Choynski Thought He Had Sharkey Knocked Out, But Tom Came Back For More

By ROBERT EDGREN. This is a story of a blond Jew and a bull-necked Irishman. The Jew was tall, slim, beautifully proportioned, with the strength of perfect symmetry. His hair was like flax. His features were decidedly intellectual, showing the unmistakable mark of good breeding. In fact his father was a famous rabbi and scholar, and his more remote ancestors were men of note in their own race. Of all his family he was the only one who turned his attention to a nonintellectual pursuit. A fighter, he used his inherited intelligence to such good effect that although only four or five pounds above the middle-weight class, he fought well against all of the greatest heavyweight champions of his time. A cool brain, daring, quickness and unlimited courage made him, although never a champion, always one of the most dangerous contenders for the heavyweight title. And as was the custom in that time, he didn't adopt an Irish fighting name, but was known by the name given him at his birth—Joe Choynski.

GOAT-GETTING IS FAVORITE SPORT OF FIELD ARTILLERY

Arrangements Go Smoothly For Chinese Team to Play in Orient

According to latest information received from E. G. Redline, the secretary-treasurer of the Manila Baseball League, by W. Tin Chong, one of the managers of the All-Chinese baseball team which is to leave here on a tour of the Orient next Friday on the Mongolia, the team is due to arrive at Hongkong about April 21 and a steamer from one of the Hongkong to Manila steamship companies will be waiting to transfer the party to Manila immediately. After playing in China the team will tour Japan under the direction of Prof. I. Abe of the Waseda University. The arrangement of this end of the schedule will be taken up on the arrival of the Mongolia at Yokohama, where Prof. Abe will meet the local team.
