## ANDREW KIRK IS FEATURE ON NEW BILL AT BIJOU

Andrew Kirk, direct from the big vaudeville circuits of Australia, is furnishing a decided novelty at the Bijou theater for a limited engagement. He made his first appearance Saturday night and sprang into instant favor with the audience. Kirk has a splendid, strong, well-trained baritone voice and his turn, which he styles "Animated Pictures," is for the throwing of a series of special films on the screen while Kirk tells the story in song. As the various characters in the picture flash before you on the screen every word spoken by them is repeated by Kirk in his resonant voice.

## HONOLULU LIKES DICKENS' GREAT STORY IN FILMS

Much credit is due the theatergoers of Honolulu for taking such remarkable interest in the beautiful film classic, "The Chimes," after the book by Charles Dickens. It is a deep story and pictures the conditions in England which for centuries the masses have struggled to improve. It is an education from all points of view. The big auditorium of Ye Liberty theater was crowded Saturday night, and much praise has been tendered the management for securing this excellent presentation of Dickens' most beautiful story. Tom Terris, in the leading role, is England's foremost actor, and was playing with Henry Irving in "Thomas A'Becket" when Mr. Irving was stricken violently ill and died at the close of their performance in London. There is probably no other living actor capable of playing the difficult role of Trotty Veck, with the touch of sympathy prepossessing in his every move. "The Chimes" will be shown at Ye Liberty only two more nights.

"The Dollar Mark," featuring Robert Warwick, will be the next attraction. The management is working the entire force to get the big playhouse in shape to accommodate the large crowd that will attend, as evidenced by the heavy demand for reservations.

## CONSOLIDATED COMPANY BUYS HAWAII THEATER

Purchase of the Hawaii theater by the Consolidated Amusement Company late Saturday, following on the heels of the purchase by the same concern of Sam Blair's interests in the Paramount feature films, leaves the larger theater interests of Honolulu practically under the sole control of the Consolidated company.

Joe Cohen, head of the Consolidated company, declared yesterday that by the purchases, the Consolidated company can give and will give the patrons more for their money. He said that in the past, owing to the competition, more money had to be spent outside of the theaters than for the actual producing of the plays. The Consolidated company now controls Ye Liberty, Bijou, Empire, Hawaii, Paramount pictures, Valley Isle theater at Waiuku, Lyceum at Kahului, Pioneer at Lihala and the Empire and Moheau theaters at Hilo. Besides this the company furnishes attractions for the 4th Cavalry, 1st Infantry, Fort Kamehameha and Fort Shafter playhouses. It also plans to erect a theater at Lihue on Kauai.

## JUDGMENT WILL BE PASSED ON 'THE TYPHOON'

A special censorial performance of "The Typhoon" is being held at the Popular theater at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon, at which time an invited audience, representing those most prominent in the religious, social, military and business life of Honolulu, as well as leaders among the Japanese and other nationalities, will pass upon the moot question as to whether or not this great drama of tragic human experience should be presented here.

Governor Pinkham is among those who have been invited to attend, but it is not known whether affairs of the legislature will keep him at the capitol.

Manager Bredhoff spent all of Saturday and some of yesterday getting out invitations to those who, it is felt, are best capable of passing judgment on this picture and it is believed that their verdict will reflect that of the community. Considerable criticism has been offered against presenting "The Typhoon" in Honolulu, because it is claimed that it will stir up race hatred and disturb the pleasant relations that have always existed between the people of all races here.

The scene of the story is laid in France and shows a Japanese in the service of his government seeking to obtain information for his military. He falls in love with a Parisian actress and their love finally results in her being murdered by her paramour. This, together with the tragic suicide of the Japanese, are the two scenes to which critics object. It is claimed by some who have seen the play that these are but minor scenes in the play and that the story throughout is clean and on a high moral plane.

It is planned to present "The Typhoon" as the feature picture of the new bill at the Popular Wednesday. Among those who have been invited to attend the censorial performance this afternoon are: Hon.
