CREW BATTLES FIRE IN CARGO FOR MANY DAYS

The picture of a swarthy crew fighting the flames in the hold, where 2719 tons of coal lay smoldering, their faces as black as their clothes from dust and smoke, probably has been impressed as an everlasting record of a terrible cruise on the brain of Capt. J. Colbourne, commander of the French bark *Francoise d'Amboise*.

The four-master, a relic of the early days of seafarers, has hovered off the island since early yesterday, the commander evidently afraid to come into the harbor. He told Customs Inspector Reeves today that he did not know what port this was, or what island until this morning when he anchored off the harbor. The captain was without charts of any kind showing the location of the Hawaiian islands, and has been 65 days at sea from Newcastle, Australia, bound for San Francisco with the cargo of coal.

This afternoon the bark lies off the harbor with her hatches jammed down tight. The hatches have been that way since the fire in the hold was discovered many days ago. It was considered useless to attempt watering the coal, and the hatches finally were jammed down in an endeavor to smother the flames until assistance could be secured.

The fire was caused, or believed to have been caused, by spontaneous combustion. If permission will be given by the harbor authorities, the ship will be brought into the harbor and the task of salvaging the coal and preventing the conflagration and destruction of the vessel will be started.

Fort Shafter Notes

(Special Star-Bulletin Correspondence) FORT SHAFTER, June 1.—Memorial day was observed yesterday by the garrison and the large garrison flag was displayed at half-staff until noon when, with the booming of the national salute the flag was raised. The 2d Infantry band, returning from the parade in Honolulu, was in time to be present and play appropriate airs at the ceremony.

Pursuant to orders just received from Department headquarters the following named enlisted men will be sent to Fort McDowell, Cal., on the transport due about June 4, and will report to the commanding officer for discharge: 2d Infantry—Principal Musician John A. Dapp, band; Pvt. Farris N. Wright, Co. E, Quartermaster Corps—1st Class Pvt. T. Davidson, Tel. and Tel. Dept., Signal Corps—1st Class Pvt. James C. Oakes.

The 3d battalion of the 2d Infantry will finish record practise on Wednesday and when the record firing is completed it is believed a record will be hung up for the rest of the troops in the department to go after. Company I seems to have a large lurch on the other firers if the slow fire record at 500 yards can be taken as any criterion. At this range the entire company averaged 4.5 per shot, which means that very few shots went out of the 4 ring. However, the game is not finished and Company K, L or M might hang up the mark on the rapid fire and walk off with the honor.

It was rumored that the battalion was going to ask for a postponement of pay-day until the firing was completed, as a man can't hit a thing when lying on a lot of hot coal, but advantage was taken of the splendid weather Monday and the holiday declared off so that the companies could finish.

Anto Shuvskofsky, arrested several weeks ago for an alleged attempt at burglary of the Anchor saloon, and who was acquitted on a charge of attempted burglary, will be the subject of the grand jury's attention Thursday, according to Detective Captain McDuffie.

The trial jurors in Circuit Judge Ashford's court, who were summoned to appear this morning, have been excused until 9 o'clock Thursday morning, at which time the case of Pak Chi Ser, charged with murder in the first degree, will go to trial.

A special meeting of the Associated Charities of Hawaii will be held Monday, June 7, at 4 p. m., at the Chamber of Commerce. Action will be taken on proposed amendments to the bylaws, copy of which is now posted at the office and for any other business which may be brought up.

Indian songs and dances were given before the Y. M. C. A. boys by Chief Hailstorm, a full-blooded Cherokee at the Y. M. C. A. last night. Hailstorm appeared in war paint and feathers. After dancing and singing for an hour he shook hands with all the boys, numbering 135, who were more than proud to salute a big chief. Hailstorm told the history of the Cherokee nation and of the customs of the tribe. No grand opera singer ever received stricter attention from an audience than did Hailstorm last night.

The members of the Free Kindergarten Training School are preparing an exhibit for mothers and all those who are interested in the education of little children to be held at the Library of Hawaii from Wednesday to Saturday, inclusive. Mothers have often wondered why their children turned away from the complete expensive toys provided for bits of broken china, a few seeds or stones or what the mother considers most interesting and useless things. 




