INTRODUCES BILL CALLING CHARTER CONVENTION HERE

The long-expected bill calling for a charter convention for the city and county of Honolulu made its appearance in the house of representatives today through the efforts of Eugene R. Aiu.

The bill provides that delegates to the meeting be elected in each precinct of Honolulu, after they have paid the county clerk \$10 fee each. On the ballot no mention is to be made of party affiliations. To be nominated candidates must present 10 signatures of voters to the city and county clerk. The measure does not state time of either the election or the convention, leaving blank space for committee to insert later.

HALL WEDS AMOY TAI DESPITE LEGAL CHECKS

Edward Hall, assistant engineer in the Matsuo steamer Lurline, is prepared to back little Dan Cupid against a formidable barricade of legal entanglements.

Pretty little Amoy Fook Tai, Hawaiian born, of Chinese parentage, a demonstrator at an island exhibit in the Palace of Horticulture at the Panama-Pacific Exposition, is now Mrs. Edward Hall, despite many obstacles scattered in the path of true love by unsympathetic state officials.

"I was refused a license to marry Miss Tai by the San Francisco municipal authorities," said Hall, who reached this city in the Lurline today. "But we didn't let a little thing like that stop us."

Hall said that despite an attempt to prevent his marrying the girl, Rev. W. J. Guthrie of San Francisco spoke the necessary words which made the pair man and wife. The ceremony was to have taken place at the Hawaiian-plantation booth in the exposition grounds. A sudden change of plans resulted in Mr. and Mrs. Hall leaving the personage of the clergyman for Honolulu.

"I have an attorney looking into the objection raised by the state officials who would prevent the marriage taking place because my wife is of Chinese parentage. We are not worrying over the matter," said Hall.

BAHAI LEADERS WILL SPEAK ON PEACE MOVEMENT

On Visit to Honolulu, They Will Explain Principles of Persian Cult

Honolulu followers of the movement instituted by Baha'ullah in Persia more than 60 years ago, a movement of peace and international brotherly love, will be granted an opportunity to hear two recognized mainland leaders of Baha' within a few days at a public gathering downtown.

Charles Mason Remy and George Latimer, the latter a Portland attorney, are visiting in the city at the residence of Mrs. W. M. Graham at Green and Thurston streets and will arrange for a hall downtown in a few days. The location and date of the meeting will be announced later in the Star-Bulletin.

Last night an informal meeting was held at which invited listeners were present and heard the addresses of Mr. Latimer and Mr. Remy. The latter told the Star-Bulletin today that the Baha' movement is not a systematized organization and that it has many followers in these islands. Dr. and Mrs. George Angur were leaders in Honolulu prior to their removal to Tokio, as also was Miss Agnes Alexander, who has removed to the same place.

The two visitors will return to San Francisco in time to attend and speak at the International Baha' congress, to be held at the auditorium of the civic center, Grove and Larkin streets. The meetings will be open to the public and will be held every evening during the week of April 17 to 25 inclusive.

Through an error in the transmission of photographs from the mainland to Honolulu, the photograph of Vivi Conanda, another leader in the movement, was published in the Star-Bulletin Saturday as being that of Abdul Baha, the author of the movement. Vivi Conanda is a young man while Abdul Baha is aged and of a strikingly venerable appearance.

Abdul Baha explains the object of the movement in the following:

"My objects are the establishment of the cause of international arbitration, the promotion of the oneness of the world of humanity, the conformity of religion with science and reason, the elucidation of the essential unity of divine religions, the explanation of the continuity of the prophetic revelation, the instruction of mankind in the knowledge of human brotherhood, the indication of the primordial oneness of all phenomena, the upraising of the standard of the solidarity of the human race, the spread of the precepts of spiritual civilization, the reaching of the heights of the heavenly philosophy, the readjustment of the economic relations between the capitalists and the laborers, so that each individual member of the world of humanity may enjoy the utmost welfare and prosperity."

The organization of the Arbitral Court of Justice, in order that all the nations of the world may settle before that court their international disputes and thus remove all the traces of enmity and hatred. The upholding of the principles of one auxiliary, universal language. This is my duty! This is my work. These are my objects.

"Are you the leader of the Bahais?" he was asked.

Abdul Baha answered: "I do not like the word leader. I am Abdul Baha. I am the servant of the world of humanity."

The territorial board of equalization yesterday finished a casual review of the large tax-paying concerns of Kauai and Hawaii and may finish a similar review of the corporations on Maui and Oahu today. More accurate work in adjusting the assessments will be undertaken tomorrow and the entire work probably finished three or four days later.

Eighteen fine residence lots at Kaneohe, on windward Oahu, will be sold at public auction by Land Commissioner Joshua D. Tucker Saturday. The sale is to be held on the front steps of the Capitol building at noon. Commissioner Tucker says the lots offer one of the best bargains the territory has given home-seekers in many months.

Capt. Paul Smith of the immigration bureau returned to Honolulu yesterday, after taking a party of Portuguese immigrants as far as New York where they were put on a ship bound for Portugal. He brought the news that another member was added to the party while the crowd was aboard a train crossing Arizona. The newborn was named Hunt, in honor of the governor of that state.

MAN WHO GIVES SELF UP AS MURDERER NOT WANTED AT INDIANAPOLIS

James J. Corbett, killed man with the 19th Company, Coast Artillery, is not wanted for the murder of J. Jantney at Indianapolis, Ind., two years ago, say the authorities of that city in a cable to Captain of Detectives McDuffie.

The Indianapolis police profess to know nothing of the reported killing of a man named Jantney, as told by Corbett. The local officers are at loss to account for the persistence maintained by Corbett who, today reiterated his confession made yesterday that he had shot Jantney and then escaped from the Indiana city.

Corbett may be examined for his sanity.

An unknown middle-aged man fell from a street car near the depot shortly after 7 o'clock last night. It is believed that he was alighting backward. Officer Anderson, who was at hand, rendered first aid until Officer Kat appeared on the scene and had the injured man sent to the hospital, where examination showed a nasty scalp wound.
