GREAT POLISH ACTRESS TO STAR
IN NEW FILM AT THE POPULAR

"Marta of the Lowlands," admitted by one of the strongest stories of faith and fidelity that has recently been placed before the public, will be the feature film of the new bill at the Popular theater tomorrow afternoon and evening. It will be a double feature in that it will afford patrons of the Popular theater their first opportunity of seeing Bertha Kalich, the great Polish Jewish actress, whose reputation in the legitimate drama has been as firmly established as that of Bernhardt or any of the other great actresses. Miss Kalich is recognized, in fact, as the Bernhardt of the land of the Czar.

In America, which she has toured twice, her triumph was complete. Everywhere she was given a grand reception and because of her success she steadily refused to recognize that

One by one, however, she saw the great stars abandon the legitimate to devote their time to the movies and, finally, about the last of all of them, she consented to enter the field of picture drama. "Marta of the Lowlands" is practically the first in which she has appeared. She is seen here in the title role as Marta, a role to which she is admirably suited and which affords her opportunity to display her wonderful powers as an emotional actress.

BIJOU SPECIAL
TEAMS TO MAKE
CLOSING TURNS

After two weeks of splendid success and furnishing Bijou patrons with as high-grade vaudeville as can be seen in any city in the world, the three teams—Wright and Dietrich, Brown and Lawson and the Helen Leach-Wallin trio—will close their engagement at the Bijou tonight. Tomorrow they will leave for the mainland on the Sierra to accept engagements on the Orpheum circuit. Each one of these acts is a headliner and has given Honolulu a treat in the vaudeville line.

The pictures of the recent Mid-Pacific Carnival are remarkably clear and Fernandez & Cawthon, who took the pictures, are entitled to better demonstration of appreciation of their efforts in recording Honolulu's great annual celebration than was expressed by the small house at the Bijou last night. VILLAGE IS PATRIOTIC.

[Associated Press] BERLIN.—In proportion to its size, a little village in the province of Brandenburg claims a record for patriotic zeal. The town has not quite 700 inhabitants, but according to the burgomaster's boast, it has contributed nearly \$1200 toward the Red Cross, gifts for soldiers and care of widows. At the outbreak of the war every man of the village paid his war tax in advance, without accepting the rebate which this action entitled him to. Twelve youths of the village volunteered for service on the first day of mobilization; 80 of the men went off to join the army, while since the war the 200 or so women of the town have knitted nearly a thousand socks.

From Capt. Cook to the Linotype

On the morning of January 18, 1778, the Great Captain Cook, sailing the waters of the North Pacific Ocean, discovered a group of beautiful islands that he called Sandwich, in honor of the Earl of that name then Lord of the British Admiralty. Today we know the group as the Hawaiian Islands and the travelers to this part of the world visit the monument erected in honor of the adventurous sailor on the shores of Kealahou Bay. The spot thus marked shows where he was killed by natives during a quarrel, on the occasion of his second trip in 1779. It is a monument to the beginning of the relations of the people of these eight islands with the peoples of the other big and little islands of our globe.

A monument of a very different sort, and indicating the present size and importance of the Territory of Hawaii, United States of America, is the 178 page, 9 1/4 by 13 1/2 inch, special edition of the Honolulu Star-Bulletin. This souvenir issue, printed on super-calendered paper and containing many color plates of the lovely flowers and vistas of this Mid-Pacific Eden, commemorates the opening of the Panama Canal and is to be the official souvenir publication of Hawaii at the Panama-Pacific Exposition. Many interesting facts are given indicating the commercial and industrial development of the Territory and the progressive spirit of its 200,000 population.

The Honolulu Star-Bulletin plant, complete in every department, is surely entitled to consideration as one of the island's valuable assets, and as representative of what the people there can do and are doing.

A little less than a year ago we had occasion to announce in the columns of The Linotype Bulletin the winning of the second prize for Miscellaneous Job Work, in the Linotype Competition, by this same plant.

In the present instance, through the medium of their seven Linotypes, the stories of the army and navy's doings, of irrigation work, of the sugar plantations, of the coffee estates, the pineapple and fruit "industry," and the many other activities of the islands have all been turned into type and then printed in this special book so that the world might be kept informed.—Mergenthaler Linotype Bulletin for February.
