ADMIRAL TELLS OF HEROIC WORK DONE BY GRILLY

In a letter dated April 19 from Admiral C. B. T. Moore to the Secretary of the Navy, the following account of Frank Grilly's rescue of Diver Loughman during salvage operations on Submarine F-4 of Honolulu harbor is contained, according to a copy of the letter printed in the Army and Navy Register: "On Saturday, April 17, Diver Loughman was sent down to report upon the condition of the lines but became fouled and was rescued by Diver Grilly. Diver Loughman was under water for about four hours and was reported in the afternoon as being all right, but he needed to go into the compression chamber and was kept there until 1 o'clock in the morning when he was taken out, the doctors fearing pneumonia. On Sunday he was considered very ill, but the doctors expressed the hope that he would be all right, as he was conscious and able to talk and gave clear information as to what he saw before he became fouled.

"When Loughman reported that he was fouled and that he could neither go up nor down Diver Grilly was quickly placed in a diving suit and went to his assistance. I am informed that he went down to 245 feet, where Loughman was held, and moved up and down for a considerable period and once came all the way to the surface and carried a life line down, and made fast to Loughman and brought Loughman up in safety. He himself seemed all right, but was suffering from nervous shock, as was evidenced by a little tendency to hysteria in the evening after the whole matter was ended. His condition today is reported as good.

"I desire to invite the department's special attention to the self-possession, courage and strength of Grilly in this feat of rescuing his companion. Loughman is today reported as improving."

RICH SUGAR CONTENT HELPED BEET GROWERS

A rich sugar content and a high percentage of extraction helped to make a good yield of beet sugar in the United States in the campaign beginning in 1914. The area harvested was nearly 100,000 acres less than the year before, but a favorable growing season resulted in an average yield per acre of 10.9 tons, the largest since 1906 and 1.4 tons above the average for the 1913 campaign. American official returns show that in the calendar year 1913 the United States imported 17,644,721 pounds of sugar-beet seed, and in 1914, 17,557,062 pounds; of these imports Germany supplied 14,083,731 pounds and 12,846,282 pounds, respectively.

UNDER FIRE FOR THREE MONTHS AT GERMAN CITADEL

"The Japanese landed 23,000 armed men on the Shantung peninsula previous to a declaration of hostilities with Germany, while their fleet was close enough to the harbor to shell the city of Tsingtau," said Paul Goethe today, one of a party of 60 members of the German hospital staff, who spent three months in the besieged naval and army base before its surrender to the Japanese forces last November.

"A rain of shrapnel and shell from the Japanese batteries entrenched on the hills that command Tsingtau practically wrecked many important government buildings.

Goethe, who is a passenger to the Fatherland in the Pacific Mail liner Korea, said that before the close of the Japanese siege, more than 50,000 soldiers had been brought to assist in storming the fortress.

"We remained at Tsingtau two days before being taken prisoners of war to Tientsin. From this neutral ground we were transferred to detention camps in Japan."

He stated that under an agreement between the Japanese and German governments those men belonging to the medical and hospital corps were paroled and permitted to return to their country.

OPERATIC ACTS PLEASE PATRONS

Manager Bredhoff put on at the Popular theater last night one of the best combination bills ever presented at a moving picture house in Honolulu, and the large audience that saw the photos and heard the grand operatic acts in select numbers were enthusiastic in their applause and expressions of appreciation. The pictures were excellent, but the operatic selections proved to be the feature of the performance.

The entertainment opened at 8 o'clock with pictures, which were followed by the Trio Rocca, consisting of Mrs. F. M. Bechtel at the piano, Prof. Carl Mikner with violin and Prof. Luigi di Rocca with violoncello, in a most artistic rendition which brought them an encore. Then came the spinning-wheel act from "Martha." In this number Signor Sacchetti appeared as "Lionel" Miss Sylvia as "Nancy," and Signor Bonisiglia as "Plunkerton."
