JAPANESE IMMIGRANTS VICTIMIZED BY SHIP'S SURGEONS, SAYS EDITOR

M. Negoro, editor of the Hawaii Hochi, would have an investigation begun, he says, of what he alleges is gross misconduct on the part of certain surgeons and doctors employed on steamers bringing alien Japanese from the Orient to Honolulu.

Mr. Negoro said today that he knows of several cases where ship's doctors have taken money from Japanese third-class passengers for "curing" them of trachoma when the ailment in question were not suffering from the disease.

"When I came to Honolulu the last time," he said today, "30 of the 60 Japanese traveling third class were declared by the ship's doctor to be afflicted with trachoma. The doctor told them that if they would pay him 20 yen each he would cure them. The Japanese refused to pay this amount. I understand that these doctors usually ask seven yen for a 'cure,' and if he had asked this of the Japanese in the same boat with me, he probably would have gotten the money. I know of several other cases where Japanese aliens have been led to think they had trachoma and paid money to the ship's doctor to be cured."

ALLEGED ASSAULT ON WOMAN AGAIN UP BEFORE JURY

The federal grand jury today is believed to have conducted a further investigation of the alleged assault at Walkiki early Thursday morning upon Mrs. Merleman, wife of an enlisted man at Schofield Barracks, whose true name is said to be Mrs. Viva Tarter. During the course of the session several persons whose names have been linked with the case, including Mrs. Tarter, were called as witnesses.

Mrs. Tarter was the first witness, remaining about 15 minutes before the jury. Bob Graham, to whose home the woman was taken after she had applied for help at the Hustace Villa the morning of the alleged assault, also was called.

Barney Turner, said to be the owner of the machine which figures in the case and who says that he was driving it Thursday morning when the alleged affair happened, was before the jury for about 10 minutes. Other witnesses called were Captain of Detectives Arthur McDuffie, Detective Harry Lake and Leander Beckley. Beckley drove the taxicab which took Mrs. Tarter to Graham's home.
