The Chronicle's account is as follows:

"A few years ago it took a great amount of hardihood as well as a lot of the spirit of adventure for anyone to undertake a transcontinental automobile tour. In those early automobile days it was always a gamble whether motorists on long journeys would be able to reach their destinations in their motor cars, and as likely as not the latter half of the journey would have to be made in the precarious, though reliable, train. JUDGE ASHFORD SWATS LOTTERY WITH TWO FINES

Several blows in the way of stiff fines have been handed the che-fa lottery game by Circuit Judge Ashford during the past week, and this morning he landed another telling swat on the pastime by imposing a fine of \$300 on Fong On, who was charged with assisting in maintaining a game. The court also ordered the defendant to pay the costs of the case. In imposing sentence Judge Ashford intimated in no light way that the che-fa lottery in Honolulu has got to stop.

In the case of William Kekipi, however, Judge Ashford was inclined to be more lenient than in the matter involving Fong On. Kekipi was charged with having lottery tickets in his possession. He was sentenced to pay a fine of \$25, with costs remitted. Aside from the fine, Kekipi got a generous "bawling out" from the court. Judge Ashford said that, if he had been selling the lottery tickets, he doubtless was depriving the purchasers of many home comforts. As Kekipi was a Hawaiian working man, he could not very well pay a fine, the court commented. Also, if he went to jail, the members of his family would suffer more, probably, than those who purchased the lottery tickets. Therefore the court's leniency.

However, Kekipi will have to spend a day at hard labor in prison for each and every dollar of the fine which remains unpaid.
