JURY BLOCKED KAUAI INQUIRY BY TERRITORY

That the sensational report of the Kauai grand jury two weeks ago seriously interfered with its own investigation and the obtaining of witnesses is the statement of Deputy Attorney-general Leslie P. Scott, who is back from the Garden Island.

The grand jury returned five indictments, one of these being nolle prossed afterward and another found to be barred by the statute of limitations.

Scott says that after the jury had made its sensational report and he had been called to Kauai to assist in preparing indictments it was found that many men suspected had taken warning and proceeded to effectually "cover their tracks," with the result that when men who were supposed to have knowledge of the alleged criminal doings were asked about them they declared total ignorance of any such affairs.

An indictment was returned against Deputy Sheriff Werner of Hanalei for bribery but it was found later that the charge was so old it was practically "outlawed." Two true bills were returned against Deputy Sheriff Hano of the Kawaihau district alleging similar offenses. In one case, however, it was found the money Hano had taken from a gambler had been turned into the court as bail for the gambler, Hano producing a receipt duly signed, to prove it. That charge was nolle prossed. The other charge still stands and Hano probably will be tried at the July term of circuit court.

Two other indictments are against a Chinese, for keeping liquor for sale without a license, and a Hawaiian, who is held on a statutory charge.

CHANGE IN PLANS FOR ITINERARY OF CONGRESSMEN

A journey on the Mauna Kea direct from Hilo, Hawaii, to Nawiliwili, Kauai, is a proposal that has materially altered the tentative program for the entertainment of the congressional party to come here next month.

President James A. Kennedy of the Inter-island Steam Navigation Company has suggested that the Mauna Kea instead of the Kilaeua be chartered for the island trips. He does not think the latter would have sufficient accommodations for the large party, and offers the Mauna Kea, replacing that boat with the Kilaeua on the Hilo-Honolulu run temporarily.

The tentative program for the tour of the other islands now outlined by Secretary Tinsler is as follows:

The party will arrive at Honolulu Monday morning, May 3; leave Wednesday night, May 5; arrive Kahului, Maui, Thursday morning, spending two days on the valley island; leave Lahaina late Friday night and proceed to Kailua, Kona, Hawaii, arriving Saturday morning.

The party probably will be given lunch that day at Napoopoo; it will divide that morning, some visiting the Cook monument and others traveling on horseback five miles to the City of Refuge. After lunch the party will start by automobile for the volcano, arriving at the Volcano House about 6 p. m. The following morning, Sunday, May 9, the entertainment committee for Hilo and East Hawaii will take charge, and the visitors will be in the committee's hands until the morning of May 12.

Early that day the party will again board the Mauna Kea and sail up the Hamakua coast, passing by Honolulu without pause and proceed direct to Kauai. At Nawiliwili the Kauai entertainment committee is to take charge the morning of the 13th, taking the guests around the Garden Island that day and delivering them aboard the ship that night. The vessel will proceed thence to Honolulu, reaching here the morning of May 14, and the tourists will be entertained at the capital city until their departure for the mainland on May 20.

STUART NAMES COURT CLERK ON OWN INITIATIVE

Without awaiting action by his fellow jurists of the first circuit court in nominating a man for second clerk in his division, Circuit Judge T. B. Stuart this morning appointed Solomon Meheula to the place and at once issued the commission. The new appointee, successor to C. D. Pringle, took the oath of office and immediately assumed the duties of the office.

In accepting Pringle's resignation Tuesday Judge Stuart announced he was sending a request to Judge Ashford and Whitney that they meet and name a man for the place. Judge Stuart, agreeing to appoint the person of their selection. He suggested that such action be taken at once as the need of a second clerk was imperative. In announcing his appointment of Meheula today Judge Stuart said he had received no reply to his communication to the other two judges and therefore assumed the initiative himself. Whether either of the other two have formally approved Meheula's appointment is not known.

The new second clerk is a Hawaiian, and for several years was an attaché in the local district court, recently being an employe in the road department of the city and county.

IN WAR ARENA

KING GEORGE WOULD PUT NATION ON WATER-WAGON

LONDON, Eng., April 1. — King George, in a personal letter to David Lloyd-George, chancellor of the exchequer, states that he desires to join the members of the shipowners organization and those labor union leaders who had made a plea that an executive order issue prohibiting the sale of intoxicants throughout the United Kingdom and Ireland during the period of the war.

The king urges that vigorous steps be taken to cope with drunkenness throughout the land which is delaying the delivery of munitions of war and to that extent endangering the success of the campaign of the British forces in France and Belgium.

The British ruler urges that the officers of the army and navy personally abstain from the use of intoxicants and states that he has given orders forbidding any further serving of intoxicants to members of the royal household or at any functions attended by members of the royal family.

LIVERPOOL DOCK LABORERS MAY FORM BATTALION

Lord Derby, former private secretary to the late field marshal, Lord Roberts, announced yesterday that the government is planning to organize the dockworkers at Liverpool and at Birkenhead into a military organization, under the name of the First Dock Battalion of the Liverpool Regiment. The battalion is to be made up of two thousand members of the Liverpool Dockworkers Union, enlisted under the military law, with the members drawing regular army pay and in addition to be guaranteed a minimum weekly wage of thirty-five shillings.

Lord Derby is to command this battalion.

RUMORED DISSENSION IN TURKS' RANKS.

GENEVA, Switzerland, April 1. — Reliable reports have reached here of continued disorders among the Turkish troops, who are dissatisfied at the showing being made against the Russians and the British. The German ammunition, with which the forts of the Dardanelles have been replying to the bombardment of the British and French warships, is practically exhausted and the gunners are now using Turkish ammunition, which is very inferior.

GERMAN PLANES DROP MANY BOMBS IN RAID

LONDON, Eng., April 1.—A Reuter despatch from the Russian capital states that a raid by fifteen German aeroplanes was made upon Ostrolenka, behind the Russian Orzvezkwa lines in Northern Poland on Monday. The aviators concentrated their attack upon an isolated house, which they mistook for the Russian headquarters. A hundred bombs were showered around the building, none of which struck the target.

RUSSIAN FLEET BUSY IN BOSPHORUS

The Russian fleet has carried on a series of bombardments during the week, shelling Zimguldak, Koslu, Kiliimli and Ereğli, Asia Minor towns one hundred and fifty miles east of Constantinople.

NORWEGIAN STEAMER SEIZED BY BRITISH


BUENOS AIRES, Argentine, April 1.—Word has reached here that the British cruiser Bristol has seized the Norwegian steamship Bangor, bound from Baltimore to Montevideo, and taken her to the British naval base on the Falkland Islands.

WILHELMINA TRIAL BRINGS OUT NEW PHASE

LONDON, Eng., April 1.—A new article in the naval policy of Great Britain toward neutral shipping was disclosed today in arguments before a prize court over the case of the American steamship Wilhelmina, bound from New York to Hamburg with foodstuffs when seized by a British cruiser. In arguing the case of the government the crown solicitor introduced in evidence an unpublished order of the privy council, providing that the crown may requisition for its uses any neutral ship.
