CARRANZA HAS ANSWER READY TO U. S. NOTE

Puts Onus of Responsibility on Wealthy Opponents to His Cause



JACK LONDON AND GOVERNORS TALK ON BOOSTING WORK

Promotion methods were discussed by Jack London and Fred C. Govers of the New South Wales government tourist bureau at a meeting of the Outdoor Promotion Committee which was held yesterday at the Outrigger Club. Those present were G. H. Tuttle, L. A. Thurston, A. H. Ford, W. R. Castle and H. L. Strange.

"I came through Honolulu many years ago," said Mr. London, "and there was but a hazy recollection of Diamond Head, the surf at Waikiki and the coral against which I stubbed my toes. There was no one to tell me where to go or what to see. On this trip, however, I am seeing a thousand and one things of interest, the existence of which I did not suspect. The fact that you are developing methods of telling us what to see and how to get to the things worth seeing indicates the real substantial value that this outdoor committee may be to the community."

Mr. Govers suggested that the Promotion Committee improve its methods of distributing literature.

"We distribute the Hawaiian folders," he said, "in our Government Tourist Bureau, and they are also procurable next door at Thos. Cook & Sons, but what should be done is to interest both the Oceanic and Canadian-Australian lines in distributing your literature everywhere through out its agencies. They should do this."

"Some of the Pacific countries have the art of distributing their circulars down to a science. Japan, for instance, spends but a tithe of the amount on printing matter that we spend in New South Wales, and Java, perhaps, a tithe of what Japan spends, and yet the Javan literature is more scientifically distributed than that of either Japan or New South Wales, although that of Japan is well distributed throughout Australia; much better so in fact than the literature of Hawaii. It is not the amount of money that is spent on folders that counts, but the care with which they are distributed. We are learning that every day in Australia, and we are beginning to make a scientific study of the distribution of our literature."

AMERICAN RED CROSS WORK.

[Associated Press] NICE.—The American Red Cross hospital here occupies a villa about a hundred yards from the sea, with 24 beds, all endowed for the duration of the war. It is in the charge of a French military surgeon, but the operators' room is in charge of an American doctor, and the nurses are all American women. American women have also organized a work room where they spend the greater part of each day knitting warm clothing and patching worn garments for convalescent soldiers about to return to the front.

[By Latest Mail] JEFFERSON CITY, Mo.—A bill prohibiting, under heavy penalty, the publication of newspapers "which make a specialty of publishing stories of crimes and sensational matter" was introduced in the house of the Missouri legislature recently, says a special to the Kansas City Star.

ROAD FROM PALI TO KANEIHE BAY TO BE REPAIRED

Coral roads received the enthusiastic endorsement of Mayor Lane yesterday following a tour of inspection of the island belt roads. So "rotten" did the mayor find the roads leading from the Pali to the valley below on the windward side of the island that he has instructed the city engineer to present a resolution at the next meeting of the supervisors calling for the improvement.

The mayor said that coral roads which cost \$4500 or thereabouts to build four or five years ago were in excellent condition, while nearly all other types are "rotten," as he expressed it. As a result of the trip the mayor proposes to secure coral from the Lais quarry. This will necessitate the using of motor trucks with one or more trailers, he said.

CULEBRA SHIFTS AGAIN; BLOCK IS ONLY TEMPORARY

[Associated Press by Fed. Wireless.] PANAMA, C. Z., March 10.—Another landslide came down into the Culebra cut yesterday, blocking the canal at that point. The officials state that the slide is not at all serious, however, and that the waterway will be reopened again today.

WATER-COOLED GUN IS ADOPTED BY U. S.

After conducting a series of tests the war department has adopted for the United States army the British, water-cooled, automatic machine-gun, a large number of which are being used in the present war by several of the European armies. The weapon is adapted not only for general military service, but may also be used either with or against air craft. It is operated by recoil and has a maximum firing speed of approximately 500 shots a minute. While this is somewhat slower than the air-cooled gun now in service, it is considered that in reality it can fire a greater number of shots in a given period than its predecessor, because the time consumed in inserting the short feed strips used by the latter gun is saved. The regular .30-caliber cartridge employed by all of the service rifles is also used in this gun, which has an effective range varying from 1500 to 1800 yards. The ammunition is fed into it by means of belts holding 250 rounds each.—Popular Mechanics.

JOHNSON STANDS FOR CALIFORNIA STATE INTEGRITY

Declares No North and South Partition During His Term of Office

[Associated Press by Fed. Wireless.] SACRAMENTO, Cal., March 10.—Governor Hiram W. Johnson yesterday announced that there will be no division of the State of California into a Northern and a Southern California during the period of his administration. At the present time there are three petitions in circulation, each asking that the matter of the division of the state be submitted to a referendum of the voters.

THAW TRIAL IS ON

[Associated Press by Fed. Wireless.] NEW YORK, N. Y., March 10.—That Harry Thaw is crazy, being dangerously insane and a fit subject for confinement at Matteawan, but that his is "a peculiar form of insanity," leaving him capable of entering into a conspiracy and responsible for so doing, is the statement of the prosecution in the opening of the Thaw trial for conspiracy to escape from the institution for the criminally insane. It was announced at the prosecutor's office yesterday that Evelyn Thaw probably will be a witness at the trial for the defense.
