SALOONS CLOSED FOR INFRACOCTIONS OF LIQUOR LAWS

License Commission Orders Five Places to Suspend Business For Short Periods

Five saloons were ordered to remain closed for periods of from one day to one week for infractions of the liquor laws, at a hearing of the license commissioners late yesterday. Mrs. Bertha Klemme, owner of a small cafe near the Honolulu Iron Works, was found guilty of having sold three bottles of beer to a man who took them from the premises. Her license calls for disposal of liquors with meals only and for the violation she was ordered to remain closed for one week.

Monday will be "election day" for Tommy Marlowe, owner of the Kentucky saloon on Alakea street, as Tommy's place will remain closed on that day in observance of the license commission's order. Rev. David Cary Peters said he saw Marlowe serve liquor to an intoxicated man. For not keeping his doors open, Jose Quintal will close his Service saloon on Monday and Tuesday.

Charles Lambert will keep his Anchor saloon closed Monday and Tuesday for selling liquor to a man on the tabu list, a man who has been found guilty several times of drunkenness. Pat Grady, also on the tabu list, got liquor at Choy On's Pacific saloon, according to the commission, and that place will be closed Monday and Tuesday.

'MOTHER' DRAMA DIMS EYES AND TUGS AT HEART
