Felice Lyne Will Sing to Honolulu Tonight Wonderfully Varied Program

"A widely varied coloratura program of wonderful numbers" was the Salt Lake Telegram description of the program that Miss Lyne gave in the Utah city. The same remarkable program will be sung by this great coloratura soprano at the Opera House tonight.

Miss Lyne will open her program tonight with the beautiful "Caro Nome" from Rigoletto, the opera in which she made her sensational London and Boston debuts.

The subtle and delicate "Mi Chiamano Mimi," from Puccini's La Boheme, is considered by most people the greatest soprano aria that Puccini ever wrote, and Miss Lyne is famed for her delightful interpretations of Puccini's music.

Johann Strauss' bewitching "Voci di Primavera" is sung by Miss Lyne in a manner not soon to be forgotten.

A most attractive group of songs in French, including Rimsky-Korsakow's colorful "Chanson Indoue," "O Ma Tendre Musette" by Wekerlin, and Lemaire's ever fascinating "Vous Dansez Marquise," will follow the brilliant Strauss waltz.

Then Miss Lyne will trill the "Shadow Song" from "Dinorah," which she is said to sing with "such clear and bell-like tones that one is almost lost in the power of their sweetness."

Miss Lyne's rendition of Chaminade's "L'ete" is sure to be a great favorite with many people in the audience. The young prima donna will also sing a group of songs especially written for her, which she renders in a manner that is entirely charming.

Among these songs will be "A Dream Fancy" by Charles Marshall, "True Love Faleth Never" by Neville, and Novelli's "The Little Damsel," considered by many the most dainty and

quaint of all recent compositions. Miss Lyne is very generous and gracious with her encores, and her beautiful interpretation of the old but still beloved "Last Rose of Summer" (one of her encores) is said to be one of her most effective numbers.

The last, but not least, number on Miss Lyne's program is the wonderful and intricate value from "Romeo et Juliette," which is only one of her many brilliant numbers that will show why the foremost critics in the world described Miss Lyne as "a coloratura with temperament" and "a twentieth century Patti."

The tickets for Miss Lyne's concert will be on sale at the Territorial Messenger Service during the day, and the box office at the Opera House will be open at 7:30. The concert starts at 8:30.

\$40,000 IN GOLD DIDN'T GET HERE; MAN IN PRISON

According to information received here from Manila, P. M. Duarte, post in step to the United States of America, is said to be 37 years in the Philippine prison in Manila, having been convicted of embezzling \$40,000.

Duarte was arrested following an investigation by United States Postal Inspector E. F. Smith, who will arrive in Honolulu on the Vinson, from Manila, P. I., on Monday. It is reported that Duarte was directed to remit \$100,000 in gold to Honolulu, but the money did not arrive. In response to a cable he replied that the money had been sent.

The postmaster was known to have lost heavily through motion picture sh was in financial straits in which he had invested. He has a wife and seven children in Guam, who are said to be destitute.

The minimum penalty for the crime of which he was convicted is 20 years, says the report, but he was tried under the Spanish law which cut down the sentence to ten years. The amount of the alleged embezzlement was added as a fine to be served out, which makes his total sentence of imprisonment 17 years.



FIGURES ARE GIVEN ON PUPILS EXCLUDED FROM SCHOOLS AS TUBERCULOUS

Further details of the inspection of the Royal school for tuberculous pupils show that of the 25 who presented some evidence of tuberculosis, none has been definitely excluded from the school. The inspection was made at the request of the College Club.

These 25 were looked over a second time, 12 being strongly "suspect" of tuberculosis and were so tabulated in the report of the physicians to the College Club. Since then these pupils have been further studied and seven of them definitely pronounced tuberculous. All of these, however, are classed as "lymphatic" and none as "pulmonary," and as the child is not infectious, none has been excluded.

Only 13 pupils have been excluded by the board of health from all the public schools of Honolulu this season on account of tuberculosis. Twenty-seven have been enrolled for the Ma Oia open-air school, but many of them are pupils diagnosed and excluded from the schools in previous years. Twenty-one of these pupils are pulmonary cases and the others lymphatic tuberculosis cases.


