**VISIT OF CONGRESSMEN MAY AID TO SECURE SOLDIERS' PRIVILEGE**

**Restriction Against Civilian Clothing May Attract Attention of Visitors**

(Special Star-Bulletin Correspondence)  
FORT SHAFTER, April 27.—Many of the officers of the post are unofficially hoping that the delegation of visiting congressmen shortly to arrive in the islands will observe that the troops here stationed are required to wear the uniform continually and that if those notables do so observe they will agitate the question upon their return to Washington of the restriction as to civilian clothing being removed by the war department.

While the regulations undoubtedly forbid officers or men from attempting to influence the department except through the prescribed channels of communication it is, nevertheless, within the bounds of possibility that some reference to the existing situation as regards civilian clothes may be made—just in casual conversation, of course.

D. R. Anthony, Jr., of Kansas, who is expected to be of the congressional party, is a prominent member of the military committee of the house and, through his long association and acquaintance with the service both at home and in Congress, has always taken a practical view of the affairs of the service and will probably devote a portion of time to furthering his acquaintances with the army and to inquiring into its needs. Mr. Anthony is connected with the army in family, he being a brother-in-law of Maj. Lewis M. Koehler of the 15th Cavalry.

Owing to the continuous and unusually heavy rains that have prevailed during the past two days at Shafter the camp where the latest recruits for the regiment have been held in detention has been ordered broken up today and the men will proceed to join their respective companies. Fortunately for the men in the camp there have been no new cases of either mumps or measles reported as having occurred within the last three weeks and the necessity for the continuance of the camp was therefore at an end. The detachment numbers 131 men for the 2d Infantry and in addition there were ten men belonging to the engineer company. This number of men for the 2d brings the strength of the companies up to 140 each, the largest number of men ever on the rolls of the regiment.

Maj. M. J. Lenihan has taken over the pleasant duty of arranging for the participation of the officers at this post in the West Point reunion dinner that is planned to occur on June 12 in Honolulu. Maj. Lenihan succeeds Lieut.-Col. Smith as the committeeman in charge, owing to the fact that the latter officer expects to leave Hawaii for the states by the next transport due to sail about May 5. The officers of the 2d Infantry who are eligible to participate in the reunion are Col. French, Maj. Lenihan, Maj. Williams, Capt. Jamerson, Capt. Malone, Capt. Rosenbaum, Lieuts. Preston, McAndrew, Wright, Cook, Richardson, Barker, Reed, Foster, Polhemus, Greene, Lyman, C. B., and Jones.

Capt. Paul B. Maloche has received assurances that the restriction placed on the selection of officers from Hawaii for duty with the student camp of instruction to be held in California from June 15 to August 15 of this year will not apply in his case since he was detailed by war department orders and therefore is not to be considered as one of the four officers originally authorized to be selected and which authorization was later revoked by a cablegram from Washington. Capt. Maloche will leave for San Francisco by the June transport, returning in September.

Mrs. Clarence K. Lyman from Schofield Barracks was admitted into the department hospital on Saturday as a surgical patient. Lieut. Lyman who accompanied Mrs. Lyman from their home post to Shafter has been the guest of his brothers, Lieuts. A. K. B. and Chas. B. Lyman, during his stay at this post and will remain over until Mrs. Lyman shall no longer require his presence.

The companies of the 1st battalion will at once take up estimating distance work and the required tests will follow the instruction in that branch. The work will take place at Red Hill as soon as the weather permits the commands to undertake it. If tomorrow is fair C company plans to spend the entire day out of the post engaged in that duty.

Capt. and Mrs. Jackson of the 1st Infantry, who were week-end guests of Capt. and Mrs. Chas. S. Lincoln, returned to Schofield Barracks on Sunday afternoon. Capt. and Mrs. Lincoln entertained at an informal dinner in their honor on Sunday. Col. and Mrs. E. V. Smith being additional guests on the occasion.

Capt. Robert McCleave has succeeded to the command of the 1st battalion of the 2d Infantry in place of Col. Smith, promoted, and it is probable that he will be in command for some months as no officer has as yet been assigned to the regiment to fill the vacancy that exists in the grade of major.

1st Sgt. Miller of E. Company, accompanied by Mrs. Miller and their daughter, expects to leave for the mainland on a furlough shortly. Sgt. Miller and Mrs. Miller are going for the purpose of securing special medical treatment for their daughter who has long been an invalid.

**HEALTH BOARD PROBE UNCOVERS ALLEGED FAKE**

That "Tuberclezyme," an alleged "fake" tuberculosis cure, hastened the death of Emilio Sanchez, a Spanish man, who died at the Leahi Home Sunday, is the conclusion which has been reached by the anti-tuberculosis bureau of the board of health following an investigation of the case made by the assistant superintendent of the home.

The death of Sanchez, as announced in the Star-Bulletin yesterday, was first believed to be directly due to tuberculosis. It was discovered later, however, that the patient had been taking large doses of a patent medicine, which he smuggled into the ward. Several weeks ago Sanchez's quarters were searched. Under his bed, concealed in a box of magazines, were a number of empty bottles labeled "Tuberclezyme." When his quarters were searched again yesterday, several more empty bottles were found.

According to the anti-tuberculosis bureau, "Tuberclezyme" is well known to those who are fighting against tuberculosis. Its sale is forbidden in the United States and it has been condemned by the American Medical Association and by the hygienic laboratory of the United States public health service. It has been branded as a "fake" tuberculosis cure.
