"Kinder-Symphonie" Feature at Kamehameha Concert

The "Kinder-Symphonie" is one of the most exciting and side-bursting masterpieces that ever left the pen of it is funny to see. It is a serious undertaking of foolishness; and it is so serious, scientific and musically correct that its absurdity is ten times as jolly as the most vivid imagination could paint it.

The only unexplainable fact of the whole situation is that this wonderful composition has never been rendered in Honolulu before. BELTS ON NEW JACKETS.
Belts are a form of militarism in clothes that has made an appearance. There are few jackets from which this dividing line is omitted. It is more frequently placed at the normal waistline than we have had it for years, but evidently the old fashioned again and belts pay their obeisance to it. The Empire line is also observed. One sees evening frocks that are a distinct return to those lines worn by Josephine, the single large ornament in front coming back as a feature of adornment.

A touch of handwork upon net ruffling is distinctive. The objection to embroidering net is that the wrong side usually displays all rough defects, and stray threads may be seen through its shiriness on the right side. But with buttonholing, the wrong side may be made to look quite as neat as the right side.

TIMELY HINTS ON CLEANING STRAW HATS

You can freshen your last year's colored straw hat with dyes. There are dyes which can be diluted in gasoline or water and which, if properly applied to a hat, will give the desired color. When it cannot be given its original color it may be dyed black.

To restore natural straw color, clean the hat with lemon juice and oxalic acid diluted with water. A leghorn hat may be cleaned with water or acid dampened cornmeal. Brush it lightly and place it over burning sulphur to bleach the straw. The sulphur may be burned in a can in the bottom of a barrel, and the hat suspended at the top, where it will not scorch.

A straw hat may be successfully bleached at home by first placing a piece of thick brown paper the width of the hatband around it and tying it with a string to keep in place. Then cover the entire surface of the straw with a thick paste made of sulphur and water, and put the hat where the direct rays of the sun will beat down upon it. A sunny grass plot is just the place. When the paste has become thoroughly dry, brush well with a whisk broom, and a new hat will be the result.

To clean a panama hat, wet some sulphur and make a paste of it and rub it on the hat with a small brush. Put on enough to cover the hat thoroughly. Let it stand in the sun until dry, then rub off with a clean cloth.

To renovate a black straw hat that has become old and rusty looking, go over it several times with a cloth saturated with alcohol. When dry, the straw will be as black and glossy as when new. If the crown of the hat has become lumpy, dampen it with a cloth moistened with water and then press dry with a warm iron. Cover with small flowers and the effect will be artistic. This method of trimming is fashionable as well as handy in concealing a limp crown.

MUCH TRIMMING.
The gowns this summer will show more hand work than has been put on costumes for some time. The less formal lines and the increasing fullness offer the opportunity for elaborate trimming.

The lower edge of some of the skirts is scalloped, with lace frills showing through the open spaces. The Jacket effects, seen in some of the newest dresses, lend themselves readily to various kinds of trimming. Net and flowered silk are popular fabrics for evening wear.—Woman's World for May.

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
