SEARCH PARTIES LOOKING FOR 3 ARMY PRISONERS

Little Chance That Men Who Broke Out of Ruger Guard House Can Get Away

The military and civil authorities are now searching for three general prisoners who escaped from the guard house at Fort Ruger some time between 10 o'clock last night and midnight. Search parties from the Diamond Head artillery post in charge of officers are out in the direction of Koko Head, and the docks are being closely watched, while towards Wahiawa and the windward side of the island a sharp lookout is also being kept. A reward of \$50 each is offered to any civilian who delivers the escapees to the military authorities.

The three men who made good their getaway are Felix Sizmore, William H. Harding and Albert Dietz. They were transferred from the prison at Schofield Barracks to Ruger some time ago, and have been doing hard labor there in execution of their sentences, following dishonorable discharge from the army.

The guard house at Fort Ruger is a wooden affair, surrounded by a barbed-wire stockade. The three men cut a hole through the board floor of the prison room and then sprung the wire off the stockade, effecting their escape while the sentry on No. 1 was at a distant point of his post.

It is believed that with the military and civil dragnet cast, the men will soon be returned to the post.

Following is a description of the three men, given out by the army authorities:

Felix Sizmore, formerly of Company K, 1st Infantry—22 years old, dark brown hair and eyes, fair complexion, height 5 feet 8 inches.

William H. Harding, formerly of Troop M, 4th Cavalry—26 years old, dark brown hair and eyes, ruddy complexion, height 5 feet 10 inches.

Albert Dietz, formerly of 104th Company, Coast Artillery—19 years old, brown hair and eyes, heavy eyebrows, complexion fair, height 5 feet 10 inches; wears a permanent scowl and is a desperate character; formerly escaped from Fort Armstrong.

MANY PROTESTS FILED AGAINST 'SUNDAY MOVIES'

Senate Committee Calls Public Hearing For Next Tuesday Night

With the volume of protests against "Sunday movies" growing almost hourly, the senate military committee, to which has been referred House Bill No. 129, has called a public hearing for next Tuesday evening in the senate chamber.

This bill proposes to allow moving picture theaters to operate on Sunday evenings. When it was before the house the public seemed to take little interest, but since its passage by the lower body the protests have begun to come thick and fast. One largely signed protest comes all the way from Maui. Many individuals and organizations are represented in these written protests and it is expected that the senate chamber will be crowded at the hearing next Tuesday night. Senator Coke, chairman of the committee, said today that both sides would be given every opportunity to be heard.

THAYER DOUBTS DESHA'S FIGURES FOR HAWAII VISIT

How Jack Desha, Delegate Kulo's private secretary, obtained a round-trip railway and steamship rate of \$11,600 for the congressional visiting party is a puzzle to Territorial Secretary W. W. Thayer, and the latter is cabling today for further particulars.

On investigation Thayer finds the rate is about \$20,000 better than could be obtained from this end of the line for the official junketing party. The territorial secretary "got busy" today in an effort to ascertain what kind of rates could be arranged if negotiations were undertaken with the transportation companies from Honolulu. He is astounded at the figures he received.

Briefly, he finds, he says, that the best rates he would be able to get would make the transportation expense, including only Pullman fares and meals en route, total approximately \$31,050. The entire appropriation for the territory's entertainment of the congressmen is only \$30,000.

The wide variance in the figures looks extremely doubtful to Secretary Thayer, and he is asking the delegate's secretary for more definite information.

One thing is certain. Unless Desha gets a far better rate from the transportation companies than Thayer has been able to obtain, the territory will not have any money out of the \$30,000 fund for entertaining the official visitors after they arrive in Honolulu.

HAWAIIAN SOIL HELPS BEAUTIFY CABLE ISLAND

Midway, the tiny island in the Pacific used as a relay station by the Commercial Pacific Cable Company, is being changed from a coral strand to an ocean oasis. The schooner Fluorance Ward, on her visit there every three months with food supplies for the operators, takes a quantity of Hawaiian soil to cover the white coral sand.

The task of building the island has progressed so far that it is possible to keep a cow on the pasture. The green grass also relieves the strain on the eyes caused by the glitter of the dazzling sand.

PUBLIC APPEAL FOR DEPENDENT FAMILY

The Associated Charities have made an appeal for John Kanapu, who now is supported by charity. Kanapu owns a piece of taro land which has been leased by a Chinese for \$45 a year, but which should bring a rental of \$150, according to Spencer Bowen of the charities. The lease expires in June and it is hoped by the family rehabilitating committee that the proper rental may be procured. The family could then be self-sustaining, Bowen says.

According to an announcement by Charles Mason Remy, one of the leaders in the movement now in Honolulu, arrangements have been made for a public meeting at the Kilohana building on Beretania street Friday night at 8:15. Another meeting will be held on the Friday evening following, in the same hall.

Mr. Remy will give one of his talks on Bahai and the meeting promises to provide means for enlightenment on the purposes of Abdul Baha's movement. Besides Mr. Remy, George O. Latimer, a Portland attorney; Miss Corine Price of Chicago and others will speak.
