

 Costumes on Sale Wednesday.
 A large variety of costumes from Germany and San Francisco will arrive in Honolulu in the Wilhelmina tomorrow for use by those who will attend the various masquerade balls during the week of celebration. The costumes probably will be placed on sale Wednesday. Owing to the size of the shipment the costumes will be sold at cost. Several elaborate events have been planned by the Carnival directors which will afford excellent op-

portunities for the purchasers to wear their costumes.
 Will Raise Star-Spangled Banner.
 The original star-spangled banner which flew over Fort Mifflin and which was "still there" after the stronghold had been bombarded by the British will be raised on Alexander field Saturday morning by Mrs. George Livingston Baker, granddaughter of Col. Armistead—then captain—the defender of the fortress. It was Col. Armistead's defense of the fort that inspired Francis Scott Key, then imprisoned in the hold of a British frigate, to write "The Star-Spangled Banner." After having been handed down through several generations the flag became the property of Mrs. Baker.
 The raising of the flag while the Hawaiian band plays the national air will mark the opening of the Carnival and its initial event, the pageant entitled "One Hundred Years of Peace." The pageant is being prepared under the direction of the editorial board of The Friend.


