

GRAFT CHARGE AGAINST OURA MADE IN DIET

Japanese Minister of Home Affairs Accused of Accepting "Present" of 1000 Yen

APPEAL TO YOSHIHITO TO PROBE MISDEEDS

Individual Impeachment Resolutions Again Brought Into Parliament By Seiyukai

[Associated Press by Federal Wireless] TOKIO, June 5.—The opposition members in the house, having failed to impeach the Okuma ministry for failure to enforce the demands of Japan upon China, introduced another resolution today calling for the impeachment of K. Oura, minister of home affairs, charging him with violating the election laws.

Oura was assigned to the duty of seeing that the elections in March were honest, and is charged with corruptly receiving a present of 1000 yen from a candidate for the lower house.

(Special to Hawaii Shipno). TOKIO, June 5.—An appeal to Emperor Yoshihito to investigate the alleged misgovernment of Premier Count Okuma's cabinet was sent to the palace by the leaders of the Seiyukai and Kokuminto parties Friday.

The resolution calling for the impeachment of the cabinet was killed in the lower house, but the Seiyukai have again resorted to individual impeachment resolutions.

K. Oura, minister of home affairs, is next in line for impeachment. The resolution now before the diet calls for that officer's impeachment on the grounds of illegal interference with the course of the party election held March 25. The minister of foreign affairs, Baron Kato, has thus far sustained the attacks of the Seiyukai successfully, as have also Count Okuma and S. Shimada, speaker of the house.

Fear is expressed that Oura will not find the support of the government party given to the other attacked officials. Once the anti-government party starts to root out officials it is feared there will be a general casting from office.

ONLY TEN DAYS MORE TO FILE FOR ELECTION

No Candidates For Charter Convention Have Yet Filed Petitions

With only ten days more in which to file petitions of candidacy, not one prospective delegate to the municipal charter convention has filed for the office. Despite this fact City and County Clerk Kalanokalani has confidence that all of the 64 delegates can be elected at the special plebiscite to be held July 6.

"There is no doubt in my mind that we will have plenty of candidates before the time for filing expires on June 16," the clerk said today, "and even should there not be enough, the law provides that the convention is to be held even if there is only one delegate. Any precinct that fails to have candidates for the charter convention will merely be without any representation at the convention."

At present 31 people have taken out petition blanks. Last yesterday and today Joseph W. Keith, Dick W. Diamond, J. P. Kahakawai, W. F. Moosman, J. S. Kaikiela, Moses Palau, S. K. Maloo, Joseph Kalana, R. P. Zebian, H. P. Mahilani, E. K. Aiu and M. P. Puskala took out blanks. In all 52 blanks are out, C. H. Brown having taken 12, Diamond three, W. H. Crawford four and another took out six blanks.

Mr. Kalanokalani expressed his individual views on the charter situation to the Star-Bulletin today. He believes the present charter will serve the needs of the people for a long time to come. He does, however, advocate a change in the manner of election of members of the board of supervisors. He believes that three members should be elected from each district and the seventh member from the island as a whole. He also advocates a "hold over" system such as is in vogue in the senate and other political bodies.

Circuit Judge Ashford this morning refused to give Ah See, charged with assisting in maintaining a lottery, a suspended sentence of 13 months. The court ordered the case continued until next Saturday morning at 9 o'clock for disposition.

TWO BIG GRAFT SCANDALS BREAK IN CALIFORNIA

Big Organization of Opium Dealers, Involving Many Officials, is Alleged

CONGRESSIONAL ELECTION LEADS TO BRIBERY CHARGE

Forty-two Indicted in Mess That Resembles Terre Haute Situation

[Associated Press by Federal Wireless] SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 5.—Affidavits have been presented to President Keyland of the state board of control alleging that the opium traffic is protected in California, that attorneys and employees of the state board of pharmacy, policemen and habitues of the underworld are involved.

Chief Inspector Sutherland accuses Inspector White, brother of the chief of police, inspectors Scott and Carmack of accepting bribes.

CORPUS CHRISTI, Cal., June 5.—Forty-two persons, including United States Commissioner Southgate, county and district judges, the sheriff, the police chief and the city attorney have been indicted after a probe by federal agents. The men are accused of "conspiring to obstruct justice" of a member of Congress.

SAY CHARLTON WAS SANE WHEN HE KILLED WIFE

Experts Tell Court They See No Signs of Accused Having Been Unbalanced

[Associated Press by Federal Wireless] LAKE COMO, Italy, June 5.—That Porter Charlton, the young American who is being tried for the murder of his wife, was mentally responsible at the time of his wife's death, was the substance of the testimony of expert alienists who appeared in court today.

Charlton was first arrested nearly five years ago, charged with having murdered his wife in Italy. He escaped to the United States, but after fighting the case through to the supreme court of the United States, was extradited and taken back to the scene of the alleged crime for trial.

He put up an insanity plea, and for several months has been under careful observation at an asylum for the insane at Lake Como. Charlton's wife, who was rich, was several years his senior. The supposed motive for doing away with the woman was to get her money.

"PERFECTLY PROPER" WAS GEN. CARTER'S TALK TO LEGISLATURE

Carter's support of the measure.

Local Offices of Pacific Mail Still Operating Under Orders Received Last March

PLENTY OF SPACE LEFT IN STEAMERS TO COAST

Sierra Today Could Have Carried 40 More Passengers—Matson Boats Rarely Filled

[Associated Press by Federal Wireless] SAN FRANCISCO, June 5.—Freight engagements for the Pacific Mail Steamship Company are not being made beyond July 31, according to orders received at this office of the company, and all passages engaged for the Orient after that date are subject to cancellation.

The announcement coming by wireless from San Francisco today that the Pacific Mail has ordered a cancellation of agreements to carry freight from San Francisco or ports in the Orient after July 31, has not been officially received at the agency of H. Hackfeld & Company.

The Honolulu agents have for two months done business under an arrangement that followed a general order to all representatives of the Pacific Mail when it was said the company expected to suspend its trans-pacific freight and passenger service in November.

Passengers who booked for Honolulu at the mainland agencies are now threatened with a cancellation of their transportation by the order.

Officers in Toyo Kisen Kaisha steamers which have recently visited Honolulu profess to believe the Pacific Mail will be taken over by Japanese. It was stated that an offer of a majority of Pacific Mail shares had been made to Japanese capitalists and that the proposal had received serious consideration.

"To lay the slump in tourist travel from the mainland to Hawaii, to a diminished rate of passenger travel from this end of the line, is ridiculous," was the opinion expressed by an official of the Matson Navigation Company this morning.

"The steamer Matsonia left Honolulu last Wednesday morning with accommodation for 20 more passengers in the first class, had they applied for transportation," he added.

"There are 52 cabins in the Wilhelmina. It left the coast with 107 passengers. Using all available berths the Wilhelmina can accommodate 146 cabin passengers."

The challenge was made today that existing records of incoming first-class passengers from the mainland to Honolulu would show that the travel had utilized little more than 50 per cent of the available accommodation in vessels of the Matson, Oceanic and Pacific Mail lines.

It is pointed out that since the first of the year some of the steamers have been carrying about one-fifth of the number for which they have accommodation.

With nine vacant first-class state-rooms, 18 cabins with but one passenger each, and only two travelers in each of the occupied rooms, the Oceanic liner Sierra steamed to San Francisco at noon today, taking 162 cabin and 70 steerage passengers.

C. Brewer & Company, representing the Oceanic line, brand as nonsense the statement that the Sierra would leave for the mainland today full from stem to stern and that not as much as a settler was to be had for love or money.

On a basis of two passengers to a state-room, the Sierra could have accommodated 40 more passengers on the present trip to the coast. When booked to its capacity the vessel can easily accommodate 225 cabin passengers.

"We could have easily accommodated 60 more coast-bound passengers had they applied for transportation," was stated at the agency this morning.

SAYS ALLIES WIN SOON AT DARDANELLES

ATLANTIC FLEET WON'T TRY CANAL PASSAGE IN JULY

Gen. Goethals Advises Against It and President Wilson Agrees

VISIT OF DIVISION TO HAWAII IS ABANDONED

Secretary Daniels Will Not Make Voyage Here With Big Vessels as He Planned

[Associated Press by Federal Wireless] WASHINGTON, D. C., June 5.—President Wilson has agreed that it is unwise for an attempt to be made to take the Atlantic fleet through the Panama canal in July, owing to the danger from slides.

A formal announcement of the decision is expected soon. Gen. Goethals, builder of the canal, has reported that the condition of the Gaillard cut is such that it cannot be definitely promised that the fleet could pass the canal on the date in prospect.

The definite decision not to take the Atlantic fleet through the Panama canal means that Honolulu will not be visited this summer by a battleship division. Secretary of the Navy Daniels has made detailed plans for such a visit and intended to bring at least five of the big fighting machines to this port. His plans were contingent upon the passage of the canal. There is no expectation of taking the fleet around the Horn, so if the Canal trip is abandoned the Atlantic fleet will not engage in the long summer cruise planned. Secretary Daniels also will not come to Hawaii for his proposed inspection of Pearl Harbor naval station and drydock. Unless he can come with his battleships he will not come at all, according to a decision reached some time ago.

CLEMONS AGAIN RULES AGAINST JOHN T. SCULLY

Motion That Someone Besides Marshal Smiddy Summon Special Venire Denied

[Associated Press by Federal Wireless] U. S. District Attorney Jeff McCarn, Marshal J. J. Smiddy and Attorney R. W. Breckons were on the witness stand in federal court this morning during an endeavor by Attorney C. H. McBride, counsel for J. T. Scully, to show that the marshal and his deputies are not indifferent toward the defendant Scully.

The witnesses were called by the defense in support of a motion by Mr. McBride that Judge Charles F. Clemons appoint an outsider, someone other than persons connected with the marshal's office, to summon the special venire of 40 men necessary in the third trial of Scully.

Following lengthy argument and questioning Judge Clemons overruled the motion and ordered the marshal to summon the special venire, returnable at 10 o'clock Monday morning, at which time the third trial of Scully will begin.

In answer to questions put by Attorney McBride, Mr. Breckons said he had talked with the marshal regarding the Scully case, but that the marshal had made no statement to him regarding his belief as to the guilt or innocence of Scully.

Marshal Smiddy testified that he had talked to none of the witnesses regarding the case. He said he had not talked about Scully or any of his cases during the past six weeks. He denied having talked with Mr. McCarn in the court room regarding the case. He added that he had no interest in the Scully case.

Smiddy objected to being called to the witness stand. He referred to the proposition as the "hot air scheme of a lot of hoodlums."

District Attorney McCarn recalled having made a statement to the marshal, following the second trial, that the marshal had summoned certain men who had hung the jury.

After the denial of his motion, Attorney McBride demanded that he be told whether the grand jury had returned any "no true bills" against Scully in its recent session, or whether the grand jury had further investigated Scully. It was rumored today that the grand jury had returned two "no true bills" against Scully, one pertaining to the impersonation of a federal officer, and the other to having opium in his possession. Yesterday an order was made that all "no true bills," as well as "true bills," be placed on secret file. The order was made at the instance of Mr. McCarn.

Referring to the situation at the Dardanelles, he said: "Our forces are within a few miles of a victory such as this war has not seen; a victory which, when it comes, will make amends for all that has gone before of hardship and suffering."

JUDGE MAHAULU WILL SPEAK IN PARKER'S PLACE

The proposition of who shall be speaker at the memorial services for Kamehameha I in Kawaiahaeo church at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning has been amicably settled by the various societies in charge of the Kamehameha Day celebration.

Rev. H. H. Parker, for the last 50 years pastor of Kawaiahaeo, who was selected by the general celebration committee as speaker, has withdrawn, and Judge A. S. Mahaulu, a member of the Kamehameha Society, has been appointed in his stead. Mr. Parker was allowed to withdraw upon his own initiative, after he had learned that the Kamehameha Society, which has held memorial services to Kamehameha I during the last 12 years, wished to appoint the speaker.

As a result of Mr. Parker's withdrawal, all breaches of friendship, if there were any, have been healed, said a member of the general celebration committee today. The plans for the services will be carried out as originally intended.

Invitations to more than 75 prominent Honoluluans, who will be guests of honor at the various events on Kamehameha Day, June 11, will be sent out Monday. Col. Curtis P. Iaukea is in charge of the invitations. The guests of honor will include Queen Liliuokalani, Wade Warren Thayer, acting governor; army and navy officials and territorial, city and county and federal government officials.
