SHIPPING & WATERFRONT NEWS

GERMAN OFFICER DROPS DEAD ON SONOMA DECK

Lieut. Carl Kutzer, an officer in the German reserves, who has been a prisoner at the Liverpool camp near Sydney, N. S. W., dropped dead on the deck of the Oceanic liner Sonoma before the vessel had left the harbor on its voyage to Honolulu and San Francisco. The Sonoma arrived here this morning.

Capt. J. H. Trask stopped the vessel and summoned police assistance. A launch visited the ship and the body of the German officer was taken back to Sydney.

Lieut. Kutzer was among officers captured by the British when they took possession of German New Guinea. He had been kept at the detention camp with hundreds of other prisoners. He was reported missing some days before the Sonoma sailed for the United States. A general search was made by the Sydney police on board all vessels then in the harbor. It proved fruitless.

When the Sonoma left the dock, Capt. Trask ordered a roundup of stragglers. In one of the lifeboats, concealed under a tarpaulin, they found the German officer more dead than alive. He was completely exhausted. When lifted to the deck he dropped unconscious, and death followed a few minutes later.

From two German companions it was learned that Lieut. Kutzer had succeeded in eluding the guard stationed at the prison camp and had boarded the vessel four days before the Sonoma steamed for San Francisco. He had failed to provide himself with food or water and was unable to leave the lifeboat because of the vigilance exercised by the police. The excessive heat then prevailing at Sydney is believed to have been the direct cause of his death.

On the clothing of the dead officer was found a number of papers and war maps. It was said Kutzer had repeatedly refused to take the oath of neutrality offered officers and civilians from German possessions after their capture by the British. Kutzer was popular with the German reserves stationed at New Guinea. He appeared to be well provided with money. More than \$100 was found in his clothing. It is believed that he intended to leave his hiding place soon after the Sonoma had cleared the Australian headlands, and offer passage money to the United States.

The Sonoma was favored by fine weather for the greater part of the trip from Sydney to Honolulu. Officers say the embargo on the exportation of meat to Hawaii is still being threatened. The commonwealth authorities profess to be satisfied with the present arrangement, which provides for the shipment of a small amount of beef if they are assured that it is to be used by the United States army. The exportation of wool and hides is carefully guarded. The Sonoma brought a large quantity of onions and fertilizer to the islands. Meat for the local army quartermaster department totaled 1039 quarters.

The Sonoma came to a berth at Pier 10 at 8 o'clock. Four cabin, two second class and one steerage passenger will remain at Honolulu. The through passengers include 42 cabin, 55 second class and 22 steerage. The vessel is carrying a big through cargo of Australian products. C. Brewer & Co. announce the Sonoma will carry no mail from the local postoffice. All correspondence enclosed in stamped envelopes and left at the office of the agents, will be forwarded to the coast.

The Sonoma is scheduled to steam to San Francisco at 5 o'clock this evening. About 80 passengers will join the vessel at this port.

Francis Hanify Leaves Coast.

The Matson Navigation chartered steamer Francis Hanify has left the coast for the islands to load sugar at Port Allen, Kahului, Kaunapali and Hilo. Castle & Cooke have been advised the Hanify steamed from San Francisco in time to arrive at Honolulu March 27. The vessel will carry about 3400 tons of sugar to coast refineries.

Matsonia Bringing Fair Cargo.

Leaving San Francisco yesterday, the Matson liner Matsonia was supplied with a fair-sized cargo for delivery at island ports. A cable to Castle & Cooke states the vessel carried 2890 tons of freight for Honolulu and 1272 tons for discharge at Hilo. It is due next Tuesday morning.

Lurline Late in Leaving Coast.

The Matson steamer Lurline is expected to arrive at Honolulu on its next trip one day late. The vessel, it is announced, will steam from the coast at noon, Wednesday, March 31, instead of at the regular hour on Tuesday afternoon. The local agents have been given no reason for the vessel's detention. It is believed some repairs had been found necessary. The Lurline will arrive here on April 7.

Nippon Due Tomorrow Noon.

The Toyo Kisen Kaisha liner Nippon Maru, with a later mail and few buy-over passengers from the coast, is due at Honolulu about noon tomorrow, according to a late wireless received at the agency of Castle & Cooke. The vessel is expected to be despatched for the Orient late in the afternoon. Forty Asiatic steerage passengers have been booked for Japan, China and the Philippines.

Adventurers Picks up Mine.

The crew of the pilot boat Adventurers received a bad start recently when they found a mine buoy floating in the north channel of the Golden Gate, directly in line of steamer and boat travel. All the wires were attached, but the men of the Adventurers did not attempt to examine the buoy closely to see if it was charged. They attached lines and towed it in to the engineers' wharf at the Presidio, where it was turned over to the military authorities. The crew are of the opinion that the buoy was a practice one which the mine planting crews allowed to escape them during last winter's practise. It was badly rusted and covered with barnacles, showing that it had been submerged for a considerable period. The practise buoys have every appearance of the regular mines.

The United States gunboat Princeton, which struck a reef and sank in Samoa waters, has now been floated.

Capt. Foster, a British vessel master, says the January hurricane swept American Samoa clean, destroying all trees and houses and causing a scarcity of food. Relief ships have been sent to the colony to provide the natives with supplies and food. There are two German steamers interned at American Samoa and they are having trouble, as they drag anchors in a blow.
