MAKINO DEMANDS \$50,000 DAMAGES FOR 1909 AFFAIR

An echo of the famous Japanese labor strike of 1909 was heard today when Fred K. Makino, through his attorney, Joseph Lightfoot, filed in circuit court a suit against the Hawaiian Planters' Association to recover a certain steel safe and to secure damages in the sum of \$50,000.

The safe, it is alleged in the complaint, was forcibly and without legal right taken from Makino's office over his drugstore, Nuuanu and Hotel streets, on the night of June 11, 1909, by High Sheriff William Henry, Chester A. Doyle and others in the employ of the Sugar Planters' Association, who were removed to the police station and there opened with dynamite or other forcible means and data extracted whereupon the planters hoped to bring criminal charges against the strike leaders and thus compel a settlement of the labor difficulties.

The Japanese labor strike long will be remembered by kama'ainas as one of the sensational incidents of 1909. While it continued the strike was a wildly exciting affair, with developments following each other in rapid, sensational succession.

One of the most exciting of these was the arrest of Fred Makino, chairman of the executive committee of the laborers' organization, known as the Higher Wage Association, and the forcible entry of his drugstore premises, the midnight search and the removal of the safe.

The complaint relates that the association's demand for higher wages, as well as a later demand for a conference to discuss the question, were rejected by the planters. In July, 1909, says the complaint, the laborers walked out.

It then relates in detail the circumstances surrounding the alleged unlawful seizure of the safe and private papers.

W. A. Kinney, the attorney for the

planters: High Sheriff Henry, S. Sheba, editor of the Hawaii Shinpo, all declared to be agents and servants of the Planters' association, are charged with illegally, willfully and maliciously attempting to procure evidence incriminating Makino, for the purpose of discrediting the Higher Wage Association and blocking its work. The story of a federal indictment against Makino and its later withdrawal by Robert W. Breckman, then U. S. district attorney, is related.

The suit is against the planters' association, W. A. Kinney, who was the planters' counsel; S. Sheba and Chester A. Doyle, interpreters employed by the planters, and William Henry, who was high sheriff. The members of the planters' association are named individually in the legal papers.

The supreme court gave notice today of a decision answering in the negative the question reserved to it by Circuit Judge Ashford in the suit instituted against City and County Auditor James Bicknell by C. D. Pringle, second clerk in Circuit Judge T. H. Stuart's court. It is understood the effect of the decision is that Pringle was not regularly appointed to the position, that his predecessor, V. M. Harrison, was not regularly removed, and that therefore Harrison, not Pringle, is legally still second clerk and entitled to draw his salary as such.


