behind. "While retreating, the Turks frequently discard numerous articles of clothing, lest they should impede their flight. Before their retreat has lasted long, they have on nothing but their shirts and ammunition belts. No matter how hot the fighting is, one cannot refrain from laughing at the spectacle of several hundred men running at top speed with their long shirts flapping around their bare legs."

The newest courses offered by the association are in hygiene, French, dressmaking, English, high-school drawing and business girls' dramatic studies. Both enrolment and enthusiasm are large.

Miss Florence Gould of Castle Home recently delivered a lecture on the care of the skin which aroused keen interest and called for prolonged discussion. She is preparing other subjects on hygiene. The class meets every Friday evening at the Homestead, King street.

Miss Ellinore Tascart has been successful in instructing her pupils to speak French. She is French by birth and has spent many years in that country. The class meets Tuesday nights at the Homestead.

The instructor in dressmaking, Miss Edith Doanburg, has taken three different courses in that profession in the last ten years, the last being in San Francisco. Since that time she has had charge of many classes in dressmaking in various places. The class meets each Tuesday evening at the Homestead.

The class in English, which meets every Monday evening at the Homestead, is in charge of Miss Alice A. Ball, a graduate of the University of Washington and now connected with the College of Hawaii. The work of this class has largely to do with composition.

The high school drawing class is in charge of Miss Lydia Williamson of the girls' preparatory school of Kamehameha. The course includes landscape drawing, with figures; illustrating, nature study work, drawing from still life, free-hand design and construction work and other interesting subjects.

Subjects to be considered by the class in dramatics and expression include poise, correct breathing, voice placing, literary analysis, and the overcoming of fear and self-consciousness in the expression of one's thought. The first class will be held at 7:15 o'clock this evening in the Library of Hawaii.

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## CHINO-JAPANESE SITUATION GROWS TENSE; JAPAN MAY FORCE ISSUE

### Yuan Shih-Kai Takes a Firm Stand Against Concessions Demanded by Japan

[A. P. by Fed. Wireless] PEKING, China, Feb. 8.—War upon China by Japan, unless the Oriental republic agrees to grant the recent demands made by Tokyo, is threatened, according to the despatches yesterday received by Yuan Shih-Kai from the Chinese minister at Tokyo, upon whom a practical ultimatum has been served. That Japan is prepared to take military action to enforce her demands is the substance of the minister's cabled report, which has created a tremendous stir here.

Yuan Shih-Kai says that some of the demands made by Japan will be granted, but those demands which transgress the territorial integrity of the republic will be resisted. China, he says, cannot surrender any part of her sovereign right.

The original demand in the controversy that has assumed such extreme importance, came from China, which notified Japan that it was about to declare the war zone in the Shantung peninsula abolished and requested the withdrawal of the Japanese forces from all parts of the peninsula except those which had previously been in actual possession of the Germans at Kiaochow.
