


State of Washington's Imposing Palace at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition

BIG GAME FISH ARE TAKEN OFF WAIKIKI BEACH

A fishing party composed of A. W. Neely, his son Arthur, Peter McLean and his brother, William, last Sunday went out trolling for big fish with light tackle on the lee side of this island, off Waikiki beach.

About 4 p. m. Neely hooked a large ono or "king fish," and after a long fight during which time the fish leaped clear of the water on three different occasions, he succeeded in bringing it to gaff and landed it on deck. The fish measured 54 inches in length and weighed 33½ pounds. Within ten minutes after having killed this beauty, Peter McLean hooked another ono, and it being his first experience with game fish, he had a much longer and a more spectacular fight for his prize than did Neely, but finally brought it to gaff in good shape, much to his satisfaction and the pleasure of his friends. McLean's fish measured 50½ inches in length and weighed 30½ pounds.

Trolling for big fish requires much patience, but the fish are plentiful and an occasional kill such as those of last Sunday amply repays one for the effort.

Neely held the record in the islands for large fish taken on light tackle, he having landed a 53-pound ulua several weeks ago, and last Sunday's catch adds another ½ pound to his credit.

DR. PRATT OFF FOR BUSY VISIT TO WASHINGTON

Board of Health President Will Look Into Pure Food and Medical Inspection

Pure food and drug inspection, and medical inspection in the public schools are two of the things which Dr. J. S. B. Pratt, president of the board of health, will give special attention to while on the mainland. Prior to his departure in the steam-

er Manchuria, Doctor Pratt was unusually busy cleaning up the affairs of his office and conferring with Donald S. Bowman, chief sanitary inspector of the board of health at Hilo, who has been installed as acting-president. He had little time to outline the details of his trip.

He said, however, that he is going to the mainland principally to investigate further into different phases of board of health and public health service work, with the intention of applying to the local work any new ideas which he may gather while away.

Whether there is anything "official" in connection with his trip, Doctor Pratt was inclined to be non-committal. He explained that he feels at liberty to give out only certain parts of his plans. The main object of his trip is to attend the annual conference in Washington, D. C., of state and territorial heads of the public health service. He also will visit his son, Joshua, who is a student in Cornell. He will be on the mainland about 10 weeks.

Mr. Bowman this morning stepped into harness as acting president of the board, and for the next few days will be busy getting acquainted with the work of the office. He attended a meeting of the board yesterday afternoon.

Doctor Pratt's proposed investigation of medical inspection in public schools is in line with a report which he recently submitted to the legislative committee of the Associated Charities, which outlined the local situation and urged that something be done by the territory along this line.

2. Leave of absence for twenty-four days, with permission to leave the department, to take effect upon arrival at San Francisco, California, of the October transport, is granted 1st Lieut. Clyde R. Abraham, 2nd Infantry, Fort Shafter, H. T.
Attention is invited to General Orders, No. 196, War Department, 1907, and General Orders, No. 25, series 1914, these headquarters. (11201).

Special Orders, No. 88.
April 26, 1915.
1. Private John Tylicki, Battery B, 1st Field Artillery, Schofield Barracks, H. T., will be discharged from the army, by the commanding officer of that post, by purchase, under the provisions of General Orders, No. 31, War Department, 1911. (10491).

2. Lieut.-col. E. Frank Cheatham, Q. M. Corps, Department of Quartermaster, Captain Walter C. Short, 4th Cavalry, Schofield Barracks, H. T., Captain George S. Gibbs, Signal Corps, Fort Shafter, H. T., and Veterinarian Alfred L. Mason, 4th Cavalry, Schofield Barracks, H. T., will proceed on Wednesday, April 28, 1915, to the Parker ranch, Waimea, Hawaii, for the purpose of inspecting and buying horses.
