COMPANY D TEAM WINS BASEBALL CHAMPIONSHIP OF FORT SHAFTER

Lieut. Lyman's Aggregation Finishes Season With Remarkable Record of 20 Games Won and None Lost—Final Game With F Company is Hummer all the Way Through

FORT SHAFTER, March 11.—The baseball championship of the post of Fort Shafter for the current year was settled decisively yesterday afternoon on the post diamond, before a crowd that filled to overflowing the bleachers and spread well out along the base lines.

Easter himself successfully hunted home the first of F's runs in the first frame, after his two predecessors had lamed out real stagers, and Lieut. Lyman had allowed both runners to advance on a passed ball.

Capt. Chamberlin's crew were there after the first inning, both with the stick and in the field. As becomes his reputation, Lieut. Lyman landed hard on a slow one in the fifth after one man was on by an error at short and a passed ball had given the runner second.

Johnson was out of place at short though his chances were mostly hard ones. Holcomb finally shifted from third to the advantage of the team, but Holcomb plays the best corner in his style and is at home there.

The features of the game were the work of the backstops on high fouls each nailing a hard one. Jackson's stop of a wide one to first and his following peg to third when he nailed the runner and Burry's stab of a line drive that was labeled "one pair or better" with a man on the bases.
