**SIDEWALK LAWS VALIDITY ARGUED BY SUPERVISORS**

The validity of the sidewalk laws was the subject of much discussion at the supervisors' meeting last night. A stormy debate between Supervisors Quinn and Hollinger over Resolutions 25 and 26, which were put through by Quinn regarding the enforced laying of four-foot cement walks on Kalakaua avenue and Waiialea road. Mr. Hollinger said:

"The success of the administration depends upon the roads committee. Mr. Quinn, chairman of that committee, is making us the laughing stock of the city. Just lately he introduced two resolutions to put cement sidewalks on Kalakaua avenue. This is not in accordance with the ordinance. The people will refuse to put down the walk and the city has to put it down. We will never get the money back."

To this Quinn answered that Hollinger had voted for the resolutions and should have investigated before. The dispute over the legality of the laws was put at rest by Deputy City Attorney Weaver, who said the ordinances had not come through his office. Hollinger moved the resolutions be laid on the table, but the motion failed as they were not before the board. Amendments to the sidewalk laws will be made at next meeting.

Permission was granted Supervisor Arnold to install 100 more electric lights at various places about the city. The request of Supervisor Larsen for a \$19,000 appropriation for the enlargement of the Kaimuki pumping station was referred to the water and sewer committee.

F. G. Kirchoff, engineer in the sewer and water department, was granted a leave of absence on pay. He has been in the service for 14 years without a vacation.

The clerk was authorized to call for tenders for a three-room school house at Maesala.

The bids for city supplies for the present half-year were submitted by Purchasing Agent Botts. The bids on fuel oil and hay were thrown out. Botts was authorized to make contracts with lowest bidders on the other commodities.

Miss Sterritt, superintendent of the institution, says that practically the entire output of the school is purchased as rapidly as the girls can produce the various articles. Many are taken by tourists, who desire the distinctive pieces as trophies in their eastern homes and buy while they are visiting the school. The remainder are bought from local stores, which generally take the balance of the school's output.

**\$165,000 IS FIXED AS UPSET PRICE FOR MAHUKA SITE**

circulation a stated number of times, and no one of the original contributors shall be entitled to reimbursement unless the claim is filed with the agent within one year after the last time the matter referred to is advertised. The difference between the amount obtained for the sale of the site and \$35,000 shall be deposited in the treasury as a miscellaneous receipt, and any balance of the \$35,000 which the designated fiscal agent is unable to return to the original contributors shall also be turned into the treasury as a miscellaneous receipt.

**Explanation Given.**

The explanation given to the senate and house by the conference committee, which adjusted the differences, show these conclusions:

Strikes out the language leaving the question of sale of present site in the discretion of the Secretary of the Treasury, as proposed by the house.

Strikes out the language proposed by the senate relative to reconveyance of the present site to the person or persons from whom the United States acquired title, and so forth, and provides for the sale of said site, as proposed by the house, and for the reimbursement of the contributors to the opening and dedication of Bishop street, adjoining said site, through a responsible fiscal agent, to be designated by the Secretary of the Treasury and to serve without compensation, under such proper arrangements, bond, and so forth, as may meet with the approval of the Secretary of the Treasury; said sale of site to be negotiated at a minimum price of not less than \$165,000, which would return to the government its payment of \$104,000, with interest and provide a balance of \$55,000, as specified in the amendment, with which to reimburse the street contributors.

Strikes out the language leaving the purchase and acquisition of a new site in the discretion of the Secretary of the Treasury, as proposed by the house.

Authorizes a limit of cost of \$375,000 instead of \$250,000, as proposed by the house, thereby giving the Secretary of the Treasury more latitude in acquiring site.

Strikes out authority to enlarge present site, as proposed by the house.

Strikes out language referring to cost of an enlargement of site, in conformity with language stricken out as proposed by the house.

Strikes out authority to use proceeds of sale of present site toward the acquisition of a new site, as proposed by the house, such proceeds, less \$25,000, to be deposited in the treasury as a miscellaneous receipt, as provided in amendment No. 2.

Strikes out language about enlargement of present site, as proposed by the house.

**CHAOS RULING IN MEXICO IS GROWING WORSE**

**MEXICO CITY.**—Suburbanites, who number nearly a quarter million of people, are seeking lodgment in the city with the result that provisions are still more scarce and high-priced than they have been. During the fighting in the suburbs between the forces of Zapata and the Carranzans, the modern system of electric car lines which link the capital to its six principal suburban towns has literally been shot to pieces. The suburbanites are thus cut off from their business in the city, and are also in danger if they remain at home. The fighting has been of the most indefinite character with the contending forces occupying and reoccupying villages at intervals sometimes as shortly separated as the rising and the setting of one sun.

The difficulty the soldiers have in distinguishing friend from foe is illustrated by a recent incident in the suburb of Coyocacan. A party of Carranza men who had dismounted in the main plaza encountered some loungers who were not recognized as Zapatistas. A friendly conversation was commenced and continued until someone suspected the identity of the loungers and challenged them. The answer rang back "Viva Zapata!" With that rife were brought into play and the plaza was strewn with dead from both sides. Reinforcements arriving for the Carranza men, the Zapatistas were finally driven to the woods.

Independent Texas oil producers organized at Austin to oppose a bill which they allege will extend the charter powers of the Texas Co. Receivers were appointed for the Card & Prosser Coal Co. of Lisbon, Ohio.
