LOCAL AND GENERAL

Oceanic Lodge No. 511, F. and A. M., special, first degree, tonight at 7:30 o'clock.

There was no meeting of the Promotion Committee today, a number of the members being out of the city. The last meeting was adjourned to meet at the call of the chairman, and it is possible that no meetings will be held until after the congressional visitors have left the islands.

It is estimated that at least 29,000 pupils in the grammar grades of the public schools of the territory will be in line for promotion through final examinations next month. A committee headed by George S. Raymond, inspector of schools, now is at work on examination questions.

All bids for clearing, grading and building culverts in Kaneohe, which recently were opened in the office of the superintendent of public works, have been rejected as they are too high and call for an expenditure of money in excess of available funds. New bids will be advertised for.

Kaula recommends the abolition of the office of supervising principal of schools. The office was declared a failure as far as Kaula is concerned at a recent meeting of the Mokihina Club in Lihue. The members believe the principal should have greater freedom in the management of his school and should deal directly with the board.

Applications for positions as teachers in Hawaii schools come from all over the United States, but the two last applications come from the Philippines. F. M. Beatty of the Holy high school and Walter R. Barley of Wright Institute, San Isidor, while passing through Honolulu on the Sheridan on their vacations, filed applications with the education department of Hawaii.

Mileage fees collected by territorial grand jurors since the passage of the act by the legislature increasing the mileage allowance from 5 to 10 cents a mile would be sufficient to enable a modest juror to live comfortably without his regular fee, according to the auditor's accounts. A juror coming from Waimea, for example, 33 miles from Honolulu, pays for his eight trips to sit in the jury just \$13.20 and receives for mileage fees at the rate of 10 cents per mile, \$32.80, or a net profit of \$20 per cent.

BEGINS PROBE OF BEER PARTY IN SCHOOL HOUSE

Inspector George S. Raymond Seeks Facts Concerning Reported Orgy at Pohukaina

A "booze party" was held in the Pohukaina school, Kakaako, the night of April 27, which, according to the testimony of two little Hawaiian boys who live near the school, was attended by "sailors and marines, plenty."

The facts regarding the "booze party" were brought to the attention of George S. Raymond, school inspector, this morning by the principal of Pohukaina, Mr. Raymond, in company with a representative of the Star-Bulletin, visited the school and obtained the story from the janitor, the teachers and two of the pupils.

Questioned by Mr. Raymond, Oliver Kini, a Hawaiian boy, said that a week ago last Tuesday night, about 8 o'clock, he passed the school on a bicycle. There were "sailors and marines, plenty," around the school, he said, who were gathered around a Japanese candy wagon. They secured a lot of eatables, refused to pay the Japanese and finally beat him, declared Kini. The boy added that the persons had five barrels of beer which they brought to the school in a wheelbarrow. Later, he said, he heard singing and shouting in the building.

John Kaheha, another Hawaiian boy who lives near the school, says he passed the school on the Tuesday night on his way to a moving picture show. "The men were dressed in sailor suits; I saw no marines," he told Inspector Raymond. He said the people "had two barrels of beer" which they brought to the school in a wheelbarrow. They left the "barrels of beer" outside the Ewa entrance and went inside, he added.

"It smelled horribly of stale beer," was the way the principal of the school described the building's condition the day following the party.

She says that cigar and cigarette stumps and burned matches littered the floors of several rooms.

On the day following the party the principal informed the police department. Two policemen, or detectives, visited the school but did nothing. Raymond says they blamed the teachers for "having destroyed all the clues." The only thing found which might show that there was liquor in the building was the handle of an ordinary faucet of the type used on barrels. The Hawaiian boys said that the persons in the building came at about 8 o'clock and did not leave until about 3 o'clock the next morning.

"I claim that the supervision by the police of the Pohukaina school and the control of hoodlumism in the district is extremely lax," says Inspector Raymond. "Too much is expected of the teachers regarding the watching of government property after school hours. The teachers do their work and do it well. This matter has been reported to the police and thus far we have not heard that the police are doing anything."

ONE OF FAMOUS CANNON CIGARS OWNED BY MAYOR

At the luncheon Tuesday night the mayor deliberately had Representative "Uncle Joe" Cannon seated next to him, and the executive did not call upon the veteran congressman for a speech until after "Uncle Joe" had reached into his pocket, pulled out a black cigar and touched the match to it. Then Mayor Lane called upon Mr. Cannon for a talk.

"Uncle Joe" laid his famous black cigar on the table next to Mayor Lane's plate on rising to the occasion. The mayor took advantage thereof, and grabbed the cigar. This he placed in his pocket, although it was lit and emitting blue smoke, and it now hangs in the Lane souvenir case.
